Will Shoot Agnew No 1

Workmen are busy on the Agnew & Son Russell No. 1 well preparing to shoot that well some time Monday. A lead plug is being placed at 4,025 feet and the hole will receive the shot at from 3,975 to 4,001 feet. It was at this depth that a showing of oil was found in a lime formation. After passing below this depth no indication of more oil was found so it was decided to prepare the well and give it a shot where the showing occurred.

The Union Oil Company's W. E. Allen No. 1 is making good progress and is drilling around the 1,000-foot mark. This is the newest hole to be spudded in Runnels county and is the nearest to the city limits. There will be no let-up until the contracted depth is reached.

The Vacuum Oil Company's McMillan No. 3 is continuing to hold up its daily production and is by far the best well ever brought in in Runnels county. The daily production by heads is better than 300 barrels daily of high gravity oil.

Other operations in the county are quiet at present with some preparation expected to begin or be resumed next week.

Texas Railroads Make Good Gain

 AUSTIN, Nov. 2.—Figures compiled by the railroad commission and released today disclosed that the net income of Texas railroads increased 17.92 per cent for the eight months period which ended August 31, over a corresponding period for 1927. The net income for the present period was \$21,982,777 against \$18,642,253 for 1927. The operating revenues fell 3.6 per cent and operating expenses were cut 7.24 per cent.

Water Supply Saved by Rain

A balance of \$92,904.00 remained in the treasury on that date.

FIVE POUND BOX OF PRUNES IS SENT VIA AIR MAIL AS NEW ROUTE OPENS

CHICAGO, Nov. 2.—The once humble and maligned boarding house prune has just taken on added distinction, for a five-pound box was transported via air mail, the American Air Transport Association reports. The shipment originated on the world's shortest air mail line, a 30-mile hop connecting San Jose with San Francisco and Oakland. When the route started October 15 some extra-luscious prunes were dispatched air mail to Assistant Postmaster W. Irving Glover, at Washington, D. C.

However, prunes are not the first food products which have moved air mail, for recently a shipment of ice cream was dispatched from Philadelphia to Greensboro, North Carolina, and a thousand loaves of bread were sent from all parts of the nation to the bakers' convention in Chicago. Leaves from 35 states were transported by air mail in 12 to 14 hours.

BRITISH WOMEN SPEND \$60,000,000 EVERY YEAR FOR SILK STOCKINGS

 LONDON, Nov. 2.—An estimate that \$60,000,000 is spent annually in England on women's stockings was given by Douglas Hacking, M. P., parliamentary secretary for the Oversea Trade Department, when he opened a hosiery exhibition at Nottingham yesterday.

Mr. Hacking said that, assuming there were 17,000,000 women in the United Kingdom, of which 10,000,000 wore silk or artificial silk stockings at 3s a pair and eight pairs a year, he did not think that figure extravagant.

What an enormous saving could be made, he added, if a holeless or ladderless stocking could be produced.

DOCTOR LIVED TO 109 BY KEEPING BODY IN LONGITUDINAL POSITION

VIENNA, Nov. 2.—A certain Dr. Tichwehr who recently died here at the age of 109, often declared that the secret of his longevity consisted in taking a horizontal position as often as possible during the day, and naturally, every night.

Whenever it was possible throughout the day, he would place his head in the direction of the North Pole and the remainder of his body parallel to the meridian line. The doctor affirmed that this position corresponded to the direction of the magnetic current running through the surface of the earth and thus permitted a kind of magnetism of the iron mass contained in the body.

Commission Sets Howard Output

 AUSTIN, Nov. 2.—The Railroad Commission today issued an order permitting the increase in oil production in the Robert Settles field in Howard county from 25,000 to 30,000 barrels daily and placing the limit of 5,000 barrels daily on the Henshaw Oil Corporation No. 1 in the Settles well. The order was effective November 1.

 NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—As the presidential campaign without parallel in American politics drew near a close today, leaders of both parties expressed sublime confidence in the result and their confidence seems genuine. "Something is in the air and it means victory," Governor Smith expressed himself. "I cannot believe that the American people wish to abandon those policies which have been maintained by the republican party," Herbert Hoover declared after predicting a republican victory. Republicans claim 285 electoral votes as their minimum. The democrats claim 280 with a doubtful and leaning towards Smith.

