DECLARE SMITH IS SOLE HOPE OF DEMOCRATS

(By International News Service) HOUSTON, June 21.—The Democrats' sole hope for victory lies in the nomination of Al Smith. Behind this bulwark Smith forces are to take their stand, it was indicated today by George R. Van Namee, Smith pre-convention manager. Headquarters for the New York governor's cohorts were opened here Saturday. Word was passed along today that Smith leaders will not use "steam-roller" tactics in attempting to nominate the leading candidate.

TSO LIN DIES FROM WOUNDS

(By International News Service) TOKYO, June 21.—Gen. Chang Hsuegh Liang, son of Marshal Chang Tso Lin, announced today that his father died at 2 o'clock this morning from wounds received when the train in which he was fleeing from rebels at Peking was bombed near Mukden June 4. A three-days funeral service begins Saturday at Mukden, according to the announcement. Ira S. Glaze, of Darrrouzette, and O. B. Glaze, of Menard, were here on business Thursday.

RIOTS SUCCEED ASSASSINATION

(By International News Service) VIENNA, June 21.—A state of virtual martial law prevailed in Belgrade today as a result of the assassination of Deputy Paul Raditch and Deputy George Basaritch by a Montenegrin in the Yugoslavia Chamber of Deputies yesterday. Belgrade advices stated. Troops are patrolling the streets, and violent anti-government riots are occurring at Zagreb, a stronghold of the Croatian peasant party, of whom the dead deputies were leaders. Democratic members of the cabinet have offered to resign following the violence, it was rumored, which probably would result in the downfall of the ministry. All business houses in Belgrade are closed today.

LITTLE HOPE FOR WACOAN

(By International News Service) FT. WORTH, June 21.—William M. Ross, 23-year-old former Wacoan who was shot Tuesday night in a local hotel, is still unconscious, and little hope is held out for his recovery. Tom Knight, hotel detective, is charged with assault to murder, and is under a \$1,000 bond in connection with the case. BROWNFIELD—A new compress is being constructed here.

Urges Attendance to Cotton Council at New Orleans, La.

(By International News Service) AUSTIN, June 21.—George B. Terrell, commissioner of agriculture, gave out a statement yesterday urging all members of the Cotton Council, and all others interested in stabilizing the price of cotton to attend the meeting of the council in New Orleans, July 6th. The primary purpose of the organization is defined as follows: 1.—To stabilize the price and production of cotton. 2.—To coordinate the activities of all agencies and societies working to such purpose and to bring in common accord the several Southern States in the way of

uniform legislation when the same be needful or desired. "These purposes are very desirable and it is important that Texas be properly represented at this meeting," Terrell said. Declaring that Texas will have the largest representation of any state, Terrell said: "The different organizations and chambers of commerce entitled to representation should get busy and elect their members to serve on the permanent cotton council and be sure to attend the meeting at New Orleans, July 6. Much good can be accomplished if all agencies in the South, now striving to aid the farmers in establishing markets for cotton, work together."

Summer is ushered in today, spring died yesterday. The hours and minutes of daylight reach their maximum for the year in this section today; old sol's track across the sky begins to decline. Imperceptible is the shade of difference in the duration of succeeding days, but gradually we slip into longer nights. There is nothing of serious men to be deduced from this casual observation, other than that the loafer has more time to idle today than he will have on any other day this year.

As the aftermath of the assassination of a leader of a peasant party in Belgrade, the city has been thrown into martial law, and riots are threatening. The ministry has offered to resign, it is rumored, and the entire populace is thrown into a state of chaos. This is another episode of the long, universal struggle for democracy. The success of the American republics has held the attention of oppressed European nations for many years, and bitter struggles for like principles of government have ensued. The recurrence of outbreaks against corrupt rule causes one to ponder "what price democracy?" That the reward is well worth the sacrifices in attaining democracy is evident.

LYNCHING AT HOUSTON

Houston is shocked over the lynching that occurred there yesterday when a negro was taken from a hospital where he was being treated for wounds received in a shooting affray with

a detective which resulted in the murder of the latter. The sentiment of Houston is mirrored in a conspicuous editorial in the Houston Chronicle, which declared in part:

"Houston has been shamed before the nation. This revolting crime which has been committed in our midst comes to blacken the day of our joy and pride. To those democrats who pouring in on us, and to the world at large, we can only say that the people of Houston do not approve of this thing; the people of Texas do not approve of it.

"We have fought against the lynching evil wherever it raised its head. Out of the barbarous and corrupt days of reconstruction (days for which the Southern people take no responsibility) it came. Year by year, however, in the last generation, the evil has been curbed, and we had come to hope that it had been banished from Texas forever.

"The crime takes on more the aspects of private revenge than it does of the usual lynching, when hysteria-driven masses of people take the laws into their own hands.

"The crime is without excuse, and the responsibility of our law-enforcing officers for bringing the criminals to justice is great."

YOUTH SERVING JAIL SENTENCE

Burley Oxford, youth arrested Tuesday night on a farm 15 miles from here, where he fled after being released on a promise to appear to answer charges of theft June 11, entered a plea of guilty to formal charges of petty theft Thursday morning, and his fine was assessed as a jail sentence ranging from 25 to 30 days.

Oxford was charged with entering a farm house where he was employed and taking two rings and a watch. When he was interrogated he returned the stolen loot.

Young Oxford began his jail sentence Thursday.

CORPUS CHRISTI BONDS OF \$325,000 ARE APPROVED

NAME DEMOCRATIC HALL FOR GEN. SAM HOUSTON

HOUSTON, June 21.—The Democracy of the nation will gather here in Sam Houston Hall. The name of the new structure that will house the Democratic convention was changed to Sam Houston Hall at the suggestion of Clem Shaver, chairman of the Democratic National Committee.

