OUTPUT OF WEST TEXAS SHOWS SLIGHT INCREASE

Minor advances in the Runnels, Jones, Loving and Seury county oil fields and gains of 5,710 barrels in Winkler county, 2,522 in Pecos county, and 610 barrels in Crane county, helped to send the daily oil production of West Texas higher after it had lost 19,367 barrels daily output during the previous week.

There were slight decreases in Upton, Reagan, Crockett, Fisher, Mitchell and Howard counties, but the increases in the other county fields were enough to off-set the slow-down.

Runnels county's two wells showed a slight increase, the report indicated.

West Texas Chamber Convention at Ft. Worth Expected to Be Biggest

FT. WORTH, May 30.—When West Texans come to this city, June 18, 19 and 20, for the tenth annual convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, they may rightly expect the greatest convention in the history of the organization.

For more than two months, committees made up of approximately 200 of Fort Worth's leading business men have been engaged in making plans for the meeting. Such a spirit of co-operation of business men has never been better exemplified in Texas and the result is that plans are now practically complete.

There will be at least twenty-five sponsors to be presented at the pageant, an annual event on the opening night of the convention. More than one hundred entrants have registered for the "My Home Town Contest," while fifty-odd band masters have already signed entry blanks for as many squads of musicians. There also will be other contests, details for which are in the making. Headquarters for more than fifty towns, planning to send large delegations have also been assigned. Ft. Worth is sparing no expense to make the convention the greatest ever held by any organization in the United States.

The pageant, always an event looked forward to by all West Texans at this annual convocation, will excel in brilliance, beauty and grandeur anything of the kind ever staged in Texas. It will be presented at the Texas Christian University Stadium, Monday evening, June 18, where the seating capacity is twenty-odd thousand. HOPES DIM FOR ITALIA'S CREW

(By International News Service) LONDON, May 30.—Hopes for the safety of General Umberto Nobile and his crew of 16 men, lost with the dirigible Italia, dimmed today as inclement weather continued in the Arctic regions.

Meanwhile the search is being pressed by the Russians, Norwegians and Italians.

The Soviet government has dispatched an ice-breaker with a seaplane aboard.

LONDON, May 30.—Balked by storm and ice in an effort to land the searching party on Amsterdam Island to scout the Italia, the dirigible's supply ship, the City of Milan returned to Kings Bay today, according to Central News Agency dispatches from Kings Bay this afternoon.

Wells' Death is Affirmed

FUNERAL FOR MISS MITCHELL HERE THURSDAY

Funeral services for Miss Vella Mitchell, 17, daughter of John Mitchell, city pumper, who took her own life about 1 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, will be held Thursday at 4 p. m. from the home of Mrs. S. A. McCray, 407 Strong Avenue, it was announced Wednesday.

Miss Mitchell ended her life by shooting herself in the right temple with a .410 gauge shotgun. She died instantly. The young woman had been in low spirits for some time, it was said, and had been under the treatment of a local physician.

She is survived by her father; one sister, Mrs. Ruby Hampton, of Port Arthur; and four brothers, F. C., Frank and L. T., all of Bisbee, Arizona; and Will, of California.

The funeral services will be conducted by Rev. J. H. McClain, pastor of the Ballinger Baptist Church, of which the young woman was a member.

Interment will be made in Evergreen Cemetery with Higginbotham Bros. & Co. undertakers in charge. Rebecca and Odd Fellows will conduct the services at the grave.

A coroner's inquest held Tuesday afternoon resulted in a verdict of suicide.

DRYS WOULD RUN THOMAS

(By International News Service) DALLAS, May 30.—Cullen F. Thomas, noted orator and attorney, is being importuned by the radical prohibitionists here to announce his candidacy for the governorship, it was learned here today.

Thomas is non-committal, but it is expected to make his pronouncement within a day or two.

A secret meeting of the drys continues here in an effort to agree upon a candidate who is definitely opposed to Governor Moody.

