## A BASIC SOCIAL PRINCIPLE

"Society requires certain public activities," said President Coolidge recently, "like highways and drainage, which are used in common, and can best be provided by the government. But in general the country is best served through the competition of private enterprise. If the people are to remain politically free, they must be economically free. Their only hope in that direction is for them to keep their own business in their own hands."

The desire for gain is a powerful motivating force for mankind. The instinct of self-preservation is one of the strongest, and without a promise of reward for effort, as under our present economic order, productive work would be minimized. Our economic status is undergoing remarkable change, but it is a natural business evolution, occasioned by recent discoveries and new economies. The element of accumulation is still clear-cut in our present scheme.

## CLOSE ELECTION MAY RESULT IN DIRECT SYSTEM

(By International News Service)

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—A closely contested and bitterly fought presidential election this year may precipitate demands for changes in the nation's political system far more important than the choosing of a chief executive for another four years from next March 4.

Direct election of president and reappointment of Congress bringing with it a new distribution of electoral votes, already are being suggested with renewed emphasis on the eve of the formal opening of campaign hostilities.

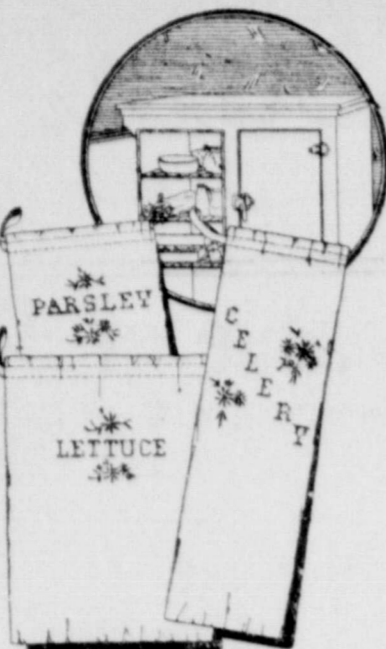
Should either Gov. Al Smith or Herbert Hoover be placed in the White House on next March 4 without receiving a majority of all the votes cast for presidential electors, which is possible under the electoral college system, demands for a change are sure to be made in the next session of Congress.

Many presidents have been elected by less than a majority of votes and the injection of the European bloc system into the political structure of the nation has been avoided only by the continued dominance of the Republican and Democratic parties. Should the Socialist or Farmer-Labor parties rise to an eminence where they could command many millions of votes the unique electoral college system would be brought more forcibly before the people.

With electoral votes apportioned man for man among the states on the basis of congressional representation many inequalities are certain to be reflected in presidential returns. The system, however, has been defended on the ground that it is the keystone of the representative system of government as distinguished from a pure democracy.

An elector in Nevada represents 22,000 votes while one in New York represents approximately 220,000. Each state is voted as a unit, and therefore it is just as effective for a presidential candidate to carry a state by one vote as it is to carry it by 500,000. This system makes it

## SALAD SAVERS



The secret of appetizing salads is mostly having the vegetables fresh and crisp. As soon as they are delivered, lettuce, celery, radishes, parsley and the like should be put in cold water and allowed to freshen. Then remove any withered leaves and cut out imperfections. Put them in refrigerator bags such as are shown here and set them on the ice. When you are ready to make the salad, they will be delightfully crisp but not dripping wet as they would be if you waited till then to prepare them.

A single used flour bag will make a set of four refrigerator bags. Remove the stamping by covering the pieces with lard or kerosene. Let it stay overnight and then wash in kerosene water. Sew the bags up the side and turn down an inch and a half hem. Stitch this around again half an inch from the edge to form a casing for the tape. The lettuce bag should measure about 10x11 inches when finished, the celery bag, 7x11 inches and the parsley or radish bag 7x10.

They may be made more attractive by some simple design worked in outline stitch, or with the name of the article worked in cross-stitch.

The bags should be thoroughly washed after each time of use but ironing is superfluous.

possible for a candidate to carry enough states by a small margin to finish the necessary electoral votes, while the unsuccessful candidate might gain great majorities in some other states which would give him the greater popular vote.

Added to the disproportion is the failure of Congress to reapportion congressional representation since 1911, although the constitution requires reapportionment every ten years. In the recent fight on reapportionment in Congress it was shown that the representation in Congress of 34 states would be effected by a new division based upon the most recent census. The electoral vote also would change.

