Earthquake Felt In Texas Town

(By International News Service)
EL PASO, Nov. 1.—Earthquake tremors felt here and at Juarez last night. Several houses at Guadalupe, a small village south of Juarez, collapsed according to reports from there. Much alarm was manifested here as the quake was felt. It was the first tremor felt here in five years and many people rushed into the streets.

DENVER, Nov. 1.—A severe earthquake recorded as of first magnitude, was reported today by Father Forestall, seismograph expert and professor at Regis College here. The quake was one hour and 15 minutes in duration, reaching a maximum intensity at 9:18 last night. The expert located the distance at 700 miles away and probably in Texas or Arizona.

Pickers Will Start Friday

With the fields too wet to pick cotton, many farmers were in Ballinger Thursday attending to business. Most farmers expressed the opinion that they could start pickers in the fields again Friday except in low places and in cotton where the stalks were extremely large and covered the ground excluding the sunshine.

No damage has been reported from the rain this week to cotton in the field. The dampness for several days before the hard rains caused the burr to close to some extent and hold the locks firmer. The only heavy rain came Wednesday at noon and cotton withstood the beating rain with scarcely any being beaten out onto the ground.

More than half the cotton in the county is gathered and with the pickers who are now in the county keeping busy it will not require many more weeks to get most of the good cotton gathered. Many fields have been picked over while in some sections the stalk is almost white with open cotton.

NAWAB OF BHOPAL PLANS TO MAKE HIS DAUGHTER SUCCESSOR TO REIGN

LONDON, Nov. 1.—The Nawab of Bhopal, the second greatest Mohammedan prince in India has decided that his state shall revert to its tradition of rule by women, and has nominated his daughter to succeed him.

Bhopal, with its million subjects, is the only state in India where, until the accession of the present Nawab, Mohammed Hamidullah Khan, women ruled uninterruptedly for nearly a century.

His mother, the famous Begum of Bhopal, ended a long succession of able and enlightened queens who, by public choice, supplanted men claimants to the throne and ruled the state with a strong authority and progressive ability.

The strong personality and able pleading of the Begum induced the British Government two years ago to break age-old traditions by consenting to her wish to alter the succession from her grandson to her own surviving son, the present Nawab.

Postal Receipts Show Good Gain

Postmaster J. A. Reese announced a nice gain in the postal receipts for the month of October. The total gain amounted to \$231.35 over the receipts for the same month of 1927. October 1928 receipts amounted to \$2,293.31.

The local postoffice has made a substantial gain every month this year with the exception of one and with the two big months left will show for the year 1928 a gain that Ballinger will be proud of.

The business that is being done by the postoffice at Ballinger is deserving of a new federal building and every effort should be put forth to obtain one.

BUDAPEST MAN SEEKING WIFE THROUGH LOTTERY; OFFERS 10,000 TICKETS

BUDAPEST, Nov. 1.—A marriage lottery is the latest sensation of Budapest. One of the biggest Hungarian newspapers, the "Budapesti Hirlap," publishes an astonishing proposal from a young man, who after announcing his intention of marrying, asks the paper to issue ten thousand lottery tickets at 2 Pengoes (35 cents) each, which may be bought by women (physical deformities not excluded) in want of a husband.

The writer states his age, occupation, address, religion and testifies to the genuineness of his letter by the signatures of two witnesses. He offers to the editorial office 500 Pengoes (\$85) for the expenses and an additional payment of 500 Pengoes.

The paper, however, declined the offer and conceals the name, because an editorial conference decided that this matrimonial idea is an immoral one. Although it is pointed out that the lottery-husband would win in addition to a wife, 20,000 Pengoes (3500) as the lottery is based upon a bet.

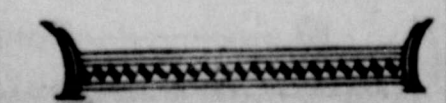

LONDON FOLLOWS CHICAGO WITH DOWNTOWN GARAGES

CHICAGO, Nov. 1.—Following the trend in Chicago and other metropolitan cities, in which large garages have been constructed in the downtown districts, London is building two structures near Victoria Station and in Park Road, Regents Park, that will house 1,000 automobiles each, according to the Chicago Motor Club.

