One Seriously Injured in Fight Saturday Night

Three felony cases were filed in the justice court over the weekend to await the action of the grand jury. Six misdemeanors also were filed in justice court; three affrays, one simple assault and two drunkenness.

Kenneth Bruenhan was arrested Saturday night and charged with assault with intent to murder following an altercation which occurred near the fair grounds. According to the evidence in the case four boys from Millersview were going to the fair grounds together when they began quarreling and Bruenhan is alleged to have struck Claud Robbins in the head twice with a car crank, fracturing his skull with both blows and rendering him unconscious. Robbins was rushed to the sanitarium here where his wounds were dressed and slivers of bone removed from his brain. Very little hope is held for his recovery.

Claud Robbins, the victim, lived in Dallas and is married. He was with his brother who lives in Millersview and the rest of the crowd were Clyde Robbins, Roy Woodrass and the defendant, Kenneth Bruenhan. It is alleged that all four men were the best of friends and had come here to take in the fair together, and had been drinking some before starting for the grounds. When within about 100 feet of the gate the quarrel started which ended in the fight which may cost one man his life and another his freedom.

Bruenhan's bond was set at \$1000 and was made at once by his attorneys, Doss & Boynton.

Fannie Echols, a negro woman, was arrested and charged with hi-jacking a man by the name of Ray Grimes. Grimes left the vicinity of the Abilene & Southern depot Wednesday night of last week and started across a side street to Fair Park. He alleges that when he was about half way across that block that a negro man placed a revolver in his back and demanded that he hold his hands up. He complied with the request and the negro woman came in front of him and went through his pockets relieving him of \$45 in currency.

Grimes has identified the woman and she was arrested and her bond set at \$250. The man behind Grimes could not be identified because Grimes never got a look at him.

The sheriff's department raided the home of Perry Todd Saturday afternoon and secured 184 bottles of home brew. Perry Todd was arrested and charged with possession for the purpose of sale. His bond was fixed at \$500.

W. H. Gee, of Winters, pleaded guilty in Justice Court Monday to a vagrancy charge and possession of home brew and paid a fine of \$114.80. Gee was arrested Sunday by Winters deputies after watching Mexicans flock to the home of Gee and secure what is alleged to have been home brew. Gee has been living in Runnels county for many years and is well known.

Sanders Delivery Stopped by Writ

Sheriff R. E. McWilliams was served Saturday afternoon with a writ of habeas corpus which was granted by Judge J. O. Woodward at Coleman earlier in the afternoon, in the case of Paul Sanders, who is wanted in Mississippi for forgery.

One day last week Mr. McWilliams received a message stating that Sanders was in this part of the country and asking the sheriff to arrest him and notify the Mississippi officers. Sanders was located in Winters and later the same day the message came Sanders was made a prisoner in the county jail.

Saturday the sheriff received a message from a Mississippi officer at Austin, asking the sheriff to bring the prisoner to Brady and meet him there. The sheriff was busy but turned the prisoner over to Bob Miller, ex-sheriff of Concho county, who took Sanders to Brady.

When the writ was turned over to Deputy Sheriff John White it was five or six hours before he could get the sheriff and serve the writ. The delivery of the prisoner to the Jackson, Miss., officer was stopped and the prisoner placed in the Brady jail until the case is settled.

The securing of extradition papers from the governor at Austin by the Mississippi officer was contested and it is understood here that they were not granted and on that ground the writ was issued against the Runnels county sheriff.

Youth Hurt in Fall from Tree

Jerry Malish, 16 years old, who lives three miles south of Rowena, was seriously hurt Sunday afternoon about 3 o'clock when he fell from a pecan tree. The lad, with others, had gone to the Concho, six miles south of Rowena to gather pecans and young Malish had climbed a tree to thrash down some pecans when his foot slipped and he fell from a high tree to the ground.

He was taken to the home of his brother, R. A. Malish, who resides in Rowena and a doctor was called to attend him. Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock the boy had not regained consciousness but was mumbling and showing some signs of trying to talk. The doctor in charge stated Monday morning that he could find no broken bones or fractures and that he believed the boy would be all right unless internal injury developed.

G. W. Bittern, who lives three miles northwest of Littlefield, received three carloads of hogs from Benjamin for fattening purposes. On account of the large grain crop it is cheaper to move the hogs to the grain than to ship the grain to the stock.

