1 DEAD, SEVERAL HURT IN ACCIDENTS

Boy Injured in Fall With Horse

The small pony ridden by Arthur Dose, Jr., age 10 years, slipped on the pavement on Broadway near the home of Claude Wilmet Friday evening at about 6 o'clock and threw the boy to the hard surface, his head striking the pavement which caused a concussion of the brain. The boy rallied, however, at 3 o'clock Saturday morning and unless unforeseen complications develop, it is thought that aside from being sore from the shock of the fall, that he will recover without further trouble.

The boy was picked up by parties who had stopped at the scene of the fall and rushed to the local sanitarium where aid was administered. His father was 18 miles out in the country and could not be communicated with for some time. Mr. Dose made the trip to town hurriedly when he received word of the accident and, with his wife and other members of the family, spent the night at the bedside of the injured boy.

A sad atmosphere prevailed in Ballinger following the accident as Arthur, Jr., has many friends in the city who were heart-broken at the news of his serious accident; and a nervous tension was apparent about the sanitarium, owing to the uneasiness of relatives and friends.

Arthur, Jr., has ridden a horse most of his life and this was his favorite pastime. He is a regular member of the Sunday school class taught by Mrs. Harry Lynn, in the First Presbyterian church, a member of the third grade in the Ballinger grammar school and a boy loved by all his associates.

Commission and Board Disagree

(By International News Service)
AUSTIN, Oct. 19.—Whether or not the state highway equipment engineer was consulted when the Highway Commission prepared its requisition for equipment is the latest bone of contention in the several months old row between the commission and the State Board of Control.

R. B. Walthall, chairman of the board, in a statement issued here, said in part:

"The member of the board of control in charge of the purchasing division has given a great deal of time and study to these matters and is relying a good deal, also, I believe, on the judgment of the state highway equipment engineer; a man who is paid a very good salary by the state and is, at least, presumed to be an expert in these matters. As I understand, this man was not consulted and knew nothing about the recommendation of the engineer until it appeared in the press."

Chairman R. S. Sterling of the highway commission, has in turn issued a statement denying Walthall's charge. Sterling said:

"The truth is that the equipment engineer of the department as well as the maintenance engineer, was asked for his recommendation in writing; and each of them made his recommendation in writing; they coincided in nearly every particular; in most instances they made joint recommendations as to the machinery and equipment to be purchased, and the final recommendation of the highway engineer to the commission and then to the board of control followed, in most particulars, the recommendations of the equipment engineer and the maintenance engineer."

Two Children Slip from Mother's Arms and Fall to Their Death

Hickman's Brain Above Average

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 20.—The body of William Edward Hickman, kidnaper and slayer of little Marion Parker, lies in Holy Cross Cemetery today. A few hours after he was hanged yesterday at San Quentin Penitentiary, the University of California Medical School performed an autopsy, which disclosed that Hickman had died from strangulation and not from a broken neck. It was also disclosed that Hickman's brain weighed 1620 grams, about 200 more than the average man, but was normal and apparently he was sane at the time of meeting death. It was also disclosed that he had sustained two blows on his head when he fell through the trap after fainting.

District Court Convenes Monday

This will be Judge Woodward's last term of court in Ballinger, for this year, at least, as he will step down and out and turn the job over to Judge Miller, of Brownwood, who was the successful aspirant to this office in the recent primary election. For this reason it is thought the present judge will make every effort to leave the court docket as nearly clear as is possible.

The grand jury, which will be empaneled on Monday, will have much work to do and will doubtless get some specific instructions from the court with relation to certain evils and law violations existing in this county.

NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—Mrs. Milton Waldman, daughter of the late Benjamin Guggenheim, was under the influence of sedatives today from hysteria caused by the fall of her two children, age four and one years, from her arms, while watching the crowds beneath.

The children fell 13 stories from the roof of the Hotel Plaza to the roof of an adjoining building, when Terrence, age four, attempted to crowd into his mother's arms while she was holding Benjamin, age one.

