Rush Road Work; No. 2 District Discusses Issue

The Commissioners Court met in regular session Monday afternoon at the court house with County Judge Paul Trimmier presiding. One of the first items of business was to canvass the election returns on the recent road bond election in district No. 3. The canvass showed no change from the figures compiled by The Ledger on the night of the election giving 1664 for the issue and 337 against.

Judge Trimmier is now busy preparing the transcript which he expects to finish and place in the hands of Attorney General Pollard by Monday of next week. The transcript cannot be approved in less than 30 days from the date of the election, however, it is expected that it will be found all right and approved as soon as the time limit has passed. Judge Trimmier is rushing preparation of the transcript, however, in order that he may get the tentative approval of the attorney general's department and go before the State Highway Commission in person when its next meeting is held on September 17 and 18.

As soon as the transcript is approved the bonds will be printed and submitted to the attorney general's department for a final check, and then sent to the comptroller's office to be signed and registered. After this procedure they will be ready to sell.

The court made the bonds to bear five per cent.

Commissioner D. W. Yeager, of the Winters precinct, discussed the proposed bond issue for improved roads in that precinct with Judge Trimmier and it is probable that some steps will be taken to advance the project in the near future.

One of the questions discussed was whether additional bonds would be voted in road district No. 2 to complete Highway No. 30 through Winters, or to include all of commissioner's precinct No. 2 and vote bonds for lateral roads. In case the latter is done a new road district will be created, known as road district No. 4. The bounds of the present road district No. 2 is all of that commissioner's precinct west of Winters and that part east of Winters which lies west of Elm Creek.

In case the new district is created it is likely that an issue of \$300,000 will be asked for. Of that amount \$48,000 will be used to absorb outstanding bonds in district No. 2. This issue would give the commissioner of that precinct between \$70,000 and \$75,000 to be used in building hard surfaced lateral roads in addition to the completion of highway No. 30 from the Taylor county line to the precinct line north of Hatchel.

Oil Tanks Burn at Fort Worth

FORT WORTH, Sept. 11.—Eight 500-gallon tanks of the Star Refining Company were blazing here this morning as the result of a fire, believed to have been caused by sparks from the boiler in the main building of the plant last night.

The loss has not yet been estimated but it will be considerable, according to President W. M. Harrison.

LOCAL OIL MILL BEGINS OPERATIONS

Maine Stays In Republican Ranks

(By International News Service)
ALBANY, Sept. 11.—"I never was optimistic enough to think that Maine would be anything else but Republican," was Gov. Al Smith's only comment today on the Maine election.

PORTLAND Me., Sept. 11.—With 544 of the state's 633 precincts completed and accounted for, William T. Gardiner, Republican, was elected governor over Edward C. Moran, Democrat, by a majority that is expected to exceed 80,000. Senator Frederick Hale, Republican, was leading Herbert Holmes, Democrat, by more than 60,000 votes.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—Republicans today bailed with glee the result of the Maine election where that party's candidates defeated Democratic office seekers more than two to one in yesterday's election. They said the psychological effect would prove a material boon to the Hoover-Curtis ticket in other normal Republican states.

Some of the Republican party's biggest oratorical guns were sent into Maine before the election.

Fair Catalogue Ready for Users

The catalogue for the 1928 Runnels County Fair is off the press and ready for distribution. The book this year contains 85 pages and is filled with photographs of officials, directors, chairmen, superintendents, scenes of acts at the coming fair and scenes taken at the last fair.

The book is very complete in regard to the rules covering each department and the entering of special displays. It also gives a list of all premiums that will be offered in every department.

Special attention has been devoted to the county schools this year and prizes worth hard work have been offered in three divisions. Independent schools are placed in one class, and the rural schools have been grouped in two divisions, classes A and B. Class A schools are listed as rural schools with three teachers or more, and Class B will represent the one- and two-teacher schools.

For the best display in the decorated booth in the exposition building at the coming fair the following cash prizes will be paid: Independent schools, first, \$25.00; second, \$15.00; and third, \$7.50. Class A schools, first, \$35.00; second, \$20.00; third, \$10.00. Class B schools, first, \$25.00; second, \$15.00; and third, \$7.50.

In addition to the prizes announced above the West Texas Utilities Company will give to the independent school with the best display at the fair one large American flag supported by staff and stand; and to the rural schools with the largest per cent of their enrollment in the school parade the following cash prizes: first, \$25.00; and second, \$15.00.

WILL PIPE COURT HOUSE FOR NATURAL GAS SOON

The Runnels county court house will be piped for gas and equipped with stoves just as soon as plans are submitted and okayed, it has been announced by the Commissioners Court. The Community Natural Gas Co. will send a man here within the next few days to give the court a complete set of plans and as soon as this is done, bids for the installation will be asked for and the work started so that the new heating system will be ready by the beginning of cold weather.

Will Ignore G.O.P. Drive In The South

NEW YORK, Sept. 11.—Democratic campaign managers will ignore the Republican drive in the Solid South it was definitely revealed today by Chairman John J. Raskob.