Eight boys winning first place in the South Plains Fair were given a trip to the State Fair at Dallas by the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce. The boys were from eight different communities in the section.

The officers who were returning the negro passed through here last night with the intention of taking the prisoner to Gainesville. Reports of lynching threats resulted in their lodging him in the local jail.

The Eighth Annual Runnels County Fair passed into history Saturday night with the largest crowd ever to attend one performance. The giving away of the Ford car was the big drawing card and people from five counties were present when the grandstand show started. At the conclusion of the 11 acts on the stage, Mrs. L. R. Tigner, wife of a local jeweler, was declared the winner of the Ford.

Doc Holland shot a large display of fireworks and the big crowd was turned loose to take in the other attractions.

A serious traffic jam occurred immediately following the fireworks display when the 5000 people at the grandstand show started to the carnival grounds. The narrow bridge across the laundry ditch was not large enough to take care of the crowd going either way and with 3090 on each side

 FLASH—Washington, Oct. 15.—Poking its long nose out of the clear sky the Graf Zeppelin paid a fleeting visit to the National capital today. It arrived at 12:20 and passed on to Baltimore.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—The Graf Zeppelin today radioed the Navy Department that they would visit Washington, Baltimore and Philadelphia en route to Lakehurst. The message said that they expected to reach the latter place at 4 o'clock this afternoon.

They requested permission to fly over the cities named. The request was speedily granted by a return radio message. Dr. Hugo Eckner, the dirigible's commander, said that he expected to reach Washington at noon. The airship passed 15 miles northeast of the Norfolk naval base at 10:16. It changed its course and passed over Hogs Island at 10:22.

LAKEHURST, N. J., Oct. 15.—The Graf Zeppelin, after battling the elements for days in its epic flight from Friedrichshafen, Germany, was headed towards here this afternoon and expected to arrive by 3 o'clock if not earlier.

Reports from Baltimore stated that the giant airship passed there about 1 o'clock making good time. A great crowd is assembled here to greet the Germans and passengers aboard the dirigible.

There was much activity about the hangar of the Los Angeles which may fly out as an escort to the Zeppelin.

LAKEHURST, N. J., Oct. 15.—The transatlantic dirigible Graf Zeppelin wirelessly the naval station here this morning that they expected to land "at or before sunset." At 6:05 this morning the dirigible was 300 miles from Lakehurst and traveling in a north-westerly direction at a speed of about 42 miles per hour.

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—The Graf Zeppelin was sighted 55 miles southeast of Cape Henry by the Standard Oil tanker, James McGree, this morning, according to a radio picked up here by the Radio Corporation of America. Cape Henry is at the mouth of Chesapeake Bay.

DOG GET PLANE RIDE TO CURE HIS DEAFNESS; RESULT NOT YET KNOWN

(By International News Service) BALTIMORE, Oct. 15.—Chess has been given his first airplane ride in an effort to cure him of deafness. He is a Chesapeake Bay dog, two years old. Dr. J. W. Spranklin, veterinarian, 104th Medical Regiment, accompanied the dog on the flight. He read in a medical journal of a plane ride having cured a dog of faulty hearing.

It is not known whether the trip was beneficial. Chess still appears to be deaf to calls that attract other dogs. The veterinarian said that when the supports of the plane swung against the air on the downward swoop, Chess howled. He either heard the whirring sound or felt the vibration of the air currents against him, the veterinarian said. Anyway Chess is due for another air treatment soon.

During the last two sessions of congress, those working in Washington in the interests of agriculture have known and felt keenly the force of his brilliant mind in his attempts to block their every effort. The last veto message in its violent language and lack of sympathy and knowledge of agriculture was much more like Hoover than Coolidge. His early life as the son of a blacksmith, his training as a mining engineer, his experience and associations, and finally his public life as the secretary of commerce have all tended to prevent his acquiring any knowledge of or sympathy with agricultural problems, just as they have fostered his sympathy with big business—the recipient of governmental privilege. Hoover could never be neutral and consequently he is the enemy of agriculture whenever a question arises between the rights of agriculture and the privileges of protected industry and commerce.—The Progressive Farmer.