If plans are finally adopted to vote a bond issue for the building of concrete roads in two districts of Runnels county, the increased tax on the \$100 valuation will not exceed fifty cents, County Judge Paul Trimmier said Wednesday morning. Judge Trimmier presented the board of directors of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce with some very interesting data on the road building for this section, relating to the directors just what information he had obtained from the State Highway Department.

The State Highway Commission has tentatively agreed to pay two-thirds of the cost of paving about 70 miles of state and federal designated highways in Runnels county, on highways Nos. 30 and 23, No. 30 extending from the Taylor county line to Tom Green county line, and No. 23 from the Coleman county line to the Concho county line.

The entire cost of this will be about \$1,847,575.20, according to figures furnished Judge Trimmier by the state department. This figure, Judge Trimmier explained, includes a new bridge over Elm Creek, east of this city. The state will see that its part of the bargain is kept, it was said, if Runnels county will get busy and raise its one-third of the total.

According to information recently received here by the Commissioners' Court, highway No. 30 will be a concrete road or with a concrete base and asphalt topping, while highway No. 23 will be macadamized road with asphalt topping, each of 18-foot

C. R. STEPHENS ANNOUNCES FOR REPRESENTATIVE

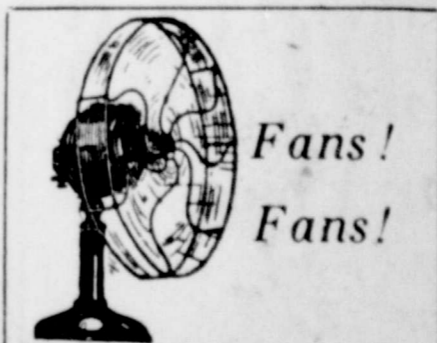

PRISONER SAYS HE WAS TREATED WELL IN THE RUNNELS COUNTY JAIL

The following is a letter received from a former prisoner in the Runnels county jail who is now serving a term in the penitentiary at Huntsville. This is only one of many letters received by the sheriff and his wife, the jailer, from former prisoners. "Huntsville, Tex., May 24, 28. "Dear Mother Me and Mr. Me: "Charlie and I received your letter some time ago but owing to the scarcity of news in this place we have delayed somewhat in making reply.

"This place is undergoing a very decided change and I am of the opinion that every man in here will profit by the change.

"First, a new warden; second, a cleaning out of the dope and whiskey rings; third, a cleaning up of our living quarters and the giving of better food. When I first came here this place was a big 'mad house.' I use that word for it comes near to explaining the conditions that existed then. Today things are very different, very little unfavorable comments are heard from the men, so you know the change is meeting with their approval.

"They closed the drug store so I am out of a job, so to speak. I help around the mess hall while waiting for work along my line to turn up. I am expecting to be placed on one of the farms as hospital steward. Charlie is one of the cooks. He wants to know if you will give him a job in Runnels county's biggest boarding house when he gets out. Said tell you all he sends his best wishes.

"Not only is Mother Me's the largest but it's the very best boarding house a 'wrong doer' ever hit. I was once listed as one of the 'regulars.' Mother Me and her 'gang' of helpers proved to make you feel at home, regardless of what you have done. The eats are good and the beds are clean—what more could a person ask if they were paying their own way. That's another thing, Mrs. Me during my stay there I never saw you approach a single person for their B. and R. bill, ha! ha! Guess Runnels county comes in at this time as the good samaritan, eh?

"Loyalty and goodness is what makes every person that was ever under your keeping like you. When you can get a 'crook' to speak a good word for a 'law' or his family, you may know they are out of the ordinary in every respect. Now Mother Me, I can't say these nice things about that drunken bunch up in Tom Green county. Now you folks write me real soon letters to help to pass the long days.

