City Schools Ready To Open Monday, With Big Enrollment

A corps of teachers and a horde of pupils will trek into the city schools Monday, at which time the regular school term will open. H. C. Lyon, superintendent of schools, announced. The faculty is complete, and the school plant has been got into readiness for the opening of the session. Pupils are expected to reach school not later than 9 o'clock Monday morning. Supt. Lyon said. After assembly books will be issued and classifications made, preparatory to the inauguration of regular class work, which will be on Tuesday following the initial opening.

An innovation in opening exercises will be witnessed this year, Mr. Lyon having arranged a special program to be presented in the high school auditorium Monday night. The public is urged to be present for this feature, which is designed to afford contact between teachers and school patrons. Mr. Lyon stated. The following program has been prepared:

Al Smith Plans Fiery Campaign

(By International News Service) NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—Gov. Al Smith plans a whirlwind campaign, to be inaugurated later on. The Democratic candidate will not make any outdoor speeches, it was officially announced. Most of his time will be spent in the eastern states, where the hottest fight is expected to be waged.

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—Gov. Al Smith and two companions were visitors at the bedside of the Catholic priest Father Farrell in Brooklyn last night. Rev. Farrell was the confessor and pastor of the Democratic nominee's mother, who died three years ago.

Treaty Signed, Kellogg Starts Homeward Trip

(By International News Service) PARIS, Aug. 29.—Secretary of State Frank B. Kellogg, accompanied by his wife and the Irish Free State president, left for the United States today, with the anti-war treaty duly signed by fifteen nations.

WASHINGTON, August 29.—The American government expects an early adherence to the Briand-Kellogg multi-lateral treaty outlawing war by virtually forty-eight sovereign nations which were sent invitations. Russia was the sole large nation not included in the list. Russia got an invitation through France. Secretary Kellogg's identical note to states asked to join the world peace gesture explains that only fifteen states were included in the original negotiations in order to save time with the assumption that other countries were likely to accept when offered an opportunity to sign at a later date.

Search Seems To End In Failure

(By International News Service) ABILENE, Aug. 29.—A wide search by officers for two bandits who Monday night shot and seriously wounded K. H. Johnson during a hold-up south of town at the Abilene Country Club, seems to have ended in failure. Johnson is still alive.

(By International News Service) CURTISS FIELD, N. Y., Aug. 29.—Ten airplanes took to the air here this morning to begin a search for M. M. Merrill, manager of service, lost since Monday afternoon.

Attempting to influence the voters. A large attendance is anticipated, the meeting having been widely advertised throughout the district.

A good roads meeting will be held at Bethel Thursday night at 8 o'clock, it is announced by the road committee. All voters residing in the community, as well as those from other places, are urged to attend.

Why Should I Vote for the Good Roads Bond Issue?

To help you determine this question for yourself, the following information covering the questions most frequently raised on the subject has been compiled, and is submitted in the form of questions and answers:

- Question:** What territory is covered by the bond issue to be voted on next Saturday and how will it be described or designated?
- Answer:** The territory will be described as Road District No. 3 and will embrace all of Commissioner's Precinct No. 1 (This being Mr. Deens' Precinct), and all that part of Commissioner's Precinct No. 4, (this being Mr. Perry's Precinct), that lies south of the Colorado River.
- Question:** What Roads will be built with the issue and what type of roads?
- Answer:** (1) Highway No. 30 will be built of concrete from the precinct line located 1 1/2 miles north of Hatchel through Ballinger, Rowena and Miles to the Tom Green County line about 1 1/2 miles west of Miles. (2) Highway No. 23 will be built with a crushed rock, water bound macadam base and asphalt topping from the Coleman County line near Talpa, through Ballinger to the Concho County line on the South. These are the two best types of road that money and science can provide.
- Question:** What type of bridge will go over Elm Creek?
- Answer:** The Department advises that it will be a type similar to the Colorado River Bridge at Ballinger.
- Question:** What will it cost the district to maintain these roads?
- Answer:** Nothing; they will be maintained by the State Highway Department.
- Question:** Does the proposed plan contemplate a concrete road from the Taylor County line, through Winters to connect up with our present project at Hatchel?
- Answer:** Yes, but that project will be covered by a separate and distinct Road District and separate and distinct bonds covering that district only. Our taxes will not be affected by the Winters project.
- Question:** What will the cost to us (Road District No. 3) be on these roads and what part of the cost will the State and Federal Road Departments pay?
- Answer:** The total cost to us will be \$525,000.00, of which sum \$47,000.00 will be used to replace present road bonds now in existence. For every \$1.00 of construction cost that we pay, the State and Federal Departments will pay \$2.00, in other words, we'll have 1 1/2 million dollars worth of roads at a cost to us of only 1 1/2 million dollars.
- Question:** When will work commence on these roads?
- Answer:** Immediately. In a letter to County Judge Paul Trimmier, the State Highway engineer states that work on concrete road No. 30 will begin as soon as the bonds are issued and that the work on asphalt road No. 23 will follow promptly thereafter.
- Question:** What assurance have we that all of the work as specified will be completed.
- Answer:** State Highway Commissioner Ely, in his public addresses at Miles and Ballinger stated (and asked to be put on record) that the roads would be completed at the cost of the State and Federal Departments if the present estimates should prove short, and that the road district would not be asked for further help.
- Question:** What increase will be needed in the State and County tax rate to retire the bonds?
- Answer:** In old road district No. 1 the increase will be not exceeding 50 cents per hundred of valuation, there being now a tax of 10 cents already being paid. In the balance of the Road District No. 3 the

