600 CHINESE ARE REPORTED KILLED

(By International News Service)
LONDON, July 23.—Six hundred Chinese nationalist troops are reported killed, fighting with the Japanese along the Tsingtao-Tsinanfu Railway in Shantung Sunday, according to an unconfirmed dispatch from Tsingtao.

A Peking dispatch to the London Daily Telegraph reports that the nationalist government has broken off relations with Japan.

Several American sailors were slightly wounded at Chefoo during a clash between nationalists and the body guard of Gen. Chang Thung Chang, according to Shanghai advices.

ZAPPI CHARGED OF PILLAGING

MOSCOW, July 23.—Sensational charges that Capt. Zappi, one of the survivors of the Italia tragedy, not only abandoned Dr. Finn Malmgren, Swedish scientist and professor, but also partially stripped him of clothing, were made today by a correspondent of the Moscow newspaper Verchernie.

The correspondent is now aboard the Russian ice breaker Krassin, which rescued Zappi and Captain Mariano from an ice floe. He claims that Zappi wore Dr. Malmgren's overcoat and heavy woolen socks when rescued.

LONDON, July 23.—Rumors were current today that Captain Mariano, rescued survivor of the Nobile expedition, has died as a

result of long exposure to Arctic weather.

BERLIN, July 23.—General Umberto Nobile, leader of the ill-fated polar expedition, may be taken across Europe to Italy in a sealed railway car to prevent interviews, according to a Stockholm dispatch today, quoting Swedish newspapers.

Nobile and other members of the Italia's crew have been summoned home by Mussolini.

OBREGON ASSASSIN HAS MADE FULL CONFESSION

MEXICO CITY, July 23.—Gen. Antonio Rios Zertuche, police chief of the Federal District, declared today that Jose De Leon Toral has made a full confession regarding his assassination of General Alvaro Obregon, president-elect.

Manuel Trejo, who is accused of furnishing the pistol with which the president-elect was killed, is said to be trying to make his way to the United States. Zertuche said that the Catholic clergy is cooperating fully with the police in the investigation.

Luis Morones, who resigned as minister of labor yesterday, is in hiding today, but policemen said

that they knew his whereabouts. Zertuche refused to divulge the confession, saying that it was necessary to make further investigation before it could be published.

WASHINGTON, July 23.—Leaders of the Obregonista bloc of the Mexican congress today expressed belief at Mexico City that bloodshed and possibly attempted revolt have been avoided by the forced resignation of Minister of Labor Luis Morones and two minor officials from the Calles cabinet.

Morones, head of the regional Confederation of Mexican Labor,

A FULL WEEK

The Texas Democratic primary will not hold all of the attention next week. Judging from the capital involved, the Tunney-Heeney title match is of vaster importance than the election. At present the bout does not bid to command the spectacular attention accorded the Dempsey-Tunney fight. But the press agents are on the job, and considerable can happen, or be represented as having happened, before the date of the tilt.

A gambling card drawn up by promoters offers a variety of points on which to bet. Aware that an election campaign is in progress in Texas, the promoters injected a particular gambling feature, labelled 'Texas Special.' This is described as a one-to-one wager that Moody will lead Wardlaw by 200,000 votes.

The good road project hearing

will follow close on the heels of the primary, and it is an event that is commanding a great deal of interest. Before heckling over the results of the election has subsided, the voters of the county will meet here to go into the proposal to vote bonds for the construction of needed roads.

No discouraging speculations concerning the outcome of the good roads hearing have yet been made. Most people express no fears that the voters will heartily endorse calling a bond election.

Every voter should read the transcript of the call for a hearing, to familiarize himself with the status of the move. The question is one of great importance, and its solution will carry results of paramount effect.