MEXICO ORDERS CABARET SINGERS FROM STATES TO LEAVE COUNTRY AT ONCE

 TAMPICO, Nov. 2.—Eighteen American cabaret artists now appearing at Tampico, State of Tamaulipas, have just been invited by the Mexican immigration authorities not to stay longer in Mexico than they can help, following a recommendation toward that end made by the Department of the Interior. The steps taken are said to be due to the cabaret players having declared at the time of their entry into Mexico that they were tourists, in order to avoid paying, as it is seen here, the slight tax put on immigrants. Foreigners engaging in gainful occupations in Mexico are rated as immigrants and lay themselves open to expulsion if they assign to themselves any other status.

TWO STREET DRAGS ARE WORKING TODAY

The dirt streets in Ballinger were badly cut up this wet spell and Friday morning the street department started two drags to smoothing them and putting them in shape to be travelled. The city department keeps the dirt streets in good shape and never lets them go any length of time in a cut-up, rough condition.

Freezing Here Thursday Night

ABILENE, Nov. 2.—The cold wave which has gripped the Rocky Mountain region and the Middle West dipped into Texas last night and sent the mercury down into the thirties and early forties over the 40 counties served by the West Texas Utilities company, according to reports received this morning in the traffic department. In virtually all counties a light frost fell, reports said. The following report is clear and colder weather with light frost. At Quanah, Monday, Roby, Putnam, San Angelo, McCamey and Anson the temperature dropped to 36. At Anson a heavy frost fell.

Thursday night brought the first freezing weather to Ballinger for this year. The government thermometer at the E. M. Eubanks home registered 33 degrees early Friday morning while under the hill in the downtown district the mercury dropped to 31 degrees.

Some places in town with small thermometers reported the weather as cold as 29, however, these were not considered accurate. The norther sweeping southward from the heavy snows in the North brought colder weather than was expected here. Reports gave freezing weather in the Panhandle which would not mean very cold weather here.

It is expected that vegetation in low places will be killed by the cold night here Thursday.

STATE URGED TO EXCEED LEGION SUCCESS OF 1928

PARIS, Tex., Nov. 2.—Rufus Scott, Jr., department commander of the American Legion, has received a letter from National Commander Paul V. McNutt, the first official communication of the latter since his recent election at the national convention of San Antonio, in which are outlined the bright opportunities of Legion service in this state the coming year. In it, National Commander McNutt announced that the national quota in membership set for 1928 has been exceeded for the first time in Legion history.

The letter in part follows: "The record of accomplishment of the American Legion has kept pace with its onward march in membership, steadily advancing one with the other until this year, for the first time in Legion history, the national quota set by national headquarters has been attained."

"It marked a corresponding success in service performed to our communities and nation; the es-

tablishment of our junior baseball program; the advancement of improved legislation for dependent children; the correction of the remaining injustice to our disabled in the retirement of our wounded and sick emergency army officers; the passage of our hospital construction bill, and the unrelenting efforts to maintain a sensible national defense.

"The year ahead of us is brighter with opportunities for service than ever before—outstanding endeavors which demand, as the first step in their accomplishment, a proportionately stronger membership."

"The Legion in the past has found that to attain our great objectives it must have the individual support of the World War veteran in the field. How better can we obtain his enthusiastic, personal approval than to have him subscribe to the Legion's principles, ideals and program of activities?"

"Ahead of us is the presidential election. The sessions of Congress confronting us will be difficult for Legion legislation regardless of who is elected. We must secure the enactment of the Universal Draft bill. We need every World War

veteran in the country back of us if there still smolders in his heart the spirit of loyal devotion to his flag that he gave so unstintingly in 1917 and 1918.

"Our junior baseball program has the support of every man and woman who has at heart the making of strong, clean, right-minded men of their boys. These fathers and mothers look to the local Legionnaire to guide their sons in fair, healthy play that will lead to ideal citizenship of tomorrow. Every World War veteran must soon answer to his neighbor as to whether he belongs to the Legion, and if not, what is wrong with him."

Berlin's Gay Night Life Puzzled Over Successor to Freak Baron Willy

Where will be found a fit leader of the eccentric, erotic, exotic, colony in Berlin?

The throne left vacant by the tragic and untimely passing of youthful Baron Willy Sebastian von Droste awaits his successor.

There have been many pretenders, but none who can match the lamented Baron Willy for charming, eccentricity and grotesque fascination.

Willy and his tumultuous marriage to the ravishing Anita Berber, most enchanting of Berlin's dancers, Willy and his career rivaling S. Sanova's, his poems of his love life, his "mascot" head of an Egyptian mummy, and his unrequited devotion for the former Vera Leightner. It was grief over this hopeless love which is said to have speeded his death of tuberculosis, in Hamburg.

