Tropical Storm Heads for Gulf

(By International News Service)
WASHINGTON, September 4.—The weather bureau issued a warning today that a tropical disturbance is moving at the rate of 300 miles per day toward the Gulf of Mexico, and may strike within 36 hours.
The storm is increasing in intensity and may pass through the Strait of Yucatan tonight, the report said.

Find Valuable River Deposits

Potentialities for a profitable income for Runnels county are seen in sand and gravel deposits in the Colorado River by David H. Ryan, road construction contractor now building the highway from the Tom Green county line to San Angelo.

Mr. Ryan has gone to a great deal of expense in analyzing and inspecting the deposits, and has found that there is an abundance of high type gravel and sand. There is a greater demand at the present time for this class of road material than the current supply will fill, he said.

He stated that he has an order placed with a firm which specializes in grading this material for some time, and that due to the great demand he has not been able to have a single car delivered. With the erection here of a grading plant, which will separate and wash the gravel and sand, much revenue would be provided, he declared.

Similar supplies were found in the Concho River through the investigation promoted by Mr. Ryan. A plant would cost approximately \$25,000, he said.

The proposition of receiving two dollars for one is an attractive one. And that is what Runnels county realizes in the adoption of the \$525,000 road bond issue—the state and federal highway departments subscribe two dollars for each dollar raised by the county. For many years Runnels county property owners have been paying federal and state taxes, without deriving the greatest benefits in return, the tax quota of the county going to other sections which voted road bond issues. Now the county will begin to benefit from the taxes that she has paid to the two departments.

It has been observed that comparatively dull towns have been revived through securing good roads. A new stimulus is furnished when good roads are constructed. An outlet for labor is provided through construction work, and a person seeking a new home views a section with improved roads more favorably than districts without good roads.

Good road benefits will not be limited to the cities. The entire county will profit; funds hitherto used for maintenance of these roads will revert to lateral road construction, and the highways will be tapped at intervals with a thorough system of community roads.

Editing of "Ben-Hur" Was a Tremendous Task

The task of cutting and editing the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer screen version of "Ben-Hur" in two languages and on two continents was by far the most gigantic enterprise ever undertaken for any super-feature. The total of the negative film exposed during the making of "Ben-Hur" amounted to 1,900,000 feet, which is 900,000 greater than that of "The Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse," which is the nearest competitor. From this mountain of celluloid 850,000 feet of positive were printed, more than double the entire footage of "The Big Parade."

With sixteen pictures to the foot this makes a total of 13,600,000 individual pictures which the film editor and his assistants had to screen before attempting to assemble and edit the film down to its present length of 12,000

feet. Thus for every foot of film shown to the audience at the Palace Theatre, where the production is on the second day of its three-day run, there were 160 feet discarded. If or those interested in farther facts and figures it can be mentioned that it would take six days to run "Ben-Hur" in its entire length, including all the sequences and scenes shot in Italy and at the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studios in Culver City, Calif.

Lloyd Nosler, appointed film editor of this epic early in 1924, immediately sailed for Rome to join Director Fred Niblo and his staff. Upon his arrival the film editor found about 400,000 feet of film awaiting him and immediately started to reduce this footage to continuity form.

When the scenes pictured against the historic background of Rome were completed the company returned to the United States for another year's work on "Ben-Hur." After each day's work, the scenes taken during the day would be shown. Nosler looked at every foot and knew by heart the slightest movement of every character in the entire production. This probably was the greatest task ever assigned to a film editor.

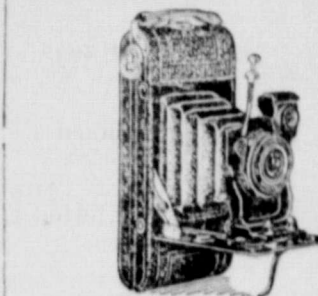

Over 1,000 Women Will Campaign For Democracy

NEW YORK, Sept. 4.—A partial list of prominent women who will campaign for Governor Alfred E. Smith from speakers' platforms throughout the nation was announced yesterday from the speakers' bureau of Women's Activities at Democratic National Headquarters. More than 1,000 women already have been definitely listed for this duty and the list is constantly growing, according to Mrs. Mary T. Norton, congresswoman from New Jersey, who heads the speakers' bureau.

The list includes Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, Mrs. Norton, former Governor Nellie Taylor Ross of Wyoming, Mrs. J. Borden Harriman, Mrs. Charles Dana Gibson, and Mrs. John Harman Amen, the latter a daughter of Grover Cleveland.

