Election for Consolidation at Lone Star

An election has been called for Saturday at Lone Star, rural school 22 miles north and east of here, for the purpose of determining two consolidation issues. Two moves have been under way for some time, one for consolidation with Content and the other with Crews.

Each voter will be allowed two votes, one on each issue. Provided a voter is opposed to consolidation, he will designate his opposition by voting against consolidation with each place.

Residents of the Lone Star community have been attempting to consolidate upon the action of the county school board through petitions. As two petitions were usually submitted at the same time, one favoring consolidation with Crews and the other with Content, the county board ruled that the issue should be settled by an election.

An additional school transportation bus will be provided in the event the election for consolidation carries, which is generally conceded.

Supplies for Primary are Stored Here

Election supplies for the various voting precincts are stored at the court house, and will be ready for distribution beginning Friday. Primary election managers are requested to call at the office of County Judge Paul Trimmer at their earliest convenience to obtain ballot boxes and supplies for their precincts.

Supplies are being distributed through the county judge's office because of the absence of County Chairman A. O. Strother, who is visiting in East Texas.

JUNIOR BAND MEETS SUNDAY

Members of the Junior Band and all who are interested in the move will meet at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon in the Farmers & Merchants Bank building for the purpose of having the instrumentation assigned and determining those who will require new instruments. H. H. Carsey, director, announced.

The tuition for instructions in the Junior Band has been placed at \$4 per month. "Anyone musically interested has the opportunity of learning to play a band and orchestra instrument at small cost," Mr. Carsey declared. "Supplement your boy or girl's education with a musical one, and in after years they will be grateful."

FINAL DAY TO FILE EXPENSES

Today is the last day on which county candidates can file expenses, County Clerk W. A. Forgey announced. This represents the second filing of expense accounts during the first primary, and the report will include expenses accounted in the first filing, together with those incurred since.

285 DELEGATES AT DRY PARLEY

(By International News Service) ASHEVILLE, N. C., July 19.—The conference of southern ultra-dry Democrats here to perfect plans for a revolt against the Democratic national ticket today settled down to the business of perfecting the organization of every state south of the Mason-Dixon line. There are 285 delegates registered here.

The only discord of the meeting came when E. O. Watson, of Columbia, S. C., and Dr. J. J. Gentry, of Spartanburg, walked out of the conference when their demand for the organization of a third party was turned down. They explained that in South Carolina that voting for the Republican presidential ticket meant voting for the entire state ticket of the party.

Enthusiastic delegates pledged \$5,000 from the floor to fight Smith, it was learned from a reliable source at the conclusion of the secret session. The fund is expected to reach hundreds of thousands when the campaign is extended.

The body adopted the name, "The Conference of Anti-Smith Democrats," and selected an executive committee composed of two members from each of thirteen southern states and the Philippines to cooperate with the policy committee.

Dr. A. J. Barton, Georgia Baptist leader, was named chairman of the executive committee, and Bishop James Cannon, of Richmond, secretary.

TILDEN DROPPED FROM CUP TEAM

(By International News Service) PARIS, July 19.—William T. Tilden, foremost figure of American lawn tennis of this generation, has been summarily dropped from the rolls of the Davis cup team. He is faced with charges preferred by the amateur rules committee and the Davis cup committee.

Tilden was notified today that he had been removed from the captaincy of the team, which position he had held for some time, and was virtually booted off the team. Charges preferred against him involve alleged violation of the player and writer agreement.

Joseph W. Rear, chairman of the Davis cup committee, told the International News Service that he was cabling his resignation in protest of ouster proceedings against Tilden.

NOTED LECTURER SPEAKS TONIGHT

Charles Watkins, of Muncie, Indiana, eminent lecturer and formerly in the sales promotion service of General Motors, will deliver an address on the court house lawn this evening, beginning after 8 o'clock. In connection with his lecture, a concert by the local band will be given.

The addresses of Mr. Watkins are most unique, in that he has no announced subject, but will talk upon any requested topic. He is a magnetic speaker, and thousands of people throughout the state who have heard him express unbounded compliments for the lecturer, Mr. Penland declared.

LARGE CROWD FIVE ABSENTEE AT DALE MEET VOTES TO DATE

A large crowd attended a community social at Dale Wednesday night, the program being similar to that of a number of other communities sponsoring entertainments for the purpose of raising funds for the A. & M. College short course trip. Refreshments were sold throughout the evening. Several county candidates attended.