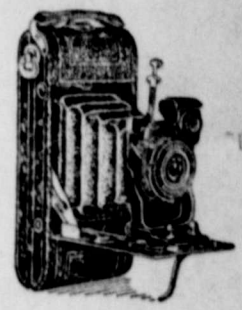
Sues for Injury To Wooden Leg

(By International News Service) AUSTIN, Oct. 15.—You can't collect on a broken wooden leg under Texas law, at least under the Workmen's Compensation Act. It was held by the Board of Control in a decision here that M. A. Kolb, who had his wooden leg smashed while working for the L. W. Stoltz Marble and Granite Works of Beaumont, was not entitled to any damages for the wooden structure. Kolb failed to show that he had grounds for claiming injury to the physical structure of his body as specified in the law naming possible grounds for recovery, it was

held by the board. It was found that he returned to work the second day after the accident and that bruises and abrasions he received were of a minor nature. He was taking a monument to a cemetery when the accident occurred.

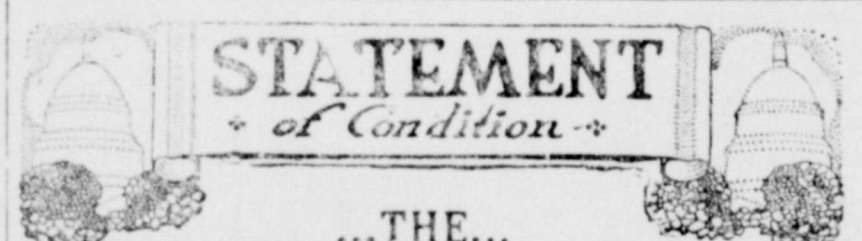

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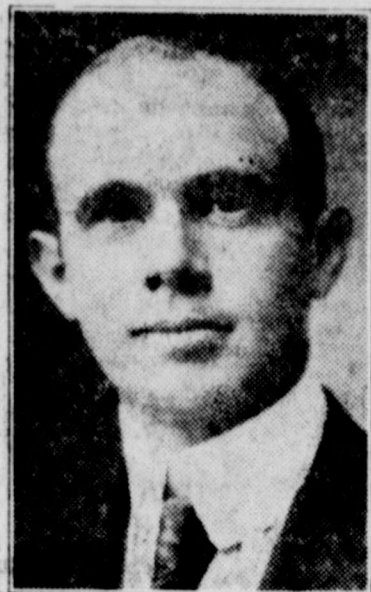

COLEMAN, Oct. 15.—Plans are going right along for the biggest Armistice Day celebration ever held in this part of the country by the Ray Post No. 213 of the American Legion of Coleman.

Several Legion posts around Coleman will be here in a body with their uniforms, guns, flags, etc., and be in the mammoth parade which will be held on the morning of November 10.

Arrangements are being made to have several bands here including the Simmons University Cowboy Band and other bands of note.

The feature of the big celebration will be the round-up which will be staged at the West Texas League Park for three days, Nov. 10, 11 and 12. Thousands of dollars in cash prizes will be offered for the different cowboy events.

A band of real Comanches will be here to take part in the big doin's and they will have their tepee village at the round-up grounds and will sell bead work and other Indian novelties to the visitors. The Indians will also give their dances in the arena at each performance of the round-up. The Indians will be headed by the famous Chief Ho-koa-bitty, the only survivor of the famous battle of the Dobbie Walls on the north Texas plains, and one of the few left who were in the bloody battle of Wounded Knee.

One of the features of the round-up will be the drilling contest between the local National Guard company and a National Guard company of Brownwood. This contest will be held in the arena on the second of the celebration which will be Sunday, November 11. Great interest is being taken over this drilling contest as both National Guard companies are fine drilling organizations and a hard contest is expected.

THIEVES GET BOOTY FROM MANCHU TOMB

(By International News Service) LONDON, Oct. 9.—Additional details of the rifling of the tombs of five Manchu emperors near Peking are contained in dispatches recently reaching here from China.

According to three Manchu princes, who visited the tombs of their ancestors, two sepulchres, those of the famous Emperor Chien Lung and the Empress Dowager, received the worst treatment at the hands of the desecrators. The body of the Empress, semi-nude, was found amid the ruins of her coffin, with remnants of her imperial robes strewn around her.

