## 2,500 School Children Parade

### Preparations Being Made For Marketing Turkeys

Both buyers and producers are getting in readiness for the marketing of Runnel's county's biggest turkey crop and never before was such a huge crop anticipated as that which will begin to come on the local market the latter part of this month.

When the frost is on the pumpkins and the nuts begin to fall, turkeys will begin to gobble and the farmers who produce them begin to smile.

Turkeys have proven to be the best money crop that can be raised and each year sees an increase in this industry. There will be operated in Ballinger, two or three and possibly more dressing plants, and the Texas Farm Bureau will also handle large numbers of the birds on foot. Shipping them by the carload will take place after the 1st of November.

The turkey dressing plants will furnish employment for several hundred people and will be the means of keeping people busy when otherwise the cotton picking season will have been closed.

Ladies, the wives of farmers, usually share heavily in turkey money and this money is usually spent for what the family needs in the way of wearing apparel. Several mortgages have been lifted off farms in years gone by through the sale of turkeys, also.

Some people enjoy their turkey money by the purchase of a new car for the family or by purchasing items for the home.

The estimated revenue for an average of five years is \$250,000 annually and with the other poultry products, including chickens and eggs, it is estimated that the industry releases into the channels of commerce each year something like \$100,000. Coming, as it does, at a season when farmers who own river land also have the turkey crop, a pecan crop and their other farm products all to market at one time, which turns an enormous amount of cash loose at this particular season.

Business will feel the benefits of the turkey money.

**BACHELOR KINGS  
BID FOR ITALY'S  
YOUNG PRINCESS**

ROME, Oct. 12.—The marriage of  
a beautiful Italian princess may  
rest the future peace of the Bal-  
kans.  
This is the belief in European  
political circles as regards the bid-  
ding of two European kings for the  
hand of Princess Giovanna, 21-  
year-old daughter of the Italian  
royal family.  
Thrown by the whirl of events  
into the central European political  
intrigues, this girl, now a sort of  
"security bond" for countries seek-  
ing Italian support, has become  
one of the most sought after of  
all princesses in Europe.  
Third daughter of the King and  
Queen of Italy, tall, with dark hair  
and clear-cut features, she is  
considered strikingly pretty.  
**Royal Offers**  
During the past few years numer-  
ous bids have been made for her  
hand by princes of royal houses,  
but her two main suitors are now

considered to be the newly pro-  
claimed king of the Albanians,  
Ahmed Zugo, and King Boris of  
Bulgaria.

The former, elevated by the aid  
of Italy to a throne which has  
long been regarded as stuffed with  
thorns, is known to be anxious to  
secure a final guarantee of Italian  
support by a personal union with  
the royal family.

On the day of his ascension to  
the throne it was intimated that  
he would pay a visit to Rome, pre-  
sumably for the purpose of asking  
the hand of Princess Giovanna.

On the other hand the betrothal  
of the princess to King Boris has  
long been a court rumor. It was  
two years ago that the rumor first  
gained ground, and only recently  
it was stated that negotiations  
with the Vatican to grant mutual  
concessions for the marriage, King  
Boris being a Greek Orthodox, were  
completed.

**Mussolini To Decide**  
However, it is generally believed  
that Mussolini is the deciding fig-  
ure in the background, and in some  
quarters it has been alleged that  
the Duce is using the princess as  
a puppet to strengthen the bonds  
of Italian friendship with her  
neighbors.

Undoubtedly with him lies the  
question as to whether this pret-  
ty young princess marries the Mo-  
hammadan monarch, Ahmed Zugo,  
or the man so often described as  
the "loneliest king in the world,"  
King Boris of Bulgaria.

**SARRAUT FINDS  
CLASH IMPENDS  
BETWEEN RACES**

LONDON, Oct. 12.—The greatest  
struggle between humanity that  
the world has ever seen will be  
experienced in the present cen-  
tury. It will be the long predicted  
clash between the white and col-  
ored races.

What the results will be the fu-  
ture can only decide, but unless a  
supreme effort is made the strug-  
gle will end in the greatest cata-  
strophe in history.