Claude Graham White, noted aviator, heads the projects. The garages are modeled on the lines of the Grand Central Station, New York, and will have separate roadways for cars going up and coming down. Each building will be eight stories high.

U. S. MAIL PLANES TO FLY 10,000,000 MILES IN 1929 YEAR'S SCHEDULES SHOW

(By International News Service)
CHICAGO, Nov. 1.—Planes flying United States mail this year will fly more than half as much as the total mileage flown by mail, express and passenger planes in Europe, show figures released by the American Air Transport Association.

The total mileage to be flown by the mail planes of this country this year will be approximately 7,600,000. The total mileage flown by all European countries last year was 14,129,000. The association's figures show that Germany led all European countries in mileage flown last year with nearly 6,000,000 miles. France 3,755,000, while planes of Great Britain, Italy, Netherlands, and Poland flew less than one million but more than one-half million miles. Planes of Switzerland, Sweden, Czechoslovakia flew between one-half and one-fourth of a million miles. The American mail plane flights of 7,600,000 miles this year do not include a substantial mileage flown by passenger craft operated by the mail carriers.

The association's figures show that the mail planes during 1929 will fly more than 10,000,000 miles, exclusive of strictly passenger plane service supplementing the mileage of the mail carriers.

GAS USED FOR BOTH HEATING AND COOLING

For several years past, the gas industry has been engaged in research work to determine the feasibility of using gas for cooling as well as heating purposes. It is expected that within a short time the experiments will show practical possibilities of such a combined house heating, cooling and ventilating system.

The forerunner of this is the gas refrigerator, which is already in general use.

By means of gas heat, ammonia within the machine is converted into a gas which is cooled by water and in this expanded, cooled state, readily absorbs heat from the interior of the refrigerator. This heat is then carried off by circulating water.

When a burning gas flame can create either intense heat or ice, and either cool or warm a house, we are indeed living in the age of miracles.

FORM NEW CORPORATION TO BUILD AIRPLANES FOR COMMERCIAL PURPOSES

(By International News Service)
NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—A new corporation to assume a large place in the field of airplane construction for commercial purposes is announced with the merger of the Keystone Aircraft corporation of Bristol, Pa., and the Loening Aeronautical Engineering corporation of New York.

The Keystone company has been prominent, since its organization in 1920 as a builder of military planes for the U. S. Army and Navy and for foreign governments. A new 20-passenger Wright-engine transport plane is now under production for use on new air transport lines.

The Loening corporation announced simultaneously an award of a contract from the army air service for construction of eight new type observation amphibian planes. Under Grover and Albert Loening the company was one of the first to manufacture planes for private owners in 1917.

Edgar N. Gott, president of the Keystone company, said it was planned to operate both plants as separate units.

AMERICAN BUILT SUPER-LINERS IN FORWARD STRIDE

By Theodore B. Goetz
International News Service Staff Correspondent

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—In addition to cutting the time of a transatlantic voyage, construction of speedy super-liners of new design and development of American sea power represents the greatest possible forward stride in the building of American world trade, according to Laurence R. Wilder, chairman of the Transoceanic Corporation of the United States and one of the country's most successful shipbuilders.

The Transoceanic corporation has been working toward the development of fleets of American-built and American-owned ships since its purchase three years ago of the New York Shipbuilding corporation from P. A. S. Franklin, chairman of the International Mercantile Marine corporation, Matthew Brush and their associates. The plant was the largest and best equipped in the world.

Wilder put forth his views and announced some of his plans in a speech here before the Propeller Club, an organization of shipping men.

Build Sea Power

"National economic necessity, national defense and public consciousness demand that we build adequate sea power," Wilder said.

"The trade is there and the problem is solely that of adequately serving it. It is our trade. Its service desires and requirements are known. It wants improved speed, frequency and reliability. It can have it and at no greater cost. It is purely a matter of mass transportation, of which we are nationally past masters.