Any reapportionment, it is pointed out, must necessarily give more power to the great cities which have increased so rapidly in population. Some historians believe that the electoral vote division, like representation in the Senate, was intended to check the possibility of sectional control of national affairs.

Many presidents, among them Woodrow Wilson and Grover Cleveland, received less than a majority of the total votes cast. Abraham Lincoln was re-elected by 55 per cent of the popular vote but with 90 per cent of the electoral vote.

The late Sen. La Follette urged a constitutional amendment to permit popular election of presidents and Sen. George Norris of Nebraska has announced that he will devote much time to bringing this about. No third party can gain a foothold so long as the electoral college system exists, according to Norris.

## A State Fair Crowd



The grounds of the State Fair of Texas are so large and the streets so wide that even on the biggest days the place never seems to be crowded unless the people are attracted to some one particular spot.

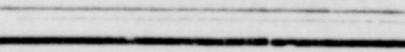

## England's 'Henry Ford' Plans New Car to Get World Market

LONDON, Aug. 7.—W. R. Morris, the 'Henry Ford of England,' is completing plans for an attempt to capture the Empire markets in competition against American motor car producers.

He is planning to build a car which will approximate closely what has become known here as the "American type" of automobile, but it will not have the big bore engine.

The car will be a compromise in its power unit between the American big bore engine and the British small bore, high speed engine. As to body work, it is declared, the machine will compare favorably with \$1,500 grade American car.

**The Daily**  
**North Carolina**  
**Leads Tobacco**  
**States In East**

(By International News Service)  
 RELEIGH, N. C., August 7.—With the opening of the tobacco season in the Southeastern states just around the corner, agricultural experts expect to see North Carolina again lead the nation in production of the golden weed.  
 In the 1927-28 season North Carolina exceeded its record for former years by nearly 100,000,000 pounds. In the past season 470,469,301 pounds were marketed in the warehouses of this state. The preceding year only 371,578,758 pounds were produced.

**Speculate on Price**  
 Speculation, however, rested principally upon the price of the weed this season. White reports show that the cigarette consumption of the world is increasing. North Carolina, the largest cigarette-tobacco area in the world—has been reaping a steadily increasing yield in recent years.

Last year saw a slight decline in the price average for the tobacco sold in the state. The price was \$22.00 per hundred pounds, compared with \$23.50 for the preceding year.

The earliest tobacco belt to start the auction season in the southeast is the Georgia belt, which will begin operation August 1st, one day earlier than last year. One week later the South Carolina belt opens.

**Eastern Opening**  
 The biggest belt of the entire area opens on August 28 in Eastern North Carolina. The United States Tobacco Association set this date, although many petitions were sent them, asking for an even earlier opening. As it stands, the opening is 12 days earlier than the 1927-28 opening.

The Middle Belt of North Carolina—another big belt—starts the ball to rolling on September 11, eleven days earlier than last season. The Old Belt of North Carolina, which includes some of the border markets in Virginia, opens the season on September 25, ten days earlier than last year.

**CONGRESS WILL**  
**MAKE U. S. 'SAFE'**  
**FOR PROSPERITY**

By William S. Neal  
 (International News Service Staff Correspondent)

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—Congress will be confronted with the task of "making the country safe for prosperity" in its next session.

While similar proposals have been numerous in the past, they have lacked the powerful support necessary to place them in the forefront of legislation. Now, Senator Wesley Jones, chairman of the Senate commerce committee, has proposed to secure action.

Jones' plan is based upon the idea that it is foolish for the government, whose credit is good at all times, to spend huge sums in internal improvements while the country is in prosperous condition. He would create a huge reserve fund to be used when statistical information reveals a real slack in industry.

**Expected Support**  
 Other members of congress who made similar suggestions, it is known, are hopeful of obtaining serious consideration of their measures.

The success of the present federal building program, which really got well under way at a time when many cities were catching up with their building needs in the post-war period, is believed to be responsible for an increasing sentiment for the plan.

With a bill already reported and on the Senate calendar, it is believed that business of the short session will be so light that the measure can be given preferred status.

