Chiropractor Refuses to Sign Death Certificate

In the death of Hellen Pearse, 3-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wil Pearse, whose residence is in San Angelo, and which death occurred here at the home of the child's grand-parents, Mr. and Mrs. T. W. Morris, at 5:30 a. m. Tuesday the 18th, an undertaker having been called to prepare the body for burial, and having prepared the proper papers for the interment of the body and presenting the same to the last person attending the child, as directed by law, the signature on the death certificate is alleged to have been refused by a local chiropractor, whom it is alleged was the last person to attend the child.

At 1:30 o'clock a court of inquiry was called to order in the court of Judge C. H. Willingham, justice of the peace in this precinct and the following witnesses were called and sworn and made in substance the following statements:

T. W. Morris, the first witness called, testified as to the child's death which occurred about 5:30 o'clock on Tuesday, Sept. 18th, and that to the best of his belief the last person to attend the child was Mrs. Anderson, member of the firm of Anderson & Anderson, local chiropractors. But as to what means of relief Mrs. Anderson administered, Mr. Morris would not try to state as he said he was not sure as to what she did.

Dr. J. W. Macune, a physician was the next witness called to the stand and stated that he treated the child or at least prescribed for it about 11 o'clock Monday morning and stated that it was his opinion the child was suffering from heart trouble and recommended to the parents that it be kept very quiet.

Mrs. Anderson was then put on the stand and asked as to the cause of the child's death and stated that she did not diagnose and asked further as to why she did not sign the death certificate stated that she was not a physician nor a medical doctor and did not feel that she was the proper person to do so.

The court interpreting the law, pointed out that it appeared that Mrs. Anderson having been the last person to attend the child, should sign the certificate, but she having refused to sign the certificate, the City Health Officer, Dr. E. R. Walker, will refer the case to the State Health Officer for whatever action this department may see fit to take.

Dr. Walker will go ahead and issue the burial permit and leave the certificate of death in its incomplete state, entirely up to the State Department of Health.

STORK'S BUSINESS GROWS IN GERMAN FAMILIES AS BIRTHS LEAD DEATHS

BERLIN, Sept. 18.—The stork is getting more work in Germany. Figures for the first quarter of this year show that the surpluses of births over deaths increased by 18,800 compared with the same period last year.

Up to that time, the birth surplus had been steadily decreasing and German pessimists already had Germany adopting the alleged race suicide methods of France. Some were already predicting the extinction of the whole white race.

Nearly 10,000 more couples got married during the first quarter of this year than did during the first quarter last year.

The increase in the number of marriages was greatest in Berlin. But in Berlin the birth rate continued to drop and 2,597 more persons died than were born in Berlin.

IRISH FREE STATE DE-CIDES AIR PROGRAM: BUY TWO MACHINES

DUBLIN, Ireland, Sept. 17.—Civic aviation is definitely established in the Free State. Under the presidency of Col. Fitzmaurice a powerful Dublin committee has been formed and begun operations by purchasing two machines.

County Valuations Show Increase; Poll Tax is Less for Next Year

Mike C. Boyd has just finished the tax rolls for this year and they will be presented to the county court to be approved at their next meeting.

The completed tax list shows the valuations in Runnels county to be \$11,919,980 this year which is a slight increase over last year. The approved figures for last year were \$11,817,060. This valuation will mean in dollars and cents that \$208,721.88 will be collected this year against the above valuations. This shows a small increase in tax money on the county and state despite a three cent cut in the state rate this year.

There are 6,312 polls in the county this year against 6,490 for 1927.

The biggest loss in valuations was in horses, mules and merchandise. This loss was not big but all three items were less than last year.

The largest gain in the valuations was in Roll C which covers such property as the West Texas Utilities, the pipe lines and oil industry. This gain for the year was \$191,510.

Assessments against residences of the county this year are \$8,596,380. This shows a decrease in the valuations of those living in the county but this is due to the 3 cent state cut in the rate.

The state tax for this year is \$76,246.83 against last year \$79,110.53. The county tax for this year \$76,289.27 against last year, \$75,608.94.

The reports to the organization indicated that the death toll at Okeechobee and Palm Beach region may exceed fifty.

The storm loss is estimated at between 12 and 20 million dollars.