LONDON, Oct. 20.—Milton Waldman, assistant editor of the London Mercury, whose two sons were killed when they fell from their mother's arms from the roof of a New York apartment hotel late yesterday, prepared to leave for home today. He was grief stricken and unable to fully comprehend the tragedy.

Will Redistrict Oil-Gas Lands

AUSTIN, Oct. 20.—The redistricting of oil and gas supervision districts which involves the creations of a new district and the consolidation of two others, was announced today by R. D. Parker, chief of the oil and gas division of the railroad commission.

The new district will be created by the division of counties in the extreme western portion of the state. It was formerly one large district and will include the Winkler county field. H. H. Fitzgerald will have charge.

Because of the decrease in oil activity the Mexia and Corsicana districts will be consolidated as District No. 5, and will be under Deputy Supervisor F. H. Pierson at Corsicana.

W. H. Llaughter was given charge of the new District No. 9 composed of 18 counties with headquarters at Big Springs. The order is effective for November 1st.

Injured Man On Way to Recovery

Claude Robbins, of Dallas, who has been confined in the local sanitarium since last Saturday night when he was hit over the head, allegedly by Kenneth Brushenham, near the entrance to Fair Park, was reported Saturday morning to be recovering nicely, although particles of his shattered skull were picked from his brain following the difficulty. It is stated by attending physicians that a plate will be inserted to fill a space in his skull.

A party of four men, all of Millersview except Robbins, who had moved from that place to Dallas, were on their way to the fair grounds, and it is alleged that they had been drinking and had an argument which ended in a fight between the two men. Brushenham is alleged to have picked up the crank of an automobile and hit Robbins over the head with it twice. He was arrested and later released under bond in the sum of \$1000 which was made by his attorneys, Doss & Boynton. Brushenham is a son-in-law of J. W. Barr, Millersview merchant.

3 Wrecks On Winters Road

Three wrecks have occurred on the Winters-Ballinger highway in the last 36 hours and in each instance the vehicles were badly wrecked, but luckily no person has yet been seriously hurt.

Higginbotham Bros. ambulance drivers received a call last night to rush to the scene of an accident about 9:30 which occurred shortly this side of Hatchel. However, upon arriving at the place it was found that a man about 40 years of age and a boy about 15, who had been riding in a small coupe, had overturned the car in a ditch, but neither was seriously hurt, the man receiving several bruises and skinned places over the body, but the boy escaped injury. The radius rod came loose and precipitated this accident.

A Mexican, herding an old touring car down the road, lost control of the car on the second bridge or culvert, over a ravine between Ballinger and Old Runnels, about 8:30 Friday evening, the car going over the railing and landing in the gulch below, smashing the car considerably, but aside from bruising and stunning the "hombre" he sustained no serious injuries.

A big commercial truck was overturned in the road four miles out of Ballinger, where the Old Runnels road intersects the new one, near the home of Kimble Wood, and besides smashing the cab of the truck and doing some damage to the merchandise contained therein, no one was injured seriously. The truck was loaded very heavily with tires, tubes, canned fruits, vegetables, etc. This accident occurred on Thursday afternoon, and it was necessary to maintain a guard over the merchandise over-night.

Fire Damage Is \$1,000,000

The building was owned by Earl Leatherman, former prohibition agent, in charge of the liquor conspiracy cases in the district.

Tyler, chiropractor, who died at a local hospital shortly after he was wounded on the front porch of the officer's home. Frazier declared that he fired only after Tyler made a move towards his hip.

Pipe Line Worker Dies in Sanitarium

Jack Belk, age 41 years, died at the Halley & Leve Sanitarium at 6 o'clock Saturday morning from the effects of injuries sustained when a truck carrying 10 men, overturned on the Ballinger-Talpa highway about four miles west of Talpa. Two other men were injured but not seriously. The accident happened at 6 o'clock Friday evening when the men, part of the construction crew for the new pipe line being laid across this county by the Atlantic Pipe Line company, were returning to Ballinger from their work. Belk's last address was given as Garza Lake, Dallas, Texas. He is survived by his widow and two children.


