## Fifteen Nations Sign Treaty To Outlaw War

(By International News Service)  
PARIS, Aug. 27.—Through the signing of the multi-lateral treaty renouncing military force as an instrument of national policy, fifteen nations, representing two-thirds of the world's fighting power, agreed today never again to go to war. The rest of the world was invited to take the same pledge.

The scene of the historic event was the Salles des Horloges, in the French foreign office, where the League of Nations was born, under the sponsorship of Woodrow Wilson. The pact is regarded in Europe as the most powerful and far reaching step yet taken to abolish war and insure universal peace.

Frank B. Kellogg, American secretary of state, was one of the outstanding figures of the conference. Next to him stood Aristide Briand, French foreign minister, who had originally proposed an anti-war treaty.

The pen that was used 150 years ago in signing a treaty of friendship between France and the United States was used to sign the anti-war treaty. Germany was first to sign. Secretary Kellogg signed for the United States.

Representatives of the following countries also signed: Great Britain (signed also for India and North Ireland), Belgium, France, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, Union of South Africa, Irish Free State, Italy, Japan, Poland and Czechoslovakia.

## Late Returns Do Not Alter Primary Result

DALLAS, Aug. 27.—Sunday's tabulations of returns failed to change the results of the Saturday primary, as announced by the Texas Election Bureau at 1 o'clock Sunday morning. Returns from 215 counties, including 75 complete, show the following totals:

Senator: Connally, 290,549; Mayfield, 235,276.  
Superintendent of Public Instruction: Garner, 215,540; Marrs, 288,640.

Land Commissioner: Robison, 314,767; Terrell, 177,812.  
Court of Civil Appeals, 11th District: Funderburk, 23,900; Patterson, 20,541.

Congress, 17th District: Callaway, 20,690; Lee, 25,518.

Twenty-one counties where elections are supposed to have been held have sent in no returns. While fewer than a hundred of the reported counties are listed as complete, it is evident that nearly as many more are practically complete.

## BERLIN SUMMER SCHOOL ATTRACTS AMERICANS

BERLIN, Aug. 27.—Americans from many sections of the union are attending the summer course for Americans at the University of Berlin. The summer course opened in the impressive new aula of the university in the presence of representatives of the foreign office, the different ministries and other distinguished guests. The president of the university, Dr. Norden, greeted the new students, emphasizing the value of internationalism in science.

A number of American professors have been co-operating with the German Institute for Foreigners at the University of Berlin; among them, Professor Del Manzo of Teachers College, Columbia University; Professor Busse, of Hunter College; Professor Schreiber, of Yale; Professor Schuchard, of New York University.

## Storm Inflicts Heavy Damages

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Ia., Aug. 27.—Three are known to be dead and a score or more were injured, several probably fatally, and property damage was estimated at a half million dollars in the storm that swept southern Iowa yesterday, according to a survey made today.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Aug. 27.—Property damage resulting from the storm striking here yesterday is estimated at a quarter-million dollars.

## Season On Doves Opens Sept. 1st

The dove season opens Saturday, September 1st, Warden Jim Flynt of the state game, fish, and oyster commission announces. The limit that may be bagged in one day is fifteen, Mr. Flynt said. The season continues for three months.

The squirrel season opens on October 1st, and closes three months later, he said.

## CONFERENCE TO DISCUSS SEWAGE DISPOSAL MEANS

AUSTIN, Aug. 27.—Failure on the part of a number of Texas cities to properly operate their sewage disposal plants has brought down upon the heads of those municipalities a flood of damage suits, if possible to do so, a one day's conference of city officials, chemists and distinguished sanitary engineers is being held in Cleburne today. Cleburne is one of the cities that has been a sufferer from the damage suit pest.

Dr. J. C. Anderson, state health officer, is present for the meeting.

T. B. Simms, sewage plant operator, and City Commissioner Taylor of Cleburne, have devised an attachment that reduces the odor by means of vacuum degasification. It is the purpose of the experts to make a careful investigation of the workings of the device, so that it may be recommended to other cities to use.

## Five Believed Drowned After N.Y. Cloudburst

ELLENVILLE, N. Y., Aug. 27.—Floods resulting from a cloudburst in Ulster and Sullivan counties were today believed to have taken a toll of at least five lives. The property damage is tremendous.

Many bridges were washed away, and communication with a number of villages has been cut off. At least twenty persons are reported missing.

It is feared that the toll may be greater when authentic figures can be ascertained. Rescuers saved 35 boys stranded on an island.

## To Concentrate Campaign In 6 Eastern States

The governor thinks that the real battle ground is in the East, and he may not wage an intensive campaign in the Middle West. He will not campaign the border states, it was stated.

## Begin Probe Of Subway Wreck

NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—A formal investigation to fix the responsibility of an accident in a subway here in which a hundred passengers were injured and a number killed will be opened today by District Attorney Banton.

W. E. Baldwin, switchman at the station near where the wreck occurred, was arrested Saturday on a homicide charge.

## Santa Fe Wreck Hinders Traffic

Traffic over the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe is crippled today as the result of a freight train wreck three miles southeast of San Angelo at 6:30 o'clock this morning. Five cars were upturned when a faulty derail interfered with passage. A work train was dispatched to the scene of the wreck shortly after noon today, and efforts will be made to have the track clear by tonight.

Orient trains were being routed from San Angelo over the Santa Fe, traffic over that road having been blocked by a wreck between San Angelo and Sweetwater Sunday. Two Orient passenger trains had passed through here before the Santa Fe wreck.

No casualties were reported in either wreck.

## READY TO AWARD ROAD MACHINERY CONTRACTS

AUSTIN, Aug. 27.—The state board of control now is ready to take up the proposition of awarding a half million dollars worth of contracts for the purchase of highway machinery and equipment, according to Dr. H. H. Harrington, a member of the board. This was made possible since the conference was held with Gib Gilchrist, state highway engineer.