"Industrial depression seems to come and go in cycles," explained Senator Jones. "Why, we may not exactly know. Their prevention is most desirable and any action that will retard or prevent their recurrence will be beneficial to everybody and to every industry. One of the greatest evils from these depressions is unemployment."

"There are many governmental activities that can employ labor if they can be so directed as to furnish increased employment when an industrial depression is threatened or is under way the result must be good."

**Advance Planning**  
 "The principle of advance plan-

ning of public works so that expenditures may be made to influence in a good way employment conditions in the country has been accepted by all who have given it serious thought. Its application by the federal government will encourage municipal and state governments to apply it in their activities. The result locally will be good and far reaching."

Among the proposed federal appropriations, to be spent when contracts for construction work have fallen 10 per cent for a three-month period, below the average of the corresponding three-month period, are \$75,000,000 for good roads, \$50,000,000 for rivers and harbor work, \$15,000,000 for special public buildings.

**Boston Churches**  
**In 3 Year Study**  
**of Youngs Need**

(By International News Service)  
 BOSTON, August 7.—A three-year program for the churches in Massachusetts has been laid out by the Massachusetts Federation of Churches for the purpose of studying such secular matters as home life, social activities of the young and general education.

The program will culminate in 1930 in what is known in England as "COPEC"—Conference of Christian Politics, Economics and Citizenship. Courses of study dealing with various phases of vital topics have been distributed to different church groups.

Any group may choose a particular subject and by discussion and research, eventually prepare a report which will be considered as the best judgment of its particular church. These findings will be filed with results from other church groups, and finally all will come before the "Copec" in 1930, at the conference of all the churches.

Many current matters and topics will thus be considered and weighed by thoughtful people and the final report will be published as a general expression of the soundest Christian thought in the commonwealth of Massachusetts.

This report will be the contribution of all the churches to the tercentenary celebration of the city of Boston.

**To Cut Fire Loss**  
**In U. S. By Using**  
**New Safety Match**

(By International News Service)

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—Matches which "go out" as soon as they serve their useful purpose are the objective of an interesting research in progress at the Bureau of Standards as a part of the government's campaign to cut down the country's enormous fire loss.

A half million matches are used in the United States every minute. If they burned out as soon as they served their purpose, a considerable gain in fire safety would result, according to bureau experts.

Scientists have been conducting tests with matches whose stems are inflammably coated within half an inch of the heads. To determine what length of match stem is necessarily burned up in the ordinary uses to which matches are put, bureau experimenters noted the time required to light lamps, lanterns, cigarettes, cigars and pipes.

Cigars and pipes require from 6 to 14 seconds for satisfactory lighting, with an average of 10 seconds.

Matches held with the stems horizontal or with the head slanting upward, which are the usual positions in which burning matches are held, required on the average about 30 seconds before the stems were consumed or flaming ceased. It can be assumed that the margin in time of burning or length of stem burned between this limit and what is required for ordinary lighting purposes causes most of the fires attributable to matches.

**GETS THRILLS IN EUROPE**

PARIS, Aug. 7.—"I can get more thrills from my bicycle than many of the fliers who are spanning the oceans," declared Harriet L. Williams, a Toledo, Ohio, girl who left Paris by bicycle for

Tunis by way of Gibraltar.

This is not her first long trip. Last year she crossed the Alps twice, cycling from Paris to Rome. She has also toured every corner of South and Central America. Northern Africa is what she wants to see and paint this time. For Miss Williams is a first-rate artist and whenever she sees a little scene she likes, she gets off and paints it. Her baggage consists of a tiny pack with pencils, brushes, paints and paper and as few clothes as it is possible to get along with.

**Labor Experts Worry Over**  
**Unemployment in Industries**

(By International News Service)

LONDON, Aug. 7.—England's daily growing army of unemployed is attracting the serious at-

tention of labor experts, who point out that, with 1,217,500 persons unemployed at the moment, there are really eight million people on the poverty line in the country.

Unemployment figures published weekly by the Ministry of Health have shown startling increases of late, the figures rising in less than one month from 1,162,500 to 1,217,500.

Coal mining, pottery, boot and shoe, wool textiles, jute, tinplate, and shipbuilding are the industries most seriously affected, the figures show.

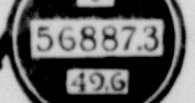
