

Handsome Stucco Bungalow Adapted to Fit Either Wide or Narrow Lot





This delightful stucco bungalow possesses many features that will recommend it to the prospective home builder. In the first place, it will fit almost any sort of a lot. The foundation dimensions are 261/2 by 45 feet and the nouse is so designed that it may be placed in either of two positions on the lot. This means that it is suitable either for a narrow lot or for a wide shallow one.

The construction is simple which makes for economy, and it may be either frame or masonry, as the stucco finish can be applied equally well over either. These days stucco colors of a wide variety and excellent quality are available so that the exterior can be finished to suit the individual taste, the surroundings and the neighboring

For the chimney an infinite number of colors and type of brick are available to fit the taste and also the pocketbook, and now that common brick has achieved artistic and architectural recognition, the cost need not be great. A tile roof is always a handsome covering on a house of this type. but clay tile is rather expensive for some. This need not be a hindrance, however, for cement tile and metal tile may be had these days which will serve admirably.

Large Portion of Waste

Space Found in Cellar The age of wasted and dingy cellars

has come to an end. There is no longer reason for valu able space lying idle in the nether domestic regions. The new jacketed sectional boilers, odorless and requiring a minimum of attention, slong with such improvements as the electric washers and ironers, have made possible a new era of widened family activity below stairs and increased in-

Modern bomes, with their compactness of structure, demand minute utilization of space. Architects know that the cost of a cellar is proportionately equal to that of any other part of the bullding. Yet the owner's return on this investment is too often disproportionately small, since the realty and rental valuation and the living comfort of the cellar are practically zero.

Statistics show that \$1,500,000,000 is invested annually in cellar construction. Only 40 per cent of this space is utidized for boiler, coal bins and faundry.

This means \$900,000,000 worth of space, unencumbered except for storeroom purposes, standing idle while the family does without room it actualty needs for work and recreation. Today an idle cellar is a real expense.

To meet this prohibitive costliness the modern cellar has appeared, a cel far flooded with sunlight through modern casement windows and made gay with paint. No longer need one be greeted, on descending the stairs, by damp odors and coal smoke proceeding from an ashy gloom. Tubs and coal now enjoy private compartments. There is adequate space for storage after a portion of the cellar has been

made livable. The inclusion of the cellar as an integral part of the home comes as windows so that a maximum amount the need grows for additional fiving space at the lowest possible cost Building a new room on the ground floor is an expense the average family will not consider at a cost that is slight, compared with the comfort derived and the saving achieved in labor and upkeep above ground.

Mirror Door Convenient

Accessory for Bedrooms Mirror doors offer a pleasant means by which the apparent size of a room may be increased, and are an accessory of genuine usefulness in the bedroom or bathroom. They fit in particularly well with the one-panel type of door which is frequently in formly used throughout the house in locations which do not require the mirror door.

If two adjacent closets are equipped with mirror doors and the intervening wall space filled with a mirror, a triple arrangement will be secured in which any series of reflections desired may be obtained. To secure this arrangement both doors must be hinged so that the swing is toward the mirror. Such an arrangement is particularly convenient in bedroom or dressing

New types of friction-control binges, recently developed, permit of opening door to any angle required; in perfect balance, drafts will not move it out of place. The breakage hazard in connection with the mirror door is lessened by use of these hinges as the free swing of the door is restricted. They also obviate the need for the usual baseboard stop which, when the door bangs against it, has a tendency to break the glass by springing the door out of shape.