WEST PALM BEACH, Sept. 18.—The death toll in the Florida equinoctial hurricane may exceed 100, as the reports from the storm stricken centers mounted close to that number today. Several towns have not yet reported.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18.—The Florida hurricane traveling at a reduced rate of speed and diminished intensity is now over central South Carolina, the weather bureau declared at ten this morning. It is expected to pass into the sea near the Virginia capes.

A twelve inch rainfall at Savannah marked the passing of the hurricane there. The temperature dropped generally twenty-three degrees in the mid-Atlantic states.

MIAMI, Sept. 18.—Thirty-seven are known dead in a hurricane which swept Florida Sunday and Monday were reported today. Seventeen were found in towns in West Palm Beach, Lakewood, Deerfield and Del Ray. The Red Cross reported 20 dead at Bellgrade. A vast stretch of Lake Okeechobee was isolated this morning.

Spurned Suitor Pours Acid on Woman's Home

DENVER, Sept. 17.—A 60-year-old swain, who police believe is from a Kansas town, has his own views as to how the modern "love nest" should be wrecked, according to a weird story revealed here following the destruction by acid of the home of Mrs. Percy Willets, wife of a Denver worker.

For many years, according to the story told police by Mrs. Willets, this Lochinvar sought the hand of a beautiful girl. But fate was unkind to him and the "only one" spurned each offer made her. Finally, the much sought miss married another suitor, but her happiness was short-lived—in a few years death took her husband.

Once again "Lochinvar, Sr." sought the beautiful girl and was once more spurned.

Several months ago, Cora, the girl, became the wife of Percy Willets. Time passed and "Lochinvar" failed to press his suit, but after waiting eight months he came on to Denver and discovered where Mrs. Willets was living.

He paid her a visit and as he was leaving he was told that his efforts were again futile and would remain so. According to Mrs. Willets' story to the police, the ageing Romeo threatened dire things. "If you won't have me," he is alleged to have said, "I'll wreck your little love nest, by golly."

Six days after this last remark Mrs. Willets walked to work with her husband, and then walked a rather round about way home. When she arrived there she was met by a sorry spectacle—her little love nest had been completely ruined by a fiend who had poured acid into every drawer, on all the furniture, on some twenty dresses and the rugs. She went into the kitchen and found her little Pekinese puppy dead—his head split wide open with a hammer.

 That there had been no attempt to rob the house was evident. Although the fiend had poured the potent acid over a metal box containing about \$1,000 worth of diamonds, the jewels had not been touched either by the culprit or the acid.

DR. J. M. TRACEY DEAD; GAVE 160,000 LESSONS AND 700 CONCERTS

(By International News Service)
DENVER, Colo., Sept. 18.—Dr. James Madison Tracey, for many years one of the outstanding musicians of the nation, died here recently from an attack caused by complication of diseases and age. He was 89 years old.

Dr. Tracey was the last pupil who studied under the great master, Frank Liszt. The story was often told how he gained with great difficulty admittance to a class taught by Liszt when he, as an unknown American journeyed to Weimar to study his art. After a number of lessons, however, Tracey became one of Liszt's favored pupils and was given an opportunity to play in several concerts.

It is estimated that Tracey, since the time when he was a student, had given 160,000 music lessons, had appeared in more than 700 concerts and had given more than 700 lectures in all parts of the country.

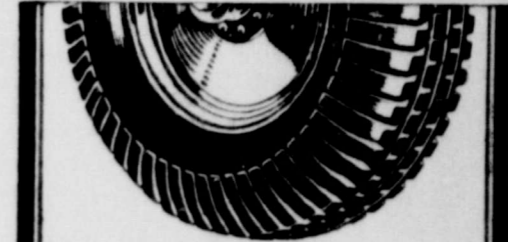

That at least one hundred were dead in that region. He said that he helped to remove a dozen bodies of white persons from the lake which inundated the towns.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18.—The hurricane damage to Florida is expected to exceed that of two years ago according to Senator Robinson vice presidential nominee, who wired the Red Cross today from Titusville where he is campaigning.

PARIS, Sept. 18.—The storm and tidal wave dead at Guadeloupe, French West Indies, were estimated 300 by the Ministry of Colonies today.