"In our consideration of where to start the rebuilding of an adequate merchant marine we turned to the sea route which has the heaviest national traffic—the North Atlantic. More than 70 per cent of the total of all passenger traffic between our country and all foreign ports crosses this route. More than 50 per cent of all our foreign mail and more than 50 per cent of the total of our exported and imported foodstuffs, semi and finished manufactures of all kinds, are carried to and from European countries. In other words, more than one-half of our entire foreign passenger, mail and freight traffic is carried in this service."

Wilder cited how the United States is losing this volume of trade through inadequate sea power.

Atlantic passenger traffic 70 per cent is ours, of cabin class, 60 per cent. Of this total we are now carrying 12 per cent. Of the total of our exports and imports, of manufactured food products, we are transporting 4 per cent in American flag ships on this route.

"The market for the services of adequate American ships is clearly well developed in the North Atlantic. It requires only the right ships and proper operation of these ships profitably to absorb this business. If our ships supply the equivalent or better service at the same cost, our ever-increasing foreign passenger, express and freight business will follow the flag.

"Summed up, primarily because our trade exists in such volume on the North Atlantic, we can build ships to render far better service and operate them at lower cost than our foreign competitors, without subsidy or subvention. The Jones-White bill provides adequate mail pay for service rendered. As this is not available to our foreign competitors, it is an item of revenue which, properly used, will provide a war chest which should discourage improper competition.

COLDS AND INDIGESTION KEEP GIRLS FROM OFFICE MORE THAN MEN FOLKS

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—Colds, indigestion and other illnesses keep girls away from the office more frequently than men, a survey among the 4,000,000 men and women employed in office clerical work reveals.

Results of an analysis of conditions in a business organization which employs 10,000 clerical workers, are announced by the Metropolitan Life Insurance company and lead to these conclusions. The Metropolitan conducted the survey as a contribution to the study of public health in industry.

Indigestion, common colds, grippe and tonsillitis in the order named are responsible for the greater part of absences from the office—or are the excuses most frequently offered.

Divided according to gender there were 1.3 absences per clerk for various illness among the men and 3.2 among the girls, making the absence rate 78 per cent higher for the women employees.

HOW TO SAY NOTHING ON TELEPHONE EXPLAINED BY COMPANY BULLETIN

BOSTON, Nov. 1.—How to say zero in telephone parlance was explained by a bulletin issued by the American Telephone and Telegraph Company.

Answering the question: "When is zero not zero?" the bulletin said: "Evidently, when calling a telephone number. For example take the number 2970. In calling this number, one does not ask for two-nine-seven-zero, nor does he say two-nine-seven-ought. Neither is it correct for him to say two-nine-seven-naught. In other words, in telephone parlance, zero is neither zero, ought or naught, rather, it is oh and the correct way to pronounce the number is two-nine-seven oh.

"However, when the number gets into the thousands and ends with two zeros, then the zero isn't even an oh. Main 4800 becomes Main four-eight-hundred, but Main 5000 is Main five-thousand. However, if the two zeroes come at the beginning of the number, as Canal 0027, the way to pronounce it is Canal, oh-oh-two-seven."

Woman "Dry" Leader for Smith

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 1.—Mrs. Emily Newell Blair, nationally known magazine writer, strongly identified with women "dry" forces throughout the South and Middle West has returned to active participation in politics and begun a speaking campaign in Missouri in behalf of the candidacy of Governor Alfred E. Smith. She will direct her appeal particularly to "dry" women voters, in the belief that the election of Governor Smith is the only hope for an adequate trial of prohibition enforcement.

Mrs. Blair has a vast audience of women readers through her articles which have appeared in such magazines as Century, Harper's, The Independent, The Nation, The Ladies Home Journal and other magazines for women. Formerly vice chairman of the democratic national committee and a leader in political and social circles in Washington, D. C. for several years, she recently withdrew from active participation in politics. Her decision to return was made in the hope of clarifying for her women followers the prohibition issue as it enters into the present campaign.