A social will be conducted at Crews tonight, and one at Bethel tomorrow night, concluding the series scheduled for this week. Four or five will be given in as many communities next week, County Agent C. W. Lehmburg announced, terminating the program of the 4-H clubs of the county prior to leaving for the short course.

All persons, as well as all club members, who expect to attend the short course are urged to notify Mr. Lehmburg or Mrs. Lara Hollingsworth, home demonstration agent, as soon as possible, so that reservations can be made in advance. Unless a fair estimate of the approximate number to attend is available, it is likely that accommodations will be lacking, it was pointed out.

Under regulations prescribed for absentee voting, an elector who is to be away from his voting precinct for some time must make written application for a ballot not more than 20 nor less than 10 days preceding the date of election. A voter who is in the city in which he votes until near the date of the election, but who is to be absent at the time of the primary, is permitted to cast his ballot with the county clerk not more than 10 nor less than 3 days preceding the election.

FLIERS ORDERED ABANDON SEARCH

(By International News Service) LONDON, July 19.—Swedish airmen searching for marooned members of the Noble expedition and stranded searchers have been ordered by their government to abandon rescue work and return home, according to a Central News Agency dispatch from Stockholm this afternoon.

(By International News Service) MEXICO CITY, July 19.—Determined that the policies of the late President-elect Obregon shall govern Mexico under the powerful guidance of President Plutarco Calles, the Obregonista faction of the Mexican congress will meet today for the purpose of drawing up a resolution which they claim will legally permit Calles to remain in office for two more years.

MEXICO CITY, July 19.—Obregonistas intend to use a constitutional amendment passed last year giving future presidents a six-year term instead of four years, to which Elias Plutarco Calles was elected. As the amendment stands it fails to mention the date when it shall be effective.

Obregonistas intend to rush through congress a transitory article to the amendment, inserting the date for it to become of force and effect as of November 30, 1928. Calles' term expires December 1. This would give him two additional years.

SOLDIERS AND POLICE CLASH

(By International News Service) HAVANA, July 19.—Virtual martial law prevails at Santiago de Cuba today following a fight between police and soldiers in which one policeman was killed and many on both sides were wounded. The trouble apparently began when soldiers jeered a police sergeant.

RICH DENVER GENTS ADOPT NEW RULE TO FISH ON HIGH LEVEL

(By International News Service) DENVER, July 19.—Spinner and bait fishing have been ruled out as ways and means of catching a mess of rainbow trout by the largest, oldest, and most wealthy fishing club in the state of Colorado—The Wigwam.

Hereafter, the club members and their guests will fish with nothing but artificial flies, thus, they claim, putting the angling art on a higher level, at least. This method, it is claimed, gives the fish a fighting chance to evade the hook.

Membership in the club, which is limited to seventy-five, mostly wealthy Denver men, voted unanimously for the new measure. At the same time the club voted to toss back into the water all fish under eight inches long. The state game laws legalize fish over seven inches long.

BUDAPEST, July 19.—Rejuvenation treatment was seldom as successful as in the case of 70-year-old Wilhelm Buzetti, former musician, for many years an inmate of the Budapest almshouse. Buzetti, whose trembling hands were unable to hold the violin before the rejuvenation operation, and whose only interest in life were meals and sleep, became a passionate musician once more. He played on his violin from early morning to late in the evening, quarrelled with his "senile environment," which protested against his merry noisiness, and made love to all pretty women he met. One day Buzetti disappeared from the almshouse. As he failed to show up for several days, the police were informed. The investigation brought a surprising result. Old young Buzetti lived with a young girl in a small Budapest hotel, he gave music lessons, and resolved never to become old again. He plans even to emigrate and to start a new life.

AIR TRANSPORT MAKES U. S. MAP SIZE OF TEXAS

(By International News Service)
CHICAGO, July 19.—Air transport has shrunk the map of the United States to the size of Texas when you measure America in terms of transportation time. New York is more than twice as near to San Francisco as Washington, D. C., was to Philadelphia when the constitution was framed. American Air Transport Association officials predict that the transportation of mail, express and passengers at 100 miles an hour will work as revolutionary changes in our business and social habits as the automobile did when it replaced the horse drawn vehicle. Transportation and communication have been the yard-stick by which all nations have measured progress. In America the first transportation was the Indian runner, followed by the pony express, then the stage coach, then the railroad, the auto, and now the airplane. Transport's expert has estimated that in a twelve-