The cadaverous baron came to New York seven years ago, after one of his more violent quarrels with Anita Berber, with whom he was really desperately in love. He was a lean, sallow youth, with burning dark eyes set in a pallid face. With his monocle, yellow gloves and club-like walking stick, he cut a strange figure on Fifth Avenue.

Even more queer was his home life, in a rambling private house which he remodeled to resemble a medieval castle. There he engaged in lengthy communions with Amenhotep, the mummified head which he said Howard Carter brought him from the tomb of Tut-Ankh-Amen. Broadway sneered at the pats and kisses that Willy dished on his "mascot," but never dreamed of the Gay White

Way was hectic. He became an ardent admirer of Gloria Swanson and of Mrs. Marion B. Shaw, the daredevil society motorist. But the embers of his latent passion were fired by the sight of "Kittens" Leightner. Baron Willy was a pitiful figure with his abject devotions spurned.

Broken-hearted, he returned to Berlin, where a warm welcome awaited him. But he had lost all taste for his old life. His health gave way and he went to Hamburg to rest, complete a book of verse, and brood over his failure to win "Kittens," who became the wife of Elias Brophy, Hungarian painter.

Baron Willy gave up the struggle and seemed glad to die. His place has never been filled.

MILLION DOLLAR PLANE FACTORY IN KANSAS TOWN

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 2.—Erection of a modern aircraft factory at Fairfax field here will begin at once it was announced by officials of the American Eagle Aircraft Corporation, Kansas City's pioneer airplane builders.

The huge plant is scheduled to be completed about December 15.

The corporation will manufacture two types of planes, one the present model commercial biplane, and the other a new type all-metal 3-passenger monoplane.

Expansion Program

E. E. Porterfield, Jr., president of the company announced that the New York financial house, A. A. Dardante & Co., Inc., will assist in the \$1,000,000 refinancing and expansion program.

The present plant located here is not large enough to handle the huge business that has grown up, declared Porterfield.

Other officers of the company include D. L. Chick, vice-president and treasurer and Mord M. Bogle, secretary. The directorate includes, in addition to the officers, Barney Oldfield, world's most famous auto racer and a man who long has been prominently identified with the development of the automotive industry, and Charles Carroll O'Toole, New York capitalist and attorney.

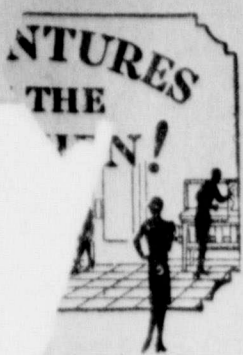

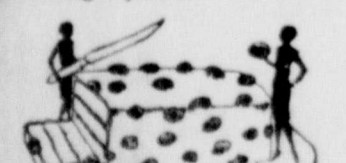
Midnight Dishes—Devised Sardines

This makes a delicious and most decorative dish for luncheons and midnight parties.

CHICAGO DRILLS TUNNEL UNDER LAKE MICHIGAN

 (International News Service Staff Correspondent)

CHICAGO, Nov. 2.—More than 200 feet below Lake Michigan workmen are drilling and blasting what will be one of the world's largest water tunnels, extending three miles out from the shore to two cribs. When completed the tunnel will carry 700,000,000 gallons of water a day.

For more than three years work has been carried on. Recently a group of engineers inspected the tunnel, more than two miles of which has been completed to determine whether work on it must cease to meet the orders of Mayor William Hale Thompson to cut expenses.

At present the City of Chicago uses about a billion gallons of water daily. This amount is being steadily increased with the growth of the city, making it essential, it was explained, to have the tunnel completed within the next two years.

J. J. Versluis, engineer of water- works construction, explained the tunnel was one of the most diffi- cult to construct as workmen were forced to blast through solid lime- stone. The new water duct has been constructed directly beneath the old one which was laid through clay and is to be aban- doned when the new one is com- pleted. It connects with the Chi- cago Avenue crib.

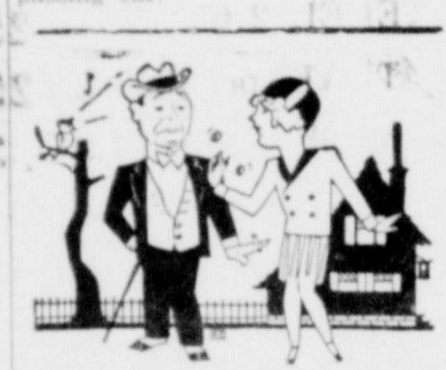
Engineers are now engaged in constructing a new crib which will serve as the intake for the new tunnel. The old crib was con- structed in 1867 and is practically useless to serve the city since its tremendous growth.