"I admire Governor Smith tremendously and have so admired him for years," Mrs. Blair declared in an interview here today. "In view of his record and his stand on various important issues, I do not understand how any democratic woman can fail to support him whether she be 'wet' or 'dry'."

"A magazine issued by the Board of Temperance of the Christian church recently pointed out that this election can not be deemed a referendum on the wet and dry issue, in view of the fact that Herbert Hoover has made no positive declaration, but has merely promised to pursue the policies of Mr. Coolidge.

"In other words, he has promised less than Governor Smith, who has said he favors modification of the Eighteenth Amendment by law. What we have now is nullification of the Eighteenth Amendment by method. It is the farical 'enforcement' of prohibition under a republican administration that has made Governor Smith's stand possible.

"Governor Smith has promised enforcement of prohibition while the law stands as it is now on the statute books. We have every reason to assume, in view of his past record, that he means it. He does not stand with 'bunko' politicians. When he makes promises he keeps them—that is his main strength."

To those who profess "Tammany" as a reason for opposing Governor Smith, Mrs. Blair said she would point out that by voting for Hoover, they were endorsing Mellonism and Vore-ism. Although

a Protestant, she declared she had no feeling whatsoever on the religious question, and did not believe it should enter into the campaign.

On the positive side, she declared, she would urge support of Governor Smith because "he stands for fundamental economic things that are vitally important." Chief among them she believes, are public ownership and control of water power and public utilities.

WISCONSIN REAL ESTATE INCREASES \$250,000,000

MADISON, Wis., Oct. 31.—All property in the State of Wisconsin has increased more than \$250,000,000 in the past year according to the state assessment announced by the state tax commission. More than three-fifths of this increase in value is in Milwaukee county alone. In 28 counties of the state, most of them agricultural, the assessment of property tumbled. In counties where the assessment increased there were cities within the lines.

The total value of all property in the state, real estate and personal is \$5,872,402,648 as compared with \$5,619,042,169 a year ago. This is an increase in value of \$352,360,479.

FIND METEOR CRATER IN CENTRAL OREGON

(By International News Service)
BEND, Ore., Nov. 1.—Another "pock mark" on the earth's surface, believed to have been caused by a huge meteor, has been discovered in central Oregon. The new meteor crater is reported to rival the noted crater in Arizona for markings, if not in size.

Natives in the territory surrounding the crater have known of the depression for years, referring to it as "the hole in the ground." It remained for Walter J. Perry, student of geology and paleontology, to explore the crater and make a detailed survey of its characteristics.

The dent is half a mile from lip to lip and descends at a uniform angle to a depth of 250 feet while about the rim a strata of lava rock appears uniformly fractured.

According to Perry, polarized rocks composed of heavy black material are to be found on the crater's rim and slopes. These, he believes, are fragments of the heavenly body.

To his friend, Thomas Burke, English novelist, the star of "The Circus" told the genesis of his own concept of a screen character, the be-caned, be-moustached, be-der-bied Charlie Chaplin, with a laugh in either huge foot. Writing in an English newspaper, Burke thus described it:

"Chaplin described to me the first sudden conception of his figure of fun—the poor, ludicrous fool, of forlorn attitudes, who would be a gentleman, and never can; who would do fine and beau-

tiful things, and always does them in the wrong way and earns kicks in place of acceptance and approval.

"At every turn the world beats him, and because he cannot fight it he puts his thumb to his nose. He rescues fair damsels, and finds that they are not fair. He departs on great enterprises that crumble to rubbish at his first touch. He builds a castle in the air, and it falls and crushes him. He picks up diamonds that turn to broken glass. At the world's disdain he shrugs his shoulders and answers its scorn with rude jests and extravagant antics. He is sometimes an ignoble Don Quixote, sometime a gallant Pistol, and in other aspects a sort of battered Pierrot.

"All other figures of fun in literature and drama have associates or foils. 'Charlie' in all his escapades is alone. He is the outcast, the exile, sometimes getting a foot within the gate, but ultimately being driven out, hopping lamely, with ill-timed nonchalance, on the damaged foot."
