## HEART OF TEXAS MAKES PLANS FOR CONVENTION

Definite plans are being arranged by the committee of the Heart of Texas Chamber of Commerce for the special delegation to the tenth annual convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to be held at Fort Worth June 17 to 20, inclusive, it was announced here Saturday morning by J. D. Motley, secretary of the Ballinger Chamber of Commerce, and chairman of the parade committee.

Following is a list of the various committees named Thursday at a meeting held at Brownwood by the executive committee, composed of W. P. Murphey, Brownwood; G. Gosch, San Saba; and W. P. Hallmark, Dublin:

Finance—H. Burks, Brownwood; E. T. Peters, Cisco; Carl Blasig, Brady.

Exhibits—Mrs. W. D. Armstrong, Brownwood; W. A. Wilson, San Saba; C. H. Colvin, Stephenville; J. F. Robertson, Rising Star.

Parade—J. D. Motley, Ballinger; S. O'Neal, Coleman; J. R. Eanes, Comanche; H. O. Tatum, Baird; S. L. Wolfe, Dublin.

Education—J. Thomas Davis, Stephenville; E. B. Gilliam, Brownwood; E. Godbold, Brownwood; J. H. Roberts, Cisco.

Petroleum—Stanley Norman, Coleman; D. K. Doyle, Brownwood; W. C. Hickey, Ranger.

Agriculture—E. H. Varnel, chairman, with all the agricultural agents in the Heart of Texas counties as members of the committee.

The executive committee discussed the matter of finances and decided to raise the sum of \$1200, to be used to provide floats for the sponsors from the different counties in the convention parade, the decorating of the Heart of Texas exhibit hall in Fort Worth, and other necessary expenses.

Each county in the district will be called on by the finance committee, the executive committee announces, and the plan of financing taken up with the different counties, so that quick action may be had on this part of the work and everything gotten in readiness to proceed with the convention plans.

Each county is asked to buy a special uniform cap for its citizens at the convention, according to the plans decided upon Thursday. These caps will be white with a large red heart upon them, and with the name of the town from which the wearer hails printed upon the band.

Each town will be permitted to enter any special form of advertising in the parade that it may desire, so long as it does not conflict with the general scheme adopted for the district.

Exhibit space will be provided for each of the 17 Heart of Texas counties in the exhibit hall, and where there is more than one city or town in a county desiring to exhibit each will have space, but all exhibits from the same county will be grouped together.

Ballinger's delegation will be arranged for next week, it was stated following a meeting of the convention committee of the local chamber Friday.

This committee has appointed several teams to start a drive Monday morning to raise funds to send the Ballinger Booster Band to the convention. Ballinger's delegation will ride the special train to Fort Worth which is to pass through here from San Angelo.

Delegations from other towns in this section will also ride this special train.

## FARMERS PLAN MARCH ONTO G. O. P. MEET

CHICAGO, June 2.—Political leaders of the corn belt and adjoining states assembled here today to lay plans for the march of thousands of farmers on the Republican National Convention at Kansas City to demand farm relief legislation.

Representatives of fourteen states answered the call issued by M. J. Tobin, of Vinton, Iowa, Lowden supporter.

This movement includes the supporters of Gov. Lowden, Senators Watson of Indiana, and Curtis of Kansas.

They will demand the nomination of a mid-westerner for the presidency and the party pledge to make the tariff effective on farm products.

KANSAS CITY, June 2.—John McNab, of San Francisco, lifelong friend of Herbert Hoover, will place the secretary of commerce in nomination at the Republican National Convention, it was announced here today by James W. Good, Hoover manager.

## OTHER PLACES GET RAIN; BALLINGER GETS DUST

Ballinger received a fine "dust rain" late Friday afternoon, while several other places reported good showers and rains, according to press reports early today.

Brady probably received the best rain of any point in this section, but Santa Anna, Rockwood, Brownwood, Coleman and other towns reported precipitation.

SAN ANTONIO, June 2.—Adequate recognition of the American home-makers' intensive efforts to support the multi-lateral treaty outlawing war among the powers and endorsement of the calendar simplification were the outstanding recommendations of Mrs. John D. Sherman, president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs at today's session of the 19th biennial convention here.

The power to employ legal action against publications attacking the integrity of the federation was unanimously given by the 3,000 delegates present.