BERLIN, Nov. 2.—A new giant airplane, which will be the first to have passenger accommodations within the wings, is being built by the Junkers Airplane Works at Dessau.

The plane will have a wing span of 150 feet and its body will be 70 feet long.

It will have four motors with a total of 2,000 horsepower.

The plane will be so big and the wings so thick that the passenger room within the plane will have the shape of a cross. This will allow accommodations for 40 to 50 passengers.

The four motors will also be placed within the wings, so that they will be easily accessible for any necessary repairs during the flight.

The construction of the plane will take a year and a half.

ENGLAND FEARS FLU EPIDEMIC SEQUEL TO PLAGUE OF INSECTS

(By International News Service) LONDON, Nov. 2.—Fear that the unusual plague of insects which has been a feature of the summer may lead to a recurrence of the terrible influenza epidemic of 1918 is expressed by Dr. Moore Hogarth, chairman of the College of Pestology.

Dr. Hogarth points out that there has been more insect activity this year than in any since that of the epidemic which claimed a toll of so many lives.

"Insects," adds Dr. Hogarth, "and especially the household fly are the principal and most deadly carriers of disease germs, and the conditions now prevailing are so similar to those of 1918, just before the start of the epidemic, that the care which should be taken in all households to destroy these insects cannot be over-emphasized."

"The germ known as influenza or grippe is one of the most common in this country, and those of us who have made a special study of the question have little doubt that the 1918 scourge was a direct outcome of the fly epidemic during the summer."

"This plague of flies has recurred this year, and—although I hope I may be wrong—there seems every probability that the coming weeks will exact a heavy harvest of illness."

Dead Baby Boy Found at Coleman

A baby boy, dead apparently 12 hours, was found Saturday at noon by a mechanic at the Coleman Motor company in brush in the southwest part of Coleman just west of the first concrete culvert on the street connecting Fifth Avenue with the Valera highway. The find was reported to officers and Justice of the Peace Geo. E. Critz, County Attorney V. Rawlins Gilliland, Sheriff W. R. "Officers have only a slight clue to work upon," County Attorney Gilliland said, in discussing the

case. "Tracks of a buggy indicate the little lifeless body was brought to the scene in a buggy, but there is no way of ascertaining where it came from or where it went. The condition of the body indicated that no physician was in attendance."

The body was turned over to the Horne undertaking parlor for proper preparation and burial at county expense.—Coleman Democrat Voice.

LONDON, Nov. 2.—Indicative of the time when Londoners will fly where they now walk or ride, the first aerial parking place in the country's history is now being built at Heston, on the outskirts of the capital.

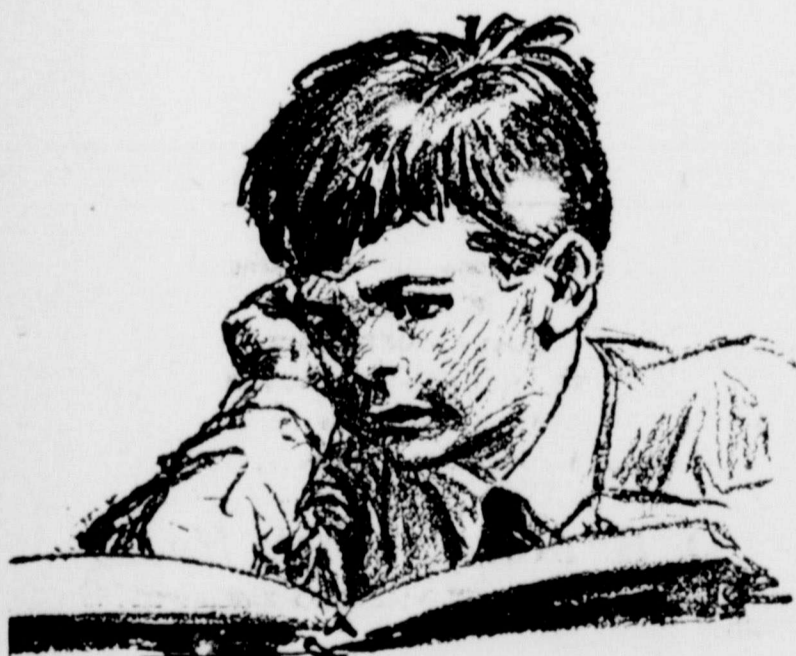

Illinois Builds \$20,000,000 in New Roadways

(By International News Service)
CHICAGO, Oct. 2.—Illinois received \$9,280,164.08, or more than any other state, from the federal aid road fund for highways under construction as of July 31, 1928, according to Charles M. Hayes, president of the Chicago Motor Club.