At the request of the board of control, the highway department submitted its requisition to the board. The request was made about ten days ago. It was to discuss these requisitions that the conference was held so that an agreement could be reached. In most cases the differences were adjusted.

Bids for the machinery and equipment were submitted to the board some time ago.

### Three Orchestra Members Injured

MEXICO, Mo., August 27.—Three men were seriously injured and a bus in which ten members of an orchestra troupe of the Redpath-Horner Chattanooga were riding was completely demolished when the bus skidded and overturned on the U. S. highway near here.

## Three Men Held Here On Swindling Charge

Three men are being held in the county jail here in connection with charges of swindling through forgery, and another man held with the trio was released Sunday when it developed that he was not implicated in activities with the others. The three men being held give San Angelo as their home. Local officers were on the verge of releasing another when a forgery scheme perpetrated here some time ago was recalled, and it was decided to call merchants on whom forged checks had been passed. The suspect was positively identified and bound over.

R. Stephens, J. F. Clemmings, Arthur Hines, and E. L. Fleming were arrested in San Angelo Thursday night, and transferred to Sheriff R. E. McWilliams and Deputy John D. White, who brought them to Ballinger Friday. Fleming was released Sunday, and officers were considering freeing Hines Saturday, but was identified as the person who passed four forged checks, bearing the signature of G. E. Kemp, and ranging in amounts from \$10 to \$12.50, on as many firms here from July 25 to 28. Checks were made payable to, and indorsed by, Clyde Mallow, and were paid at Weeks Drug Store, City Drug Store, Daugherty Drug Store, and Riverside Filling Station.

Stephens and Clemmings were wanted for swindling the Guaranty State Bank at Miles on Thursday. Local officers de-

clare that the method of these two is altogether different from any with which they are familiar. One of the men presented himself at the bank, and deposited \$50 in currency under an assumed name. He then wrote a check for \$40, payable to his associate. The two waited until the bank official with whom the deposit was made had left at noon, and received payment on the check. When the banker returned, the man who made the deposit again presented himself, and withdrew from the bank the \$50 that he had presumably had on deposit. Both men were out of town before their act was discovered.

The four men were captured in San Angelo on suspicion and one on a charge of drunkenness. When lodged in jail here the two accused in the bank swindling case offered to repay the funds to the bank on condition they would be released. It developed that Stephens had a criminal record, having been sentenced to five years in the state penitentiary from Taylor county on charges of hi-jacking. He served 27 months of his term, being pardoned at the end of that time by the Ferguson administration.

In tracing the origin of automobile highway numbers used by the group, officers discovered that a plan of switching number plates had been practiced by them. The date of an examining trial has not yet been set.

Earle B. Mayfield fell under Tom Connally in the race for nomination as junior senator from Texas by 600 votes. Mayfield had 866 votes to his credit, and Connally gained 1466.

The county gave W. F. Garner 857 votes, and S. M. N. Marrs 1399, in the race for superintendent of public instruction. J. T. Robinson defeated Otis Terrell more than two-to-one in the race for land commissioner, the former polling 1468 votes, and the latter 695.

G. Y. Lee, candidate for the state legislature, received 2290 votes. His opponent in the run-off withdrew before the run-off, hence Lee's name appeared on the ballot. Barry Miller, candidate for re-election as lieutenant-governor, was given 2147 votes. Voting was light over the entire county, every one of the 27 boxes reporting little interest. The maximum Saturday fell below that of the first primary by more than 1500 votes.

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The run-off primary is now history, and interest will shift to the approaching general election, which promises to be the warmest in decades. Interest in the run-off was lagging, decidedly so in Runnels county. However, an immediate election here, which is for a road bond election to be held Saturday, bids fair to command considerable interest. The issue involved in this election is more significant as far as local citizens are concerned than any emphasized in the election Saturday.

Runnels county polled slightly in excess of half her strength recorded in the first primary. Voting over the entire state was light, as has hitherto been the case unless some unusual issue has been injected into the run-off campaign. And it appears that many politicians have become cognizant of this fact, running their campaigns placidly until the run-off, and then embarking upon a whirlwind, barnstorming drive. Even then the voters are wary, and do not turn

It appears that the run-off primary has never proved satisfactory. Certainly it does not provide a means whereby supporters of an eliminated candidate have a second preference. They are obliged to choose between only two who are in the run-off. The undesirability of the situation is increased when there are a number of office seekers in the field in the first primary. The condition would be bettered through giving each voter a second choice. He would vote for his particular candidate in the regular way, and write in his second preference from those in the field at the beginning.

## Peace And Harmony Prevail In Miles After Threatened Riots

Peace and harmony, threatened to be disrupted Thursday night, again prevail at Miles, and the city is recovering from grave fears of a riot, one of such threatening nature as to necessitate the dispatching of a corps of officers from here to quell the disturbance.

Two San Angelo bean brumblers swooped down upon the little city of Miles in the early night, at which time most of the inhabitants had already sought slumber and most of the remainder were taking their last yawns preparatory to turning in, evidently intent upon giving the townspeople something other than election gossip to talk about. The dashing gallants apparently had been imbibing freely, and they were fairly flowing over with brilliancy, according to their personal acknowledgement, those observing the frolics of the pair declared.

Dashing into the telephone office, one of the youths endeavored to force whispered expressions of sweetness to the girl operator, who became fearful of the pair. When one switched off the light, and removed the globe and socket in order to expedite the love-making attempts of his companion, she turned in an emergency call to this city, announcing excitedly that a riot was in the making there, and that all Ballinger officers would be needed.