This is the opinion of M. Albert  
Sarraut, former governor-general  
of the French Far-Eastern domi-  
on of Indo China, and the present  
Minister of the Interior of France.

Writing in the London Referee,  
he warns that the colored peoples  
—one billion, two hundred million  
of them—are stirring everywhere.

"No longer awed by the Unity of

white man's supremacy is hence-  
forward posed in its most importun-  
ate and most redoubtable terms.

"The problem which dominates  
our age is the problem of the Pa-  
cific. The solution of this problem  
may decide the destiny of the  
whole world.

**Seething Masses**  
"And now these seething masses,  
urged on by Russian Communism,  
which presents itself from the  
Bosphorus to the Pacific as the  
liberator of the races from the  
Western yoke, are seeking a nation  
of their own breed powerful enough  
to become their champion against  
Americo-European hegemony."

That nation, M. Sarraut believes,  
will ultimately be Japan. A coun-  
try which, refused its petition for  
racial equality, is facing not only  
a population crisis but a crisis of  
personal dignity.

He asserts that the lapse of the  
Anglo-Japanese alliance has left  
Japan free to take the leadership  
and the command of the Asiatic  
bloc against the European bloc.

And he even goes so far as to

allege that Japan has been making  
formidable preparations for such a  
war for nearly half a century by  
"silently and patiently constitu-  
ing an impregnable defensive po-  
sition."

**ARCTIC FOSSILS IN COLLEC-  
TION SENT TO FIELD MUSEUM  
AIR PASSENGER LINE**

(By International News Service)  
CHICAGO, Oct. 12.—Sharat K.  
Roy, a member of the Expedition  
of Field Museum, just returned to  
Chicago with a collection of fossils  
believed to be the oldest and  
most complete ever brought from  
the Arctic regions. It has been an-  
nounced by Stephen C. Simms, di-  
rector of Field Museum of Natural  
History.

Roy is assistant curator of in-  
vertebrate paleontology at the mu-  
seum, and was the geologist of the  
Rawson expedition. The expedi-  
tion's schooner "Bowdoin" pen-  
etrated into the upper reaches of  
Frobisher Bay in Baffin Land, to  
within nine miles of the head of  
the bay, picking its way through  
uncharted shoals, reefs and islands.  
No other ship has ever proceeded  
so far in these hazardous waters.  
After the vessel was anchored, Roy  
set out in a motor boat still far-  
ther up the bay, and landed near  
Silliman's Fossil Mountain, where  
he did most of his collecting of  
specimens. The collections include  
many varieties of marine inverte-  
brates such as corals, sponges, tri-

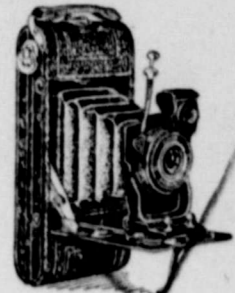
bolite, brachiopods, cephalopods,  
gastropods, and other creatures  
which lived more than 400,000,000  
years ago. The nature of this life  
indicates that in those early days  
the Arctic regions probably had a  
tropical climate, said Roy.

Last winter, when the expedition  
went into its winter quarters near  
Nain, Laborador, where a scientific  
station has been established, Roy  
took the ship to Newfoundland,  
where he made collections of fossils  
of marine invertebrates of that  
country, mostly trilobites, or pre-  
historic crablike animals of the  
Cambrian age, more than 500,000-  
000 years ago. Modern crustac-  
eans, and also the insects of the  
present day, are believed to be dis-  
tant cousins of these trilobites.