"That sum is being applied to 22.9 miles of highways now being built at a cost of \$20,188,584.26. The balance of the expense will be defrayed by the state funds. New York received \$7,489,393.95, the second highest grant from the federal government. That state has 483.6 miles of highway under construction. The cost will be \$41,915,000.

Illinois Second
"From the standpoint of federal aid received for roads approved as of July 31 for construction, Illinois is second. Texas leads. That state received \$2,842,089.38 for a total of 387.9 miles of proposed roads at a total cost of \$6,730,764.34. Illinois received \$1,826,435.15 for 138.1 miles of projected highways, for which the estimated expenditure is \$3,665,454.99.

"Motorists of the nation have a credit balance of \$500,000,000 with the federal government, which constitutes one of the most convincing arguments for continuation of the federal aid policy," Mr. Hayes continued. "This sum represents the balance of money paid into the treasury in the form of the war excise tax as against the amount expended by the government for federal aid. From 1918 up until the recent repeal of the automobile war tax, motorists as a class have paid the government in excise taxes on automobiles and parts a total of approximately \$1,100,000,000.

Since the beginning of federal aid, the government expended in excess of \$600,000,000 as its share for the construction of highway projects.

Government Aids
"This means that the government has spent just a little more than 50 per cent of the amount of motor vehicle revenues paid by the motorists as a class to the treasury department. At this rate the government still owes the motorists approximately \$500,000,000. With this balance sheet, there should be no question as to the

continuation of the federal aid policy, perhaps even on an expanded scale," Mr. Hayes continued. "The war excise tax on motor cars was repealed at the last session of congress, largely through the organized efforts of the American Automobile Association and its 1,065 affiliated clubs, with a resultant saving to car owners of over \$60,000,000 annually."

STOMACH ORIGINAL CENTER OF RELIGION SAYS PROF.

(By International News Service)
DENVER, Nov. 2.—"The stomach is the original center of religion." This was the startling statement made here by Prof. Etienne B. Renaud, of the University of Denver upon his return to the United States after a three months tour and study of prehistoric features of Europe.

After a chance meeting with Count de Begouen, Prof. Renaud was invited to visit the caves of Altamira and Castillo in Northern Spain. "These huge caves," Dr. Renaud said, "were reached after a strenuous climb through the Pyrenees Mountains. Here, we found the very first evidences of clay modeling by prehistoric man.

"The caves, evidently used as a shrine, were partly engraved, partly painted. One figure represented that of a man covered with a reindeer skin. It probably was used in prayers of the hunters for food and for reproduction.

"This reindeer shrine left an impression that prehistoric man very likely had a reindeer dance corresponding strikingly to the buffalo dance of the American Indian. The Indians, in this dance, cover themselves with the skin of the animal and pray for food.

"The clay images were those of a male bison representing food, and of a female, representing reproduction.

"The hunters in prehistoric ages sought game and for this they

prayed. Thus a man's stomach was the origin of his religion."

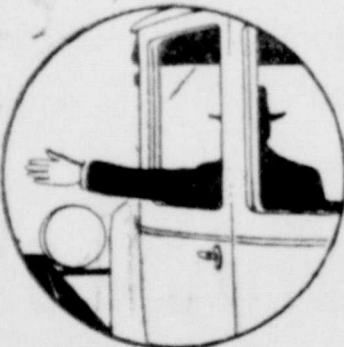

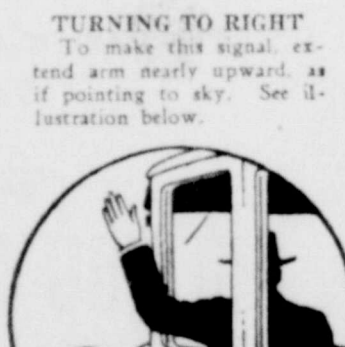

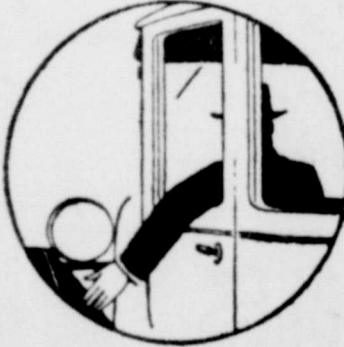
