

SVIENNA, Nov. 13 .- "The only solution of the marriage problems is to introduce one year trial marriage, as a sort of compulsory education, instead of the present insignificant and useless engagements," said the well-known Vienna psychologist Dr. Rudolf Urbantschitsch in a recent, much discussed public lecture.