- Question:** increase will be not exceeding 60 cents per hundred, making a tax of 60 cents per hundred all over the district.
- Question:** What does this mean in dollars and cents of cost to each voter in Ballinger and other points in the 50 cent area?
- Answer:** It means that each \$1,000.00 of State and County rendition (NOT CITY nor INDEPENDENT SCHOOL VALUATIONS) will cost you \$5.00 per year more taxes. Look up your State and County rendition and you can figure the cost for yourself.
- Question:** Will the tax increase be effective on 1928 renditions?
- Answer:** No, the rate will not be raised until 1929.
- Question:** If we do not accept the tender of approximately \$1,000,000.00 being made to us by the State and Federal Departments, what will happen?
- Answer:** First—The aid will be given to those counties willing to co-operate with the Highway Department, thereby effecting a two-fold injury to us (a) we fail to get good roads ourselves, and (b) competing districts get the aid to the everlasting benefit of themselves and to the injury of Runnels County towns and farms. Second—There is a dangerous possibility of losing our present State and Federal Highway designations. This would force us to drop back to ordinary community roads that we would have to keep up and maintain at our own cost and expense. In actual dollars and cents we would be out much more in the long run and would have no decent roads either.
- Question:** Is this danger just mentioned a real one or an imaginary one?
- Answer:** It is so real that the State Highway officials themselves have suggested the possibility of the changes.
- Question:** Who can vote in this election?
- Answer:** Every qualified voter in the Road District who pays a property tax on either real or personal property can vote on the bond issue. If you pay on a watch, a piano, an automobile, or on any personal property whatsoever, or on real estate, you are entitled to a vote. A property rendition by a man and his wife entitles each to a vote.
- Question:** What vote is needed to win the election?
- Answer:** It is necessary to have a vote of 66 2/3 per cent in favor of the issue, a bare majority will not satisfy the law covering bond issues.
- Question:** What is the date of the election?
- Answer:** Next Saturday, September 1st.
- Question:** Where will the voting boxes be located?
- Answer:** All voters in Ballinger Precinct No. 1, Ballinger Precinct No. 24, Benoit Precinct, Hatchel Precinct and Bethel Precinct will vote at Ballinger at the Court House; All voters in the Offen and Rowena Precincts will vote at Rowena; All voters in the Brookshier and Miles Precinct will vote at Miles.
- Question:** What does this forward movement mean to Road District No. 3?
- Answer:** It means everything.

Road Bond Supporters Entertain Hopes That "13" Is Not Ominous

Eight additional absentee votes had been polled for the road bond election late this afternoon, bringing the total to 21, thereby destroying the "13" hoax.

That "13" is no augury of impending disaster as applied to the road bond issue to be voted Saturday is to be hoped.

Thirteen absentee votes had been filed with County Clerk W. A. Forgey Wednesday morning. Today is the final date on which absentee votes on the road bond election can be received, Paul Trimmer, county judge, announced. Ballots will be received until the usual election closing hour this afternoon, and all voters who expect to be out of the city are urged to file their ballots with Mr. Forgey today.

Those who are superstitiously inclined, and view the situation of 13 votes with apprehension, might find encouragement in the probability that the ominous number will vanish with an addition of votes during the day.

Basing an opinion upon interest in the election as revealed by pre-election voters, officials predict that an unusually large number of qualified voters will appear at the polls Saturday.

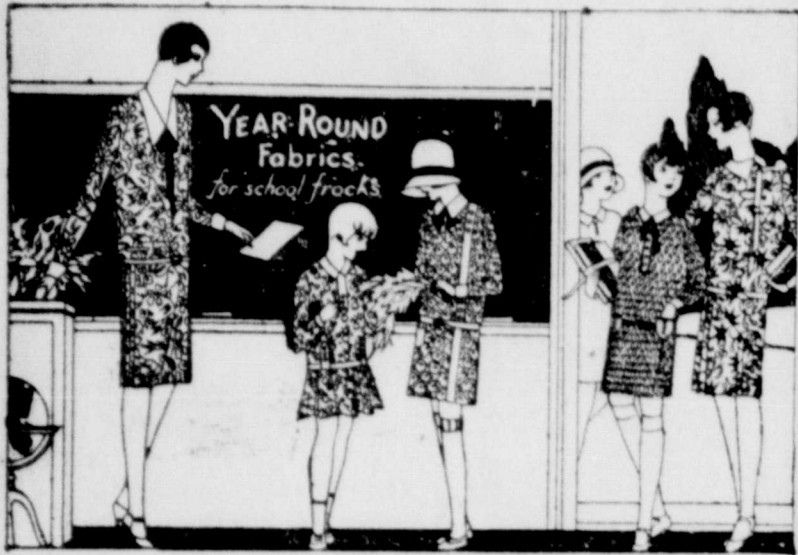