The Democratic high command has been seriously occupied with the situation south of the Mason-Dixon line since Herbert Hoover announced he would personally carry his campaign into Tennessee in October, but reassuring reports from field managers throughout the South has prompted national headquarters to ignore the Republican drive.

Brownwood Store Robbed Sunday

Bettis & Gibbs, at 206 Center Avenue, local dealers in women's ready-to-wear merchandise, was burglarized sometime Sunday night of between \$6,000 and \$8,000 worth of merchandise, it was discovered early Monday morning when Norman Cooper, of that firm, opened the store for business.

Norman discovered a badly disarranged stock of merchandise and on second look discovered a ladder descending from a skylight to the balcony or mezzanine floor, giving ample proof that the store had been robbed.

The burglar or burglars gained entrance through the skylight and left the building through the rear door, it was discovered Monday morning. The loot taken consisted of the best merchandise in stock and was made up of expensive and reasonable dresses, a number of expensive coats for women, practically the entire stock of fine silk undergarments for women, a large amount of silk hosiery, several bolts of silk cloth and other merchandise equally as valuable.

Local officers, both city and county, were called early Monday morning and immediately began work in an effort to apprehend the guilty party. Finger prints were taken and other clues are to be followed up, but at a late hour no trace of the party or parties guilty of the burglary had been found.

H. H. Gibbs, manager of the store, and Norman Cooper, an employee, were at their place of business Sunday night until about 9 or 9:30. It is known that the burglary occurred sometime between that hour and early Monday morning. — Brownwood Bulletin.

J. C. Sturgess, of this city, is a member of the Brownwood firm mentioned above. Mr. Sturgess was advised Monday of the robbery but did not know the exact extent of the loss.

AUSTIN, Sept. 11.—Assistant Attorney General Brown announced today that a state-wide investigation has been launched against the alleged cement trust in Texas. He said that the action contemplates filing suits for heavy penalties for violation of the anti-trust laws, and injunctions will be sought also. He claims the price of cement was reduced twenty cents in the Dallas territory, and ten cents in the Houston territory.

Texas manufacturers of cement are fighting the importation of cement from Belgium it is claimed.

Immediately after the report was concluded former Governor O. B. Colquitt asked for recognition from the chair. This was denied and the bolters all over the hall arose, shouting "Good-bye Tammany." The regular Democrats, who were far in the majority, countered with "Throw the Republicans out!"

Several fights for possession of the district standards were started but Ranger Captain Tom Hickman and the police quelled them. The bolters then left the hall to hold their own convention at the agriculture building.

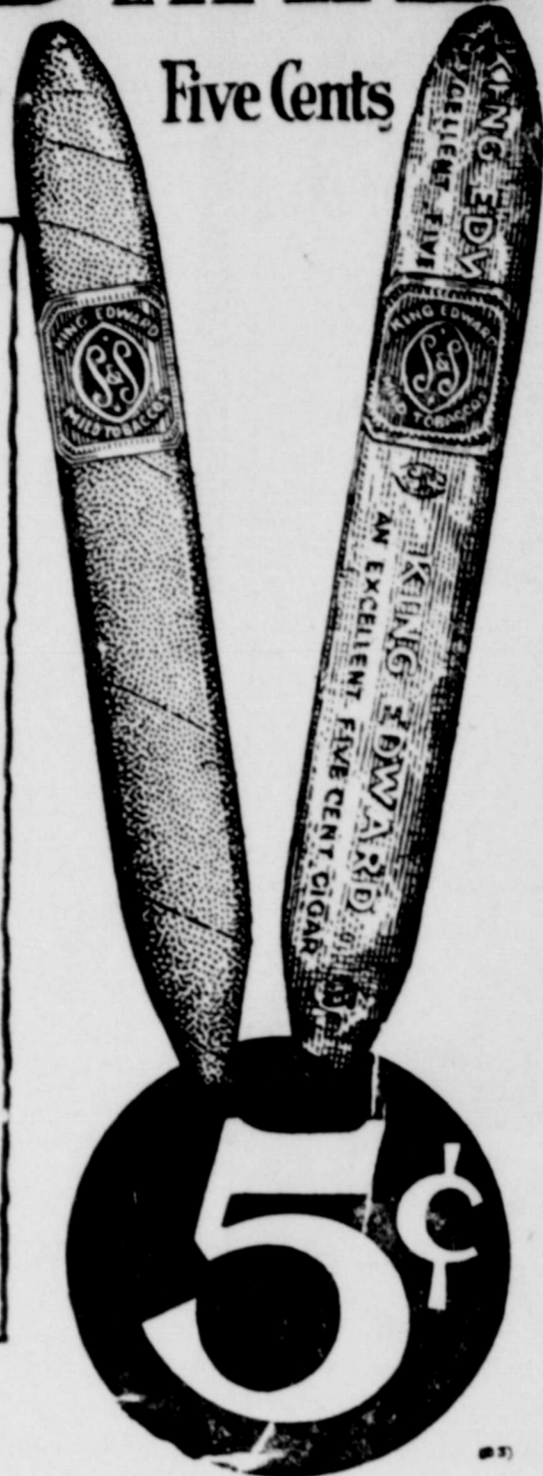