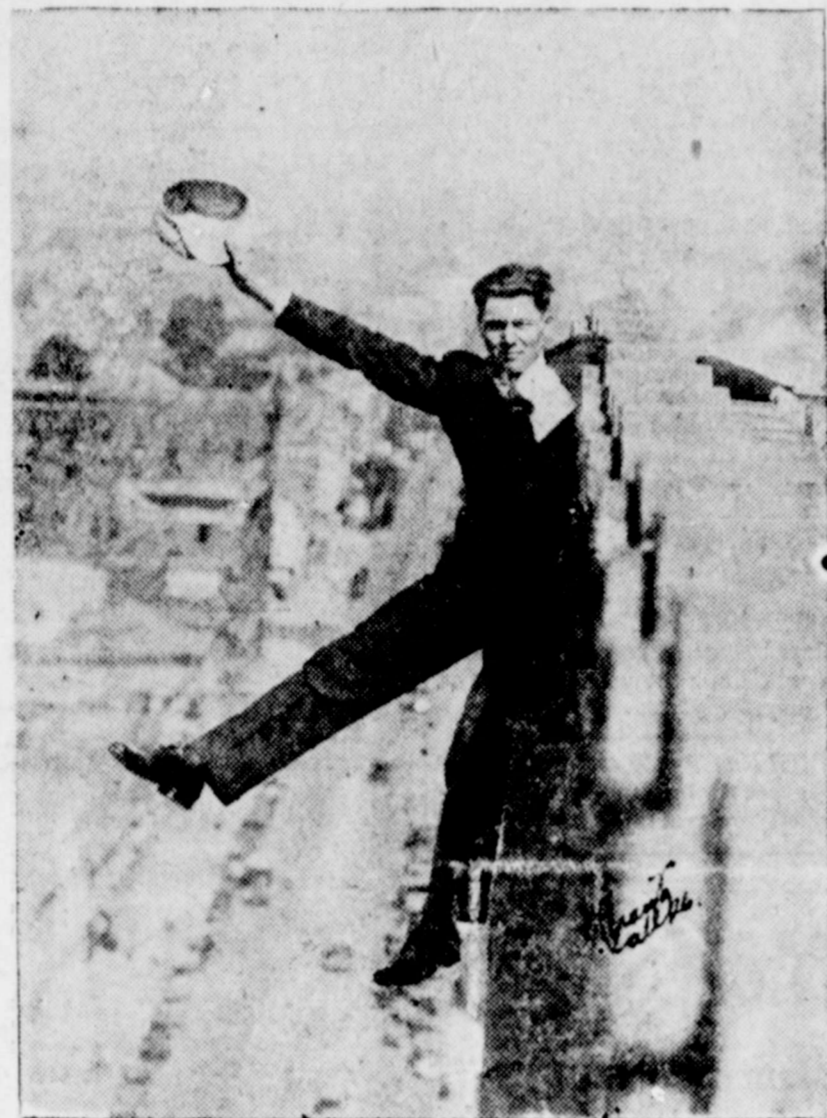

"Human-Fly" Here Tonight



Henry D. Roland, Jr., the "human fly," will attempt to climb the bare wall of the Central Hotel tonight at 7:30 o'clock, but previous to the climbing stunt he will do several balancing acts from the top of the building, and will also walk the top rim of the building blind-folded. He will also do his chair and table stunt from the hotel roof.

Roland comes here from San Angelo, where he entertained the crowds Tuesday.

The dare-devil has been climbing buildings and presenting his balancing stunts for the past 14 years and has suffered only one serious fall. This occurred in Bloomingfield, Iowa, where he fell from the fourth story of a building he was climbing. A pigeon flew in his face and caused him to tumble to the ground. He sustained two broken hips, a broken arm in two places and other injuries.

The tallest building Roland has conquered was the L. C. Company building at Seattle, Wash., of 42 stories. It took him two hours and 51 minutes to make this climb. At the beginning he weighed 150 pounds and at the end of the climb he had lost five pounds. His highest climb in Texas was the Epperson building at Houston of 32 stories.

Roland has pulled his stunts in cities all over the United States and in Mexico. He has been the only man to ever pull his climbing stunt in Havana, Cuba.

Several copies of The Ledger will be tossed from the roof of the hotel building with complimentary tickets to the Palace Theatre tonight.

Roland's secret of success in the climbing game, says his manager, E. H. Gischler, is "just be careful."