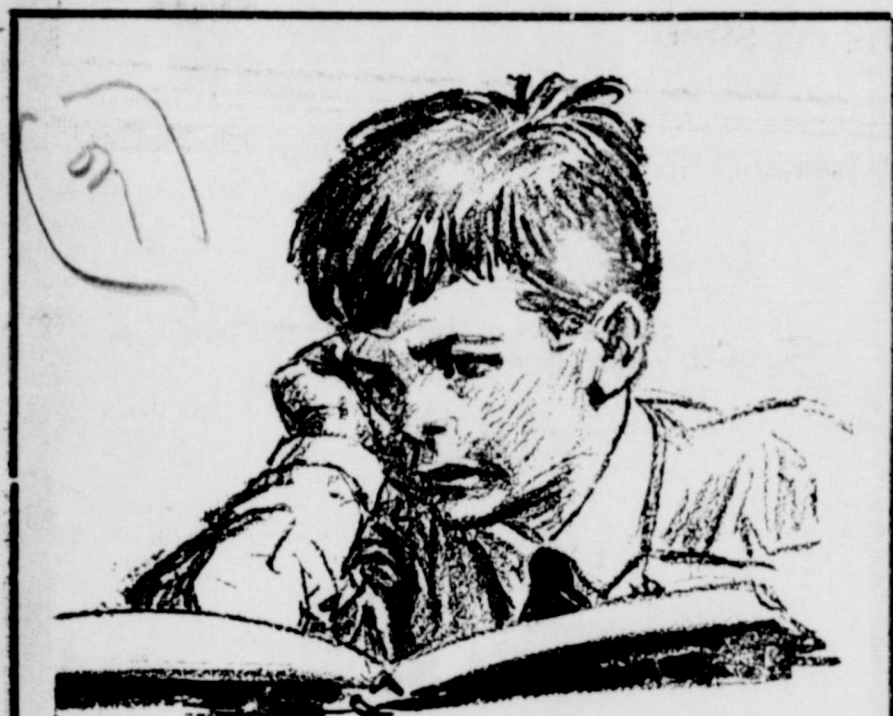

### BUDAPEST EXHIBITS EXPOSE BIG FRAUDS IN QUACK PRACTICE

BUDAPEST, Oct. 12.—An "Exhibition of Superstition," a most interesting and instructive show, exposing the frauds of quackery and revealing the stupidity of mankind, has been opened in Budapest in connection with the Medical Congress, which is being held there.

Magic herbs, amulets and fetishes, consisting of red maize, various tea-sorts, eggshells, or a dead frog,

achain or garlic, a wax goblet, a nail from a coffin, a snake stone in a bag, a rusty sickle, some ragdolls—such are the competitors of medical science still prevalent among the European peasantry, as well as among the primitive races of Africa or the South Sea Islands.

Idols, magic masks, amulets and graphic illustrations of superstitious practices prescribed by magicians, witches, and devil-expellers of the Australian bushmen and African savages are shown here in comparison with European (especially Hungarian) quackery and superstition.

The result of this comparison is by no means favorable to the "civilized" nations. Superstitions of the "white race" are not less foolish and are certainly more harmful, than those of the primitives. Quackery became more diversified with civilization, the simple magic developed into practices of mysti-

cism, hypnotism, occultism and spiritualism; magicians call themselves bombastic names, and the most "civilized" of them cure—by correspondence.

The evil wrought by them is made clear by this unique exposition, organized by Dr. G. Gotvay, Director of the Museum of National Hygiene in Budapest, which was recently established with the aid of the Rockefeller Foundation.

**BEER BIBBING BABIES IS NEW SOCIAL PROBLEM FOR DENVER WORKERS**

(By International News Service)  
 DENVER, Oct. 12.—Beer bibbing babies offer Colorado welfare workers a unique social problem, according to Dr. Arthur C. Cross of the extension division of the University of Colorado.

Dr. Cross, in a lecture before the Colorado conference for Social Workers, declared that many babies of foreign born parents living in Colorado were being fed on beer, wine and chili con carne almost from birth.

The foreign-born element of Colorado, according to Dr. Cross, lives in crowded sections where unsanitary conditions prevail. He gave warning that these sections were hotbeds for diphtheria and that the failure of most parents to vaccinate their children gave rise to a perpetual danger of an epidemic.

Much publicity, Dr. Cross pointed out, was given to Pennsylvania's smoking baby. Colorado, he said, can claim an equally unusual social problem in their beer drinking infants.