A few minutes ride from the convention is the battleground of San Jacinto where Houston won the battle that established Texas' independence. Houston was a close friend of Andrew Jackson, patron saint of the Democratic party.

"Visitors who have been expecting to see a temporary building thrown up to house the convention will be surprised to see such a beautiful structure as the convention hall," Mr. Shaver said. "And it would be only fitting that the city should give the hall a name which will do it proper honor. I thought of Sam Houston, for he was the man who fought the battle of San Jacinto and won Texas independence," Shaver stated.

FLYNT CLOSING DEAL FOR FISH HATCHERY SITE

A site for a state fish hatchery, two miles north of Christoval, for which a tentative bargain is said to have been made, is now being considered before closing negotiations for the tract, according to an announcement by Jim Flynt, deputy game warden of the state fish, game, and oyster commission, of this city. Mr. Flynt has inspected the site and is favorably impressed with its advantages for an ideal location for a fish hatchery.

The water supply at the place under consideration is pure, adequate, and constant, coming from springs at the head of the South Concho River. The perpetual supply, with its purity, makes it ideal for the breeding and propagating of fish, Mr. Flynt said.

The San Angelo Board of City Development has supplied Mr. Flynt with a detailed survey of the proposed site, giving lines and contour levels, and Mr. Flynt expects to immediately lay the plans before Will J. Tucker, commissioner of the state commission. The decision of the state executive will be announced by Mr. Flynt as soon as he is advised.

In the event this site is suitable to the state commissioner, it was indicated that work on the hatchery will start immediately. A hatchery built on the Concho River would be the largest in the state, according to those closely associated in the project.

Surrounding land will be enhanced by the building of the fish hatchery, according to Mr. Flynt, who said that thousands of visitors will be attracted to this section because of the rivers be-

ing filled with fish that will afford both food and sporting pleasures.

The completion of this project will facilitate the stocking of streams around Ballinger with an abundant supply of fish, Mr. Flynt said, which has previously been impractical because of the remoteness from a fish hatchery.

LYNCHING OF NEGRO PROBED

HOUSTON, June 21.—City, county, and state officials united today in a far-reaching probe of the lynching of Robert Powell, 24-year-old negro taken from a city hospital and hanged from a bridge eight miles from the city.

Five state rangers led by Ranger Captain Frank Hamer, the grand jury, and a special committee representing the city council are engaged in the probe.

Two detectives who found the body will be called before the grand jury today.

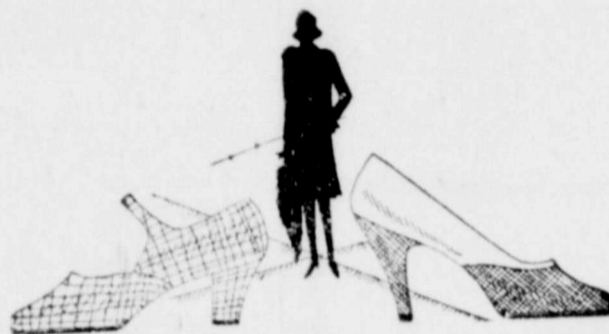
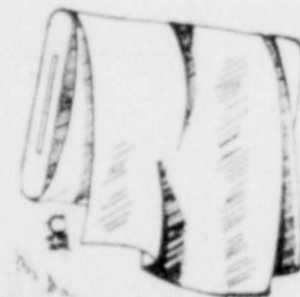

DR. BEEBE WILL CATCH SEA FISH FROM MILE DEEP

LONDON, June 21.—"Afraid of sharks? Not in the least! They are the most indolent, awkward, chinless cowards that infest the sea."

The speaker was Dr. William Beebe, the famous American scientist and explorer, and his derogatory opinion of these much-feared denizens of the deep was expressed in an interview with International News Service during a visit to this city.

"I have been in shark-infested waters," Dr. Beebe continued, "wearing only a diving helmet and a bathing suit. Never once has a shark attacked me. They were too cowardly."

Dr. Beebe, who is director of the tropical research department of the New York Zoological Society and the author of a number of books on exploration, was in

London completing preparations for a new venture in deep-sea research.

"At the end of this month," he said, "I intend to plunge into the mysteries of submarine life in the ancient gorge of the Hudson River, no more than 125 miles from New York city."

"There I shall dive a mile deep. The ocean conditions at that depth are practically the same all over the world. Through choosing the Hudson's gorge, we shall be able, at what may be called the doors of New York city, to get at any of the dwellers of the deep that are to be found almost anywhere in the world."

"A new feature of the work will be an effort to keep the deep-sea fish alive for exhibition in the New York Zoological Society's aquarium. They will be caught by special dredges, put under suitable water pressure in tanks, and rushed to New York."

"A new diving cylinder, in which it will be possible to study life at a mile below the surface, has been contrived, and one of the reasons I'm in London is to get for the cylinder glass that will withstand the great pressure of water at that depth."

requisite supply of oxygen, and there will be no connection with the surface except the cable. As I shall be using submarine detectors, I shall be able to communicate with those at the surface by tapping on the cylinder."

Dr. Beebe, whose expeditions to the Sargasso Sea and the Galapagos region of the Pacific have made naturalistic history, plans to start his Hudson River explorations immediately upon his return to the United States.

"I am convinced," he declared, "that what we shall find in the Hudson River will amaze those who erroneously believe that queer types of undersea life are found only in distant regions."