hour period the following distance will be traversed: By team and wagon—20 miles; pedestrian—25 miles; horseback rider—35 miles; motor stage—300 miles; train—480 miles; airplane—1,200 miles. Today air mail companies are carrying mail, express and passengers between New York and the Pacific Coast cities in 32 hours. Communication and travel time between New York and Atlanta has been reduced from 24 hours by train to 10 hours by air mail; between St. Louis and St. Paul from 18 to 8 hours. These savings are only illustrative of the greater speed of air transport over the trains in all parts of the country. The Fathers of the Republic who complained that Washington was too far west to be the capital of the United States because it took five days to go by stage from Philadelphia to Washington and who predicted there never would be transportation over the Alleghenies, never dreamed mail would be transported from Philadelphia to traverse that distance in hours as it took days for the meeting of the confederation of states. Air mail, the backbone of commercial aviation, has even greater achievements ahead than its pre-

ent day record of 100 miles an hour transport of mail, passengers and express.

14 INDICTED BY TAYLOR COUNTY GRAND JURY

ABILENE, July 19.—Fourteen indictments, including three charging misdemeanors, were returned late yesterday by the grand jury for 42nd district court, following three days of work during which 50 witnesses were examined. Six of the bills charged forgery, two illegal possession of liquor, one for felony swindling and one for felony theft, in addition to a bill charging A. F. Lewallen with carrying saws into the jail to aid a prisoner charged with a felony. Five indictments for forgery were returned against Boyd Nanney, who is in custody. Names of others charged in the indictments were withheld pending arrests and arraignment.

RADIO SIGNALS MOVE LICK OBSERVATORY'S POSITION 70 FEET

(By International News Service)
 SAN FRANCISCO, July 19.—Lick Observatory on Mount Hamilton had entirely the wrong longitudinal address until radio came along and found just where it lived.
 In fact had you been directing someone to the home of the stargazers by degrees of longitude and latitude before the days of wireless, he would have ended up .065 seconds off course or some

seventy feet down the street. However, in November, 1926, astronomers all over the world got busy about this situation and radio time signals were sent out from stations all around the globe.

Annapolis and Honolulu were the two places most successfully recorded by H. M. Jeffers, assistant astronomer of Lick Observatory, and the signals from both of these observatories, after Prof. Jeffers had studied them carefully, convinced him that his telescope was not exactly in the spot he thought it was.

The new radio determination of longitude of the observatory gave a position of eight hours, six minutes and 34.96 seconds

west from Greenwich. Checking back Professor Jeffers discovered that the position determined in 1897 by other methods was eight hours, six minutes and 34.895 seconds.

So a University of California bulletin which revealed the discovery, warns the radio listener who growls at a sour tenor, to remember that he has something to be thankful for.

SOVIET DOCTORS KILL EIGHT PATIENTS WITH POISON CHLOROFORM

(By International News Service)
 MINSK, Russia, July 19.—Poisoned chloroform administered by amateur doctors killed eight patients in three weeks at the Proskenov village hospital. The health department's suspicions were aroused only after repeated deaths followed slight operations.

Investigation disclosed that the regular doctors rarely reported for duty at the hospital. Patients were treated by students and

nurses and even by fellow patients dressed up in the doctors' white uniforms. Members of the staff had only a vague knowledge of chemistry and the compounding of prescriptions, and frequently when the doctors did appear and order certain drugs, pure water containing a little coloring matter was administered.

Only the eight deaths from bad anaesthetic have been directly traced, but it is believed that the unusually high death rate in the hospital during recent months is the result of frequent similar poisonings and neglect.

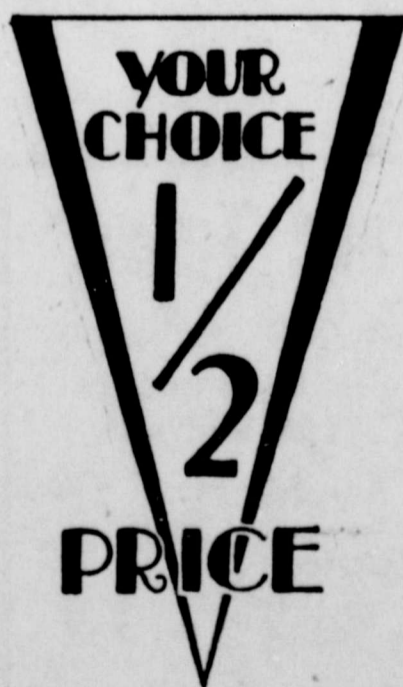