Salvation Army In County Drive

The County Board of the Salvation Army met Tuesday morning in the offices of the chamber of commerce and elected their officers for the coming year and laid plans for the drive in Runnels county to raise the county's quota of \$900 for Salvation Army work.

The board is composed of R. W. Earnshaw, president; J. D. Motley, secretary; L. Cohen, treasurer, and the following other members: E. E. Knig, W. C. McCarver, Joe Simmons and Troy Simpson.

Thursday and Friday, Sept. 27 and 28 were set as the appeal days in Ballinger and the Ballinger quota was set at \$400. The Winters quota is \$300, Miles \$100, and Rowena \$100. Paul Brown is chairman at Miles, W. A. Halamick at Rowena and G. E. Nicholson at Winters.

The Salvation Army representatives in charge of the work here stated that this quota was all that the people of this county would be called upon to give towards this work during the year. His attention was called to the fact that Army workers canvassed the town almost every Saturday with tambourines and he stated that this practice would be out and not allowed in the future. He stated that troops were allowed to sell the official paper "The War Cry" and ask for free will offering among the immediate crowd that gathered to listen to a service but a solicitation of all firms by girls would not be tolerated in the future unless they carried a permit from the Runnels County Board.

Teams were appointed to solicit the quota in Ballinger and zones designated for each team. Scott H. Mack and Earl Morley were named on the McCarver & Lynn block, R. T. Williams and R. G. Irwin on the First National block, E. E. King and Tommy Hall on the G. A. Ludwig block and Cleo Smith and Henry Jones on the F. & M. Bank block.

These teams will be asked to make a canvass on their block on the above named appeal days and raise the quota allotted to Ballinger.

Ballinger has raised its quota for this work every year with a very little effort and so far has never experienced any difficulty in getting the desired amount.

The "Home Service Appeal" for the Salvation Army has begun in Runnels county. R. L. Portwood, campaign director for the organization with headquarters at Dallas, arrived in Ballinger Sunday to assist the local advisory board in conducting the drive. A meeting of the board will be held tomorrow morning at 9:00 o'clock, at the Chamber of Commerce offices, at which time officers

will be appointed for the ensuing year, quotas will be adopted and plans laid to raise the amount decided upon. Chairmen will also be appointed for the other small towns in Runnels county.

Names of the board members will be published tomorrow, and for the benefit of the public upon whom the Salvation Army so largely depends for finances for the conduct of the very helpful and necessary effort for the relief of humanity, a story will be published in tomorrow's issue of The Ledger giving some of the work of this great organization and how they function in the small towns and rural communities in the State of Texas.

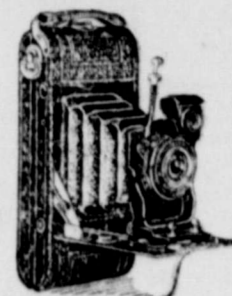

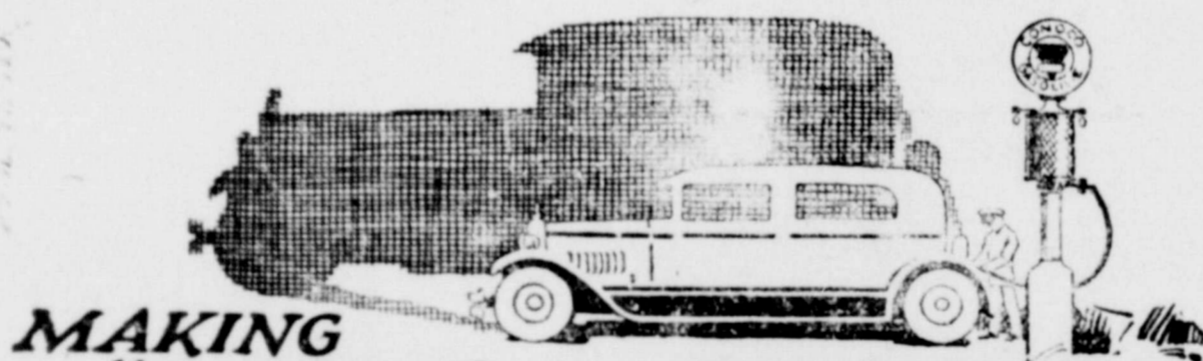
