BREMEN CREW PAYS HONOR TO BENNETT

(By International News Service) WASHINGTON, April 28.—Storm-bound again by the elements which have conspired against them at every turn, the German-Irish conquerors of the Atlantic decided today to leave by train rather than by airplane. In a drizzling rain this morning which accentuated the melancholy nature of their visit, Baron Gunther von Huenefeld, Captain Herman Koehl and Major James Fitzmaurice paid a sad tribute at the grave of Floyd Bennett, who died in an effort to bring them relief. They placed on Bennett's grave priceless German and Irish flags brought over on the Bremen.

MILLER FIELD, Staten Island, April 28.—Bernt Balchen landed here shortly after he took off from Curtiss Field this morning, having been forced to abandon his flight to Washington on account of bad weather.

WASHINGTON, April 28.—The House today unanimously adopted the resolution authorizing the president to confer distinguished flying crosses on members of the crew of the Bremen, Baron Gunther von Huenefeld, Capt. Herman Koehl, and Major James Fitzmaurice.

CURTISS FIELD, N. Y., April 28.—Bernt Balchen, trans-Atlantic flyer, took off alone at 8:30 o'clock this morning in the Ford plane for Washington.

He will bring back the German-Irish flyers after they visit Arlington National Cemetery to pay tribute at Floyd Bennett's grave.

PARIS, April 28.—Major Louis Isikowsky and Major Casimir Kapula, Polish aviators, hopped from LeBourget aerodrome at 5:00 o'clock this morning, ostensibly on a test flight preparatory to their contemplated trans-Atlantic hop.

It was rumored after the take-off that they are already on the ocean flight and are believed to be headed for the Azores as the first stop.

AMUNDSEN AIDE ASKS BYRD FOR CHANCE ON SOUTH POLE FLIGHT

(By International News Service) CLEVELAND, April 28.—An old sea-salt, Capt. Olaf Aslaksen, 58, who has sailed the world salt waters for 42 years, wants to accompany Commander Richard E. Byrd's expedition to the South Pole.

Aslaksen, who accompanied Amundsen on the Belgian expedition to the Antarctic as second mate declared he believed he would be of great aid to the noted flyer.

"I know the Straits of Marcellan as well as you fellows know the Cleveland streets," the aged sea captain told acquaintances. "I am sure I could be of some help to Byrd on this trip which will take him through these waters."

BRING IN NEW EASTLAND WELL

EASTLAND, April 28—Four oil field workers who had faith and were willing to gamble with fate are responsible for Eastland county's newest gusher which placed 830 barrels of oil in the pipe line in its first 24 hours.

The well—the Williamson No. 1 of the Operators Oil & Gas Company—had reached a depth of 400 feet when a dry hole was completed, 600 feet north. Abandonment of the Williamson well was considered but the crew offered to complete the well for a one-fourth interest—a sixteenth for each worker. The offer was accepted; the well was drilled to 2,990 and began flowing. More than 24 hours later, it was still flowing steadily without having paused.

Weeks of work without pay had caused one of the drillers to offer his interest for sale at \$250. Ten days later, he was glad he hadn't sold for it is worth twenty times that amount. The producer extended the Sibley pool a quarter of a mile west and several wells will start.

Two new shallow pools have been discovered in the county during the past week—the J. E. 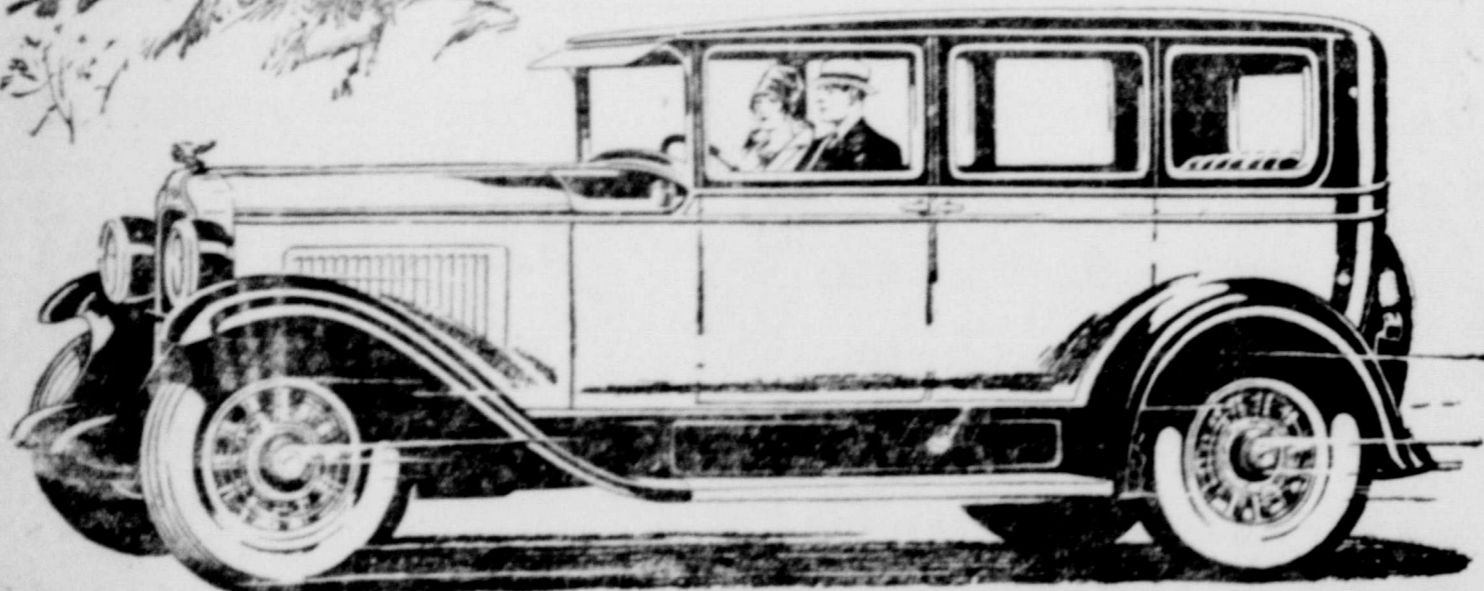