At 6:05 o'clock Friday evening Higginbotham Bros. received a call for their ambulance to come to the scene of an accident which had occurred four miles west of Talpa. The ambulance returned to Ballinger about 7 o'clock, bringing Jack Belk, who was suffering from internal injuries, sustained in the wreck. The accident happened when the truck hit loose dirt, which had been dragged upon the road by a road drag. Nine other men besides Belk were on the truck when it overturned.

All the men were employees of the Atlantic Pipe Line company, and the truck on which they were riding was operating under the company's direction, and was said to have been traveling at a high rate of speed when it hit the loose dirt.

By papers in his pockets and by information obtainable from the company's records, Belk's name, address and age were ascertained. It was also revealed that he had in his pockets at the time of the accident about \$50 in money and a check for a month's labor. In all the currency and check amounted to something over \$200. Funeral arrangements for Belk

Chemists Seek Way to Combat Poisonous Gas

(By International News Service)
NEW YORK, Oct. 20.—The Chemical Warfare Service sees success ahead in its efforts to provide protection against carbon dioxide, Major General Amas A. Fries, U. S. A., chief of the service, discloses in "Industrial and Engineering Chemistry," a journal of the American Chemical Society. "Carbon Dioxide, the twin brother to carbon monoxide, but not so dangerous, is a product of ordinary combustion and of the respiration of men and animals," says General Fries summarizing progress in the development of by-products of chemical warfare to shield workers from industrial poisons.

"The question of eliminating the injurious effects of carbon dioxide in places where adequate ventilation cannot be secured is an important industrial problem."

Military Importance
"It is of direct military importance at the present time owing to the necessity of providing some means of combatting poisonous effects of carbon monoxide in submarines when the crews are entrapped therein, through accident or other emergency, as in the recent collision of the S-4."

"The Chemical Warfare Service is now endeavoring to find some means of solving this problem. It appears, that, although difficult, a solution will ultimately be found, and when found will prove of very great value commercially."

"As most of the industrial poisons common in hazardous industries have been proposed as effective chemical warfare agents, the Chemical Warfare Service has studied very extensively the problem of protection against these poisons. Such protective measures are, of course, directly applicable to industry and have proved a boon to those engaged in many hazardous occupations."

Dangerous Poison
"Carbon monoxide is one of the most dangerous industrial poisons because of its lack of odor, color, and taste and its widespread prevalence. Although its physical properties are not such as to make

it a practical chemical warfare agent, yet it was often encountered during the World War and protection against it was a serious problem.

"The explosion of high explosives in enclosed places, such as dugouts, interior of a ship, etc., causes the generation of deadly concentrations of carbon monoxide. Machine-gun fire in tanks and pill boxes and the use of explosives in sapping operations are also responsible for carbon monoxide casualties in war."

"Industrially, carbon monoxide is encountered very generally. It is a constituent of the usual illuminating gas supplied to cities for heat and light, and is the cause of many deaths each year. It is also present in the exhaust gases of gasoline engines, in boiler rooms with defective ventilation, in fires, and in general wherever combustion is incomplete."

Seek Protection
"Because of its deadly character both in war and in peace this gas has been very intensively studied by the Chemical Warfare Service, particularly with a view to providing some practical method of protection against it."

"Up to within a few years ago the only devices that could be used were the oxygen helmet and the hose mask. These devices were so bulky and handicapped the wearer so much that they were not practicable in many cases."

"The development of a mask with a self-contained canister for protection against carbon monoxide was first undertaken by the Chemical Warfare Service at the request of the Navy Department for protection of sailors in submarines in case of accident to machinery when submerged."

"As a result of extensive re-

search the Chemical Warfare Service has devised a mask which affords complete protection against carbon monoxide for a limited time, and by changing canisters indefinite protection can be afforded.