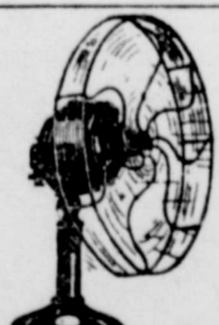
During the past week hundreds have visited this model home and inspected every nook and corner and examined the beautiful furnishings.

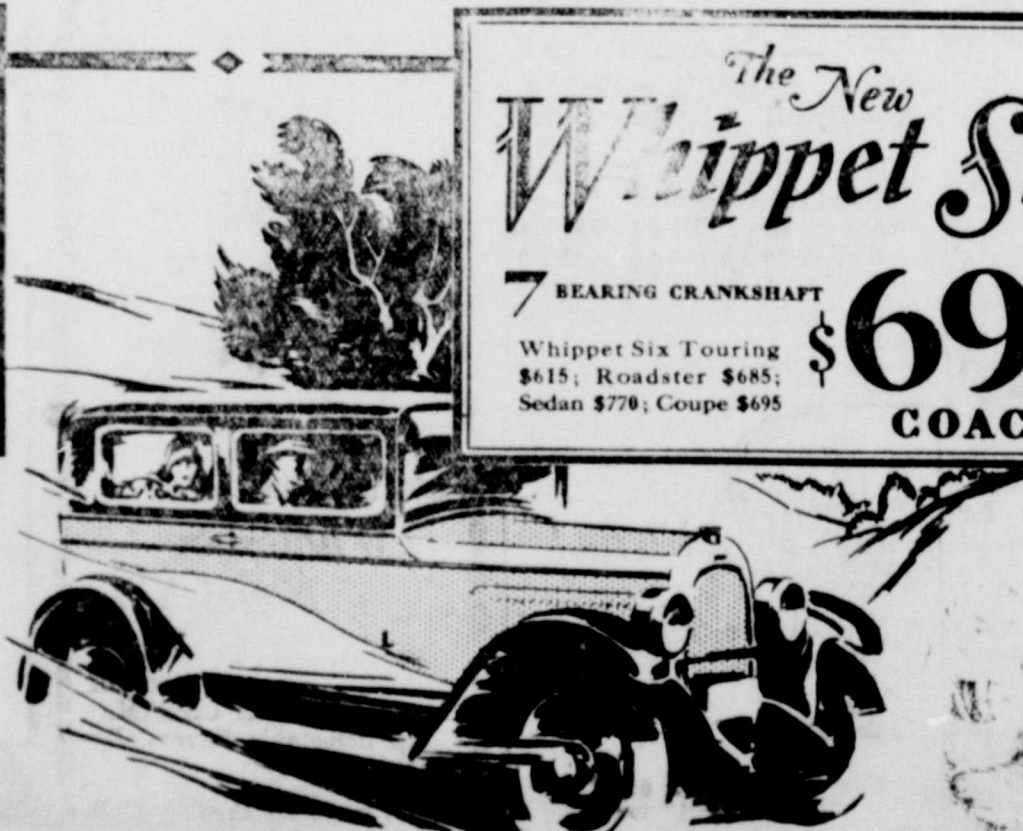

### WOLF CLUB TO PAY BOUNTY

June 1st marks the opening day for the \$10 bounty to be paid for each grown wolf killed in Runnels county, it was announced Friday morning by J. D. Motley, secretary and treasurer of the Runnels County Wolf Club, which was recently organized to rid this county of wolves and coyotes.

Ten dollars per green scalp will be paid for grown coyotes by the club, and \$1 will be paid by the Commissioners' Court. The club will also pay \$3 per scalp for wolf puppy scalps to July 1st, and after that date the bounty on the pups will be \$5.

The organization recently perfected has an executive board as follows: C. W. Lehmborg, president; Feb McWilliams, vice-president; Mr. Motley, secretary-treasurer; and Bob Corbell and William Parramore.

The members of this club have assessed themselves a tax of one cent per acre, and approximately \$1,000 has already been subscribed to the bounty fund. This embraces approximately 100,000 acres in Runnels county.

Sheepmen, cattlemen and turkey raisers are all members of this club and some of the ranchmen with cattle and sheep will pay between \$25 and \$5 for coyotes slain on their places, it was stated.