TWO AUTOS DAMAGED IN COLLISION NEAR HATCHEL ON SUNDAY

The Whippet six cabriolet owned by Harry Midgley and a Ford car driven by a Mexican were badly wrecked when they crashed on the highway between Hatchel and Winters Sunday afternoon. Midgley and Bill Wimers were driving toward Winters, and the Mexican was approaching them, keeping well to the right side of the road, it was stated. When the two cars were within a few yards of each, the

Mexican's automobile swerved sharply to the right, a head-on collision resulting.

No casualties resulted to the occupants of the cars, which were both badly damaged. The Mexican driver declared that he was at a loss to understand how his car cut to the right, and Midgley was unable to avoid a crash, altho he skidded his car for some distance when the other machine cut in front of his.

BLANTON DECRIES RECEPTION HERE

Chagrined because of only a meager audience, and disappointed because of what he termed inadequate preparations on the part of Ballinger citizens to accord him a proper welcome, Congressman Thomas L. Blanton, of Abilene, senatorial candidate, delivered a pointed address in the district court room here Saturday night. The audience would not exceed fifty persons, and the fiery congressman talked only about ten minutes.

Referring to his addresses during the day at Brownwood and Coleman, Mr. Blanton declared that his Ballinger reception was in striking contrast to that accorded him in the other cities, where he was greeted by large and enthusiastic assemblies. The congressman touched briefly upon his official record, and launched upon a tirade of denunciatory remarks, aimed at those responsible for arrangements for his address here.

Addressing the audience, he stated that he held too much consideration for his hearers, whom he termed "my good friends," to expect them to sit through a speech in the dimly lighted and stuffy court room. He expressed consternation that such treatment would be meted him in his own congressional district, which he has "faithfully and efficiently served."

Prior to his address, Mr. Blanton indulged in a thrust at one of his opponents, Tom Connally. "Champ Clark was right," he warmly stated, "when he said that the more a man did for his people, the less appreciation they show. That man (pointing to Connally's placard in a display window) has done nothing in congress, yet his picture is in every show window in Ballinger. R. E. White, county superin-

tendent, introduced Congressman Blanton, who appeared weary and fatigued from the strenuous campaign which he has been conducting, and in which he has filled more than 220 speaking engagements.

WOMAN MURDER TRIAL BEGINS

trial of Mrs. W. W. Waybourn, 48-year-old widow charged with slaying her husband, retired railroad employe, that the slain man carried five insurance policies, totalling \$10,000.

WHITE BOY AND NEGRO HELD ON FEDERAL CHARGE

Glynn Barrington, Winters youth, and Singleton Greenwood, negro, are in the county jail here pending the arrival of a federal inspector in charge at Austin, who has been summoned to investigate the case in connection with which they were arrested. County Attorney C. P. Shepherd notified the federal officer to appear at once as soon as it was determined that the nature of the case, which involves suspicious methods of obtaining and passing a check, was not in the jurisdiction of the county or district courts.

A. J. Richards, Wingate farmer, wrote a check for \$35.68 on the Ballinger State Bank on July 14, payable to J. J. Martin, of Norton, from whom he had purchased seed for planting. Richards placed the check in an envelope, which he left in Martin's mail-box. Several days later the latter informed Mr. Richards that he had not received the check which was to have been mailed to him. Presuming that the check was lost, Mr. Richards wrote another check, which was paid at the Ballinger bank.

Prior to this time, Rufus Smith, for whom the imprisoned negro was working, presented the check, which bore no indorsement. The negro represented he had won the check in a gambling game, and asked him to cash it. Mr. Smith stated. The bank declined to accept the check, in the absence of an indorsement. Mr. Smith returned it to the negro, he said.

A few days later the check was deposited for collection in a Winters bank by Glynn Barrington. The check bore no indorsement this time, with the exception of the signature of Barrington. The bank reported the case to Sheriff R. E. McWilliams, who arrested Barrington and the negro.

The negro contends that he

won the check in a gambling game, and that Barrington in turn won it from him. On the contrary, Barrington maintains that the negro owed him for gasoline and oil, and some money which he had lent him. The negro advised him to cash the check and withhold the amount of his indebtedness, according to Barrington.