It also includes: Miss Gertrude Ely of Bryn Mawr, Pa., Miss Annie Mathews, registrar of the county of New York; Miss Lillian D. Wald, head of the Henry Street Settlement; Mrs. Carroll Miller of Pittsburgh; Judge Jean Norris, city magistrate; Mrs. Daniel O'Day and Miss Marion Dieckman of Democratic State Headquarters; Issett Jewel Brown, Mrs. Martin Vogel, Mrs. William H. Goode, Brooklyn leader; Mrs. Van derbilt Webb, Mrs. Grosvenor Allen, Mrs. John Blair, president of the Democratic Union in Washington, D. C., and Mrs. Norman Whitehouse of the Society of Women's Suffrage.

All of these women work without pay, receiving only their expenses, Mrs. S. N. Eben, vice-chairman of the speakers' bureau said. Each day brings an average of twenty women to volunteer their services, and a flood of letters from volunteers who want to take the stump for Gov. Smith and his party.

As a consequence the speakers' bureau, conducted on the seventh floor of General Motors Building where Women's Activity headquarters are located, is one of the busiest places in the gigantic Democratic stronghold.

"We have not only women who are prominent in politics," Mrs. Eben said, "but also leading society women, professional women, social workers, actresses and others who are accustomed to platform work, and women generally who feel that they can master the technique of platform speaking and overcome 'stage fright' in order to do their part for Gov. Smith. We give them all a chance and if they show ability at all they are signed up."

One of the volunteers was a woman who said that she had given a speech on a street car in

behalf of the Democratic nominee. "The motorman told me I was so good that I could use his car any time I wanted to," she said. She related that she had crocheted an American flag for Gov. Smith, requiring five months to complete, and exhibited proudly a letter of thanks from the governor.

In routing the travels of the women speakers over forty-eight states, the speakers' bureau has devised an elaborate system of maps. From the Automobile Club a map of each state has been obtained. These are being used in planning the automobile trips. Each state headquarters will furnish three automobiles to carry these women from place to place, and as many as five cars in New York and other large states. With a system of colored pins and colored yarns, the itineraries for each state have been charted, showing all speaking engagements and stop-overs for sleeping and eating.

Speaking engagements already are being filled wherever there is a request. A woman and a man are sent in each case. Dozens of requests are received daily for speakers.

Another phase of the work in the speakers' bureau deals with the distribution of campaign literature which will be handed out by girls who will accompany the campaign cars.

ernment. Pickers now are returning from South Texas and the Rio Grande valley areas at the rate of 400 to 500 a day. These are being placed by the field men where needed the worst. The supply will continue short for at least another two weeks when there may be a slight let-up in Central Texas before the harvest season gets well under way in the North Texas. By the time North Texas crop has been picked, hands will be needed in the northwestern and western sections of the state.

Just now the majority of the pickers are being placed around Kerens, Henderson, Waco, and as far north as Cleburne. Some picking is under way in and around Ft. Worth and Dallas. Where a field is found ready for pickers, there is another one maybe just across the road that will open enough for hands to enter when the first field has

been harvested. It is expected that picking will begin later than usual in the northwestern and northern areas because of the late start of the crop.

CENTRAL TEXAS TOWNS GET POWER RATE CUT

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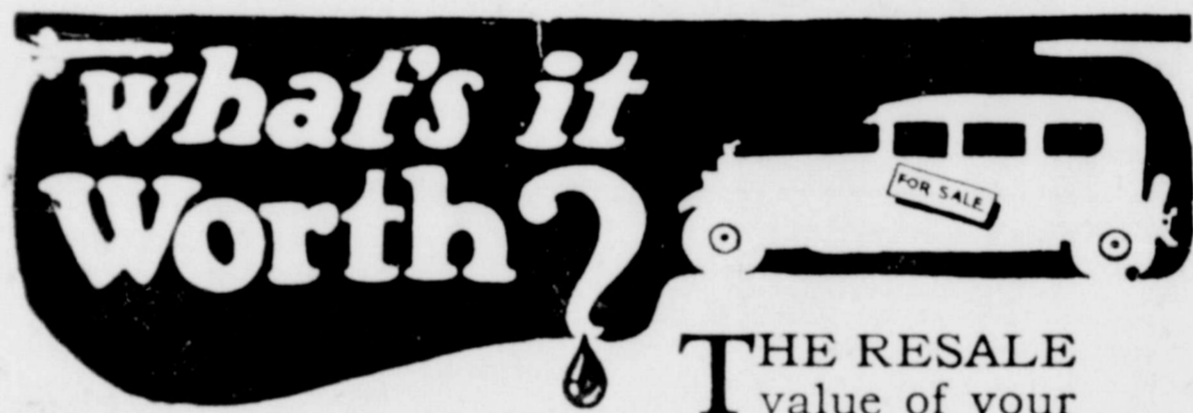
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