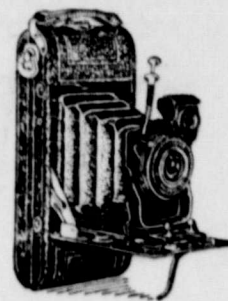
FRENCH WOMEN SHOW DISLIKE FOR SHOOTING; FEW LICENSES ISSUED

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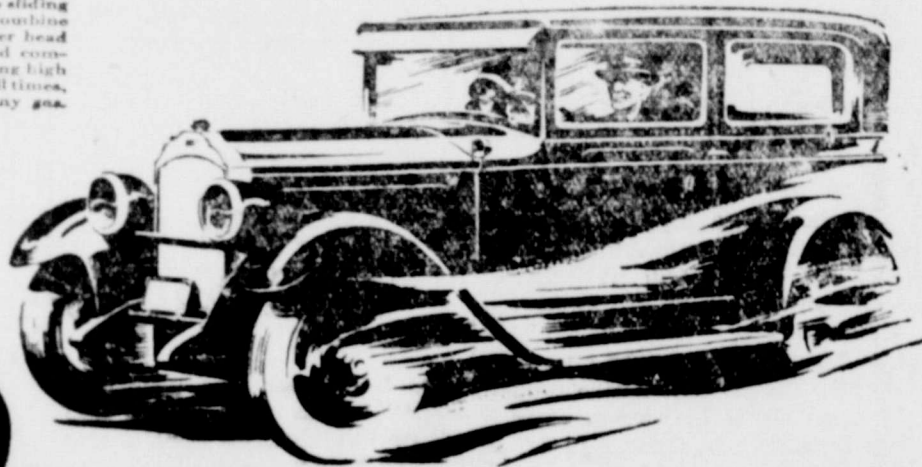

NEW KIND OF CENSUS COUNTING ONLY ADULTS IS PLANNED FOR BRITAIN

LONDON, Oct. 20.—A new type of "census" is to take place in Britain before Christmas. It will be confined to the adult population and its object will be to prepare a new electoral register in

An interesting feature is that women voters will not be asked to declare their age. They will simply have to answer "Yes" or "No" to the question "Are you 21 years of age or over?" on a certain date.

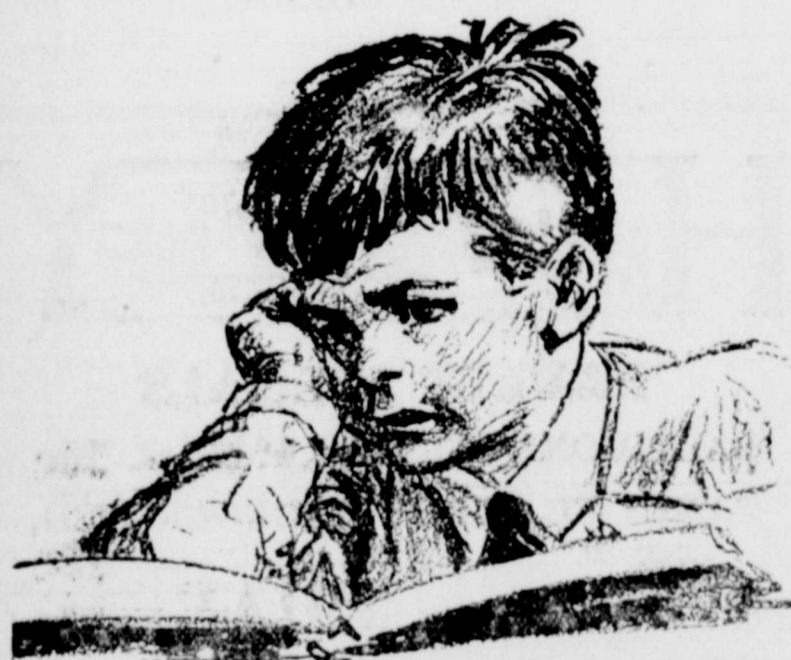


