## GOOD RAINS FALL IN PARTS OF RUNNELS

Northern and western Runnels county received rains averaging from one to three inches Friday night, according to reports received here Saturday morning. The rains put streams up and greatly benefited the cotton crop, parties in Ballinger from those sections asserted.

Abilene received 6.26 inches of rain, which was filling up Lake Kirby, the municipal reservoir. Streets of Abilene were flooded. Bus drivers arriving here from Abilene Saturday morning stated water was over the narrow Cedar Creek bridge, the side of Abilene and also covered the highway for a distance of about 150 yards.

Streams in Runnels county were also running bank-full Saturday morning. Bluff Creek, south of Winters, spread over highway No. 30 for a number of yards early in the day and increased the run-off of Elm Creek. Elm was on a rise. The Colorado River was on a big rise and the level was getting higher at 11:00 o'clock. The Ballinger Country Club lake, which had been almost dry for several weeks was reported to have been almost filled up by rains up Los Arroyo.

## Young Man Accidentally Kills Self

Herbert Baker, 23, young ranch employee at the Shannon McWilliams ranch, 14 miles northwest of Ballinger, on Valley Creek, was accidentally killed Saturday morning about 10 o'clock. Baker lived only a few minutes after a load from a shot-gun had entered his body.

It is presumed that Baker was en route to kill a few rabbits with his double-barreled shot-gun when he stopped at a pig-pen near the house and was punching a hog with the stock of the gun. It was accidentally discharged, the load striking him in the abdomen.

Mr. McWilliams, owner of the ranch, was in Ballinger at the time of the killing, but left immediately upon receipt of the news from neighbors.

Baker had been employed on the ranch for about a year, coming here with his family, wife and two children, from Killen. Funeral arrangements had not been reported at 3 o'clock this afternoon.

## HOUSE LEADERS IN CONFERENCE

WASHINGTON, May 12.—Conferences between House leaders today failed to evolve a solution for the tangle over the legislation to be considered during the closing days of congress.

Ignoring the Boulder Dam project and the congressional re-appointment measure, the rules committee voted preferred status to the Hayes-Cooper prison goods bill, the Dennison barge line bill, and measures that increase the pay of immigration and customs employees.

Nevertheless Speaker Nicholas Longworth asserted that it was his personal belief that the re-appointment bill and Boulder Dam question would be considered.

## JAPANESE FORCES ARE PREPARING FOR WAR

### SAYS JAP WAR IS VALUABLE TO UNITED STATES

TOKYO, May 12.—Japanese intervention in China is as valuable to American and European powers as it is to Japan, Premier Tanaka stated this afternoon as he was en route to a ministerial council to discuss the Sino situation.

Tanaka hopes for a diplomatic settlement and believes the communists are responsible for the trouble.

Japanese troops are holding Tsinan and have established strong positions around the city to meet possible counter-attacks. The war office, however, is hopeful that the fighting is over. The powerful Japanese fleet is anchored off Tsing Tao.

The city planning conference which is holding forth in Dallas this week, has brought to Texas city builders from the larger cities of the United States, and will no doubt stimulate the work of making Texas cities more beautiful. Leaders in municipal work from all over Texas are attending the conference and taking advantage of the opportunity of training for more efficient work. The average tax payer is interested in getting more for his money, both from a civic and sanitary viewpoint.

A lack of interest, or indifference on the part of the voters, leaves the making of public officers in the hands of a few in this, what we call our representative form of government. Reports from the various voting precincts of the country show that about one per cent of the voting strength, or about one voter out of every one hundred, will have a voice in the naming of the men who will select the candidate for president. The two Ballinger precincts, with a voting strength of some twelve or fifteen hundred, were attended by less than two dozen voters. In a Taylor county precinct only one voter was present. He elected himself chairman and secretary, and proceeded to pass resolutions and elect a delegate to the county convention. Certainly those who did not attend the precinct conventions have no ground for complaint if the political program is not carried out to suit.

**THIS DEMOCRAT RAN HIS OWN CONVENTION**  
DALLAS, May 12.—V. O. Sauer, of Christian Valley, near here, is a "loyalty" Democrat of the first water. In the recent precinct conventions Sauer had the distinction of running the "steam roller" without opposition. When he arrived at the convention at Christian Valley no one was present. Sauer waited an hour and still no delegates showed up. Determined to uphold the best traditions of Democracy, Sauer took the pledge to support the party nominees and then named A. W. Anderson, a neighbor, as delegate to the county convention.

**Ken Maynard Western Closes Run at Palace Tonight**

**CAN REPLACE TERRELL ASYLUM FOR \$75,000**

(By International News Service) AUSTIN, May 12.—The Terrell State Hospital dormitory which was partially destroyed by fire, can be replaced for \$75,000, according to estimates of the Board of Control. This figure is based on repairing of the structure instead of rebuilding.

To build a new building that would serve the same number of inmates as the old structure housed would cost approximately \$250,000 the board estimated.

The dormitory housed 256 patients. Half of them were taken to the institution at Wichita Falls and half to the Rusk asylum.

**FIND HUMAN SKELETONS 4,000 YEARS OLD IN A GRAVE IN ENGLAND**

(By International News Service) PEMBROKE, Wales, May 12.—Human skeletons nearly 4,000 years old have been discovered in a hidden grave at Ludechurch near here, by A. G. O. Mathin and J. D. Beddoe, two local antiquarians.

With the skeletons is buried a dog.

Sir Arthur Keigh, famous anthropologist, has identified the bones as being those of a woman—evidently an adult—a man, a child—or the fragments of the backbone of a newly-born baby.

All the bodies were placed together in what was evidently a family tomb. Alongside the skeleton of the dog was a beaker or drinking vessel made of clay. It was from this that the date of burial is fixed.

Dr. Cyril Fox, director of the Welsh National Museum at Cardiff, says the beaker belongs to the beginning of the Bronze Age—about 1700 B. C.

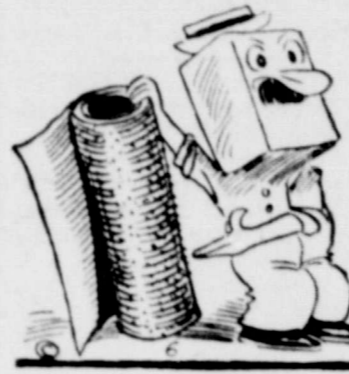
