Rowland Gains Lead in Last Lap of Race

(By International News Service)
SAN DIEGO, Calif., Sept. 10.—Leading the New York-to-Los Angeles transcontinental fliers, Earl Rowland, of Wichita, Kansas, landed here today on the next to the last leg of the journey.

YUMA, Arizona, Sept. 10.—The last lap of the transcontinental air races began here today when the vanguard of planes in the derby took for San Diego, the final stop before the end of the sweepstakes.

PECOS, Texas, Sept. 10.—Edward E. Balluh, of Chicago, flying a Laird monoplane, still led the class B fliers in the New York-to-Los Angeles derby when they landed here at 12:20 this afternoon. He took off for El Paso at 12:45 after refueling.

Robert W. Cantwell, of Duncan, Oklahoma, a former Fort Worth boy, led the class C fliers when his Lockheed Vega crossed the marker at 12:20. T. A. Wells and John P. Wood, both class B fliers, preceded him.

FT. WORTH, Sept. 10.—Winging their way across the plains of Texas, sixteen class B and three class C planes are en route to Midland today after having stopped here this morning. They came here from Oklahoma City and will spend the night in El Paso.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 10.—Following an hour or more of delay due to bad weather here the transcontinental fliers in classes B and C took the air from here this morning with Fort Worth as their goal.

Following a thirty minute stop at the Panther City the airmen will strike out for Midland, with El Paso scheduled for the night stop.

FEWER BABIES BORN IN BELGIUM DURING 1927

BRUSSELS, Sept. 10.—Fewer babies were born in Belgium during the year 1927 than the previous one according to statistics just published in this city. The figures were 144,211, as compared with 148,550 in 1926. The excess of births over deaths was 41,201 against 47,882 in 1926. The death rate in 1927 was 13 per 1,000 against 12.80 the year preceding.

Five Convicts Killed in Prison Break

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 10.—One of the greatest man hunts in the history of this section is being pressed today for four convicts who escaped after participation in a break for liberty at the Angola penitentiary farm last night. Five convicts and one trusty were killed, and four convicts, three guards and a boat-tender were wounded when fourteen convicts armed with revolvers and sawed-off shot-guns made a get-away.

Cleveland J. Owens, who escaped from the Texas penitentiary at Huntsville in 1926, led the break and was killed almost instantly.

WIRELESS PHONE CALLS FROM PARIS TO U S NET FRANCE A PROFIT

(By International News Service)
PARIS, Sept. 10.—In spite of the relatively high cost of transmission, more than 2,500 wireless telephone calls have been put through from the French capital to New York, Chicago, Boston and other American cities since beginning of the service on March 23.

The charge is approximately fifty dollars in round figures and France receives an average profit of nearly one dollar on each call made, so the total has brought the country some additional fifty-six thousand francs in the four months of operation.

Reports were current that the president contemplated calling such a meeting to counteract the abandonment of the Franco-British naval agreement. The discussions over the agreement are expected to come to a head this week with the return of the president to Washington.

The agreement is said to be causing considerable anxiety among state department officials.

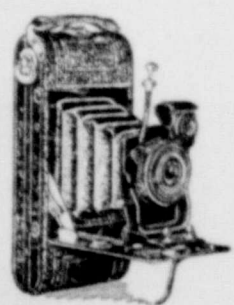

Joffer's Story of World War to Tell Truth

PARIS, Sept. 10.—So many errors and misstatements have filtered into historical accounts of phases of the World War that Marshal Joffre may release "proved facts" about it.

Acknowledged hero of the first battle of the Marne, Marshal Joffre continued to view tranquilly all that is being said about it, while he worked on his memoirs.

The memoirs are now completed and he has concluded that it might be well to set posterity right about the great combat, among other things.

"But I will not publish them for a long time, either here or in America," he told Roger Delaplante, of the "Intransigent."

"It would be vain to awaken or reawaken touchiness in certain quarters.

"But how many untruths to destroy and how many truths to prove! I have the documents, the proofs about the Marne and about other things relative to the war, so it will be necessary, perhaps, for me to publish one or several chapters of my memoirs."

Most of the admirers of Marshal Joffre who show they remember him by frequent visits are Americans. They are received at the Joffre villa at Louveciennes, near Paris.

Despite his 73 years the marshal puts in a long day. Reveille is sounded at 7:30. At 9 o'clock he is at his desk perusing the day's mail which Mme. Joffre says is always heavy.

With traditional French desire for meals *à fresco* the Joffres sit down for lunch beneath a grape arbor during all but the few winter months. In the afternoon the marshal has his automobile ramble through Saint Germain woods or around Versailles.

He may visit America again, having a standing invitation to return there, but that project is entirely indefinite.

War souvenirs are lacking

around the marshal's domain. He prefers the garb of a country gentleman. The only touch of military are two sentry boxes that flank the villa. They recall event days of half a century ago. While standing guard in them, he says, he spent many pleasant hours.

BUDAPEST PAEK LOVERS MUST HAVE PASSPORTS UNDER NEW ORDINANCE

VIENNA, Sept. 10.—Lovers sitting on benches in the public parks after dark in the gay city of Budapest will have to present passports or other identification papers hereafter on requests of the police.

The city elders, shocked by the recent "laxity of conduct" in municipal parks during the recent hot spell and the nude bathing in the rivers have determined to put an end to all levity.

The city has issued two new ordinances:

The first strictly forbids anyone to sleep in riverside bungalows;

The second prohibits any couple sitting on a park bench after dark unless they are able to prove they are married. All couples must produce, on request, identification papers or passports, or be arrested.

All Vienna is laughing at these ordinances and declares the city fathers are becoming as suspicious as the Hyde Park police.

A great majority of the feminine populace of Vienna, less prudish than their Budapest sisters, in the heat are going without stockings. White socks, the kind worn by children, are being worn by pretty Viennese shopgirls who brazenly display their nude calves even in the heart of the city.

Gressett last week by the Run-