Although the precise extent of the robbery is not yet known, the belief that very valuable booty is missing is supported by the fact that pearls and jade of great price have recently been offered for sale in Peking and Tientsin. The authorities are attempting to trace the sellers of the jewels.

Preliminary estimates place the loss at \$15,000,000, this amount representing fifty pounds of the finest pearls which were among the treasures of Chien Lung.

Proper Feeding Makes Big Hog

(By International News Service) TYLER, Oct. 15.—What proper care and feeding will do in raising hogs is graphically shown in a contrast offered by Lewis Chapman, a Pig Club member of Smith county, who has made a high record in raising hogs on his father's farm.

Lewis took two pigs from the same litter, both weighing 29 pounds at the time the feeding period was started. Feeding and caring for one of the pigs according to instructions given him in the club under the direction of County Agent E. Gentry, the boy produced a hog weighing 270 pounds. The other pig, which was given the usual care and feeding on the farm, without scientific methods, weighed only 78 pounds at the end of the experiment period.

Lewis entered his 270 pound pig in the East Texas Fair here in

September and took first money for the best boar under six months of age in the Duroc Jersey division.

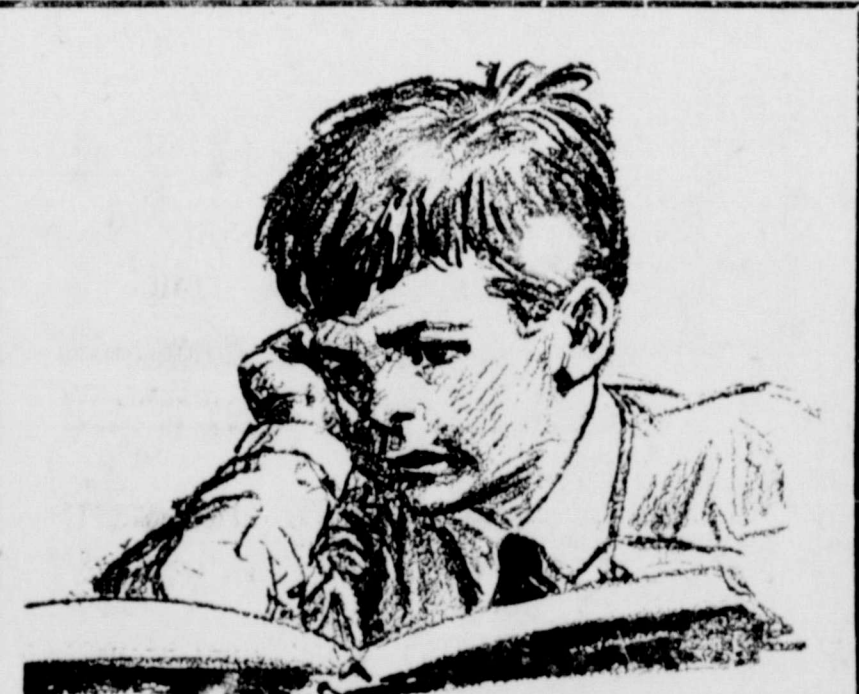

Local Creamery Enjoys Big Trade

The Runnels County Co-Operative Creamery, which has been running for the last two months under the management of C. A. Womack, is now on the road to success according to Wix Currie, president of the firm.

J. E. Taylor is the new head of the manufacturing department and under his direction and care are all items which are to be made into something different from their original state. Mr. Taylor was for several years associated with Alta-Vista Creamery and the Boswell Creameries of Fort Worth and is said to understand every phase of the business.

The company's products are being used freely in Ballinger homes and elsewhere. The supply of cream and milk is far short of the demand, and it is apparent that the county needs just about twice as many milch cows as it now has.

The shipments of butter to distant cities is steadily increasing, and by the end of the present year it is estimated that the demand for these products will be much larger.

The use of pasteurized milk is becoming more and more popular and this item alone is bringing good returns for the investment. The sales of butter have been excellent.

Mr. Currie stated that their customers now state that the quality of their butter, buttermilk and pasteurized milk was of the very highest, and the patrons of the company were of the unanimous opinion that these items are now

better than ever before. The company will be out of debt and on a paying basis before long and the stockholders will then begin to realize returns on their investment.
