Boyce-Lange No. 1 To Spud in 10 Days

The Boyce-Lange No. 1, located 10 miles east of Ballinger on the Lange tract of land in the block composed of Lindeman, Lange and Clayton and which was originally blocked by Harry Lamar of San Angelo, will be spudded in about 10 days. The hole is to be 3800 feet or deeper.

Robt. B. Summers and others are the drillers and in a statement to a Ledger reporter Tuesday morning, stated that the best equipment available was now en route to Ballinger. The cellar has been dug and all preparations made for the erection of the rig.

Mr. Summers stated that he expected to be rigging in one week and with the equipment on hand it is expected that the well will be completed to the contract depth in record time.

G. W. Boyce, et al. owners of the lease, are of the opinion that they will strike pay before the contract depth is carried out, but in case pay is not found at a lesser depth it is entirely probable that the hole will be carried to a lower level. If pay is found, which it seems entirely reasonable to believe, then no end of wells will be drilled. Embracing as it does a body of land consisting of several thousand acres, the Boyce block is considered one of the

most valuable in this county. Robt. Summers, who closed a contract to drill this well, also will start drilling his J. W. Reese No. 1, six miles east of Ballinger in a very short time. This well was closed down a while back at a depth better than 1600 feet, and lies in a very promising location, so pronounced by George B. Pirtle, geologist of Coleman.

The drilling of the Lange and the Reese wells will have the effect of increasing in value every foot of land in that section of Runnels county, known as the Benoit and Talpa country.

It will also have the effect of stimulating the drilling of other wells and will doubtless cause the leasing of all available land and re-sale of any leases already held. Every showing will be the means of creating just so much interest in the oil fraternity and if oil is found in anything like paying quantities will cause the drilling of hundreds of wells in that section.

202 Rescued, 137 are Unaccounted in Wreck

(By International News Service)
NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—Wireless advices at noon stated that 202 persons had been rescued from life boats from the liner Vestris, which foundered off the Virginia coast yesterday. This left 137 not accounted for. The information was received by Sanderson & Son of New York, agents for the Lampert & Holt line, the vessel's owners. The ship carried 13 life boats and a motor launch for emergencies.

Davis Cook, vice president of Sanderson & Son, stated: "Wireless dispatches account for 202 life boats but we do not know if Captain Master used all 14 available boats."

A radiogram from the United States battleship Wyoming stated that it had picked up five persons from the water, indicating that at least one of the life boats had been swamped.

passengers and the crew of the British steamer Vestris except those in one life boat and on one raft have been rescued. This cheering word came over the navy radio at 6:30 this morning from a shipping board vessel of an American shipper. The Vestris sank about 275 miles northeast of Cape Henry, Virginia, yesterday. The first survivors were picked up at 4 o'clock this morning by the American shipper.

Others were later located by a ring of ships circling in wide sweeps around the vicinity of the sinking Vestris.

Admiral Chas. F. Hughes, chief of naval operations, expressed a fear that the missing life boat and raft may not be found and stated:

10,000 FARMERS TO PALACE BARBECUE

Midday Meal Will Be Served Free on Cotton Place Grounds Nov. 15 to Rural Guests.

Every Central Texas farmer, with his wife and children, is invited to attend the big farm barbecue which the Texas Cotton Palace exposition is giving this year at Waco. The information coming to this community about the affair that it will be held at noon Thursday, Nov. 15, on the athletic field of the fair, and officials of the Cotton Palace are expecting 10,000 farm people to attend it.

Meat alone which is to be served at the dinner will consist of not less than 2,500 pounds of beef. Pits will be dug and fires started on the athletic field on the night before to insure proper flavor and tenderness of the piece de resistance of the meal by noon Thursday. Six hundred gallons of coffee must be prepared, and items like rolls and pickles will run up to the 10,000 mark.

Although farm people will be interested in livestock, poultry and agricultural exhibits every day of the fair, which opens Friday night, Nov. 9 and closes Sunday night, Nov. 18, Thursday will be a day of special interest to them. A parade of school children and county club comes in the morning, with the barbecue at noon followed by stunts in the coliseum which home demonstration clubs of McLennan county will put on during the afternoon. The cotton dress ball, in which girls of Central Texas compete for prizes on the prettiest and at the same time the most inexpensive costume they have made, is to be given in the coliseum at night.

FREE THRILLER ACTS FOR FAIR AT WACO

Ropewalkers and Diving Horses Will Give Non-Charge Performance at Cotton Palace.

Free "thriller" acts will be given every hour on the grounds of the Texas Cotton Palace this year when the exposition opens its gates from Nov. 9 to 18 at Waco. THE PAS, Manitoba, Nov. 13.—Bears are again beginning to worry the prospectors in Manitoba's northland. The hardy miners are not so much concerned over where they can find gold, silver or copper fields as they are over the problem of keeping the bears away so that they can search for the ore in peace.

Bears are growing bolder and bolder this fall. Dozens of bruins have been shot for going once too often on frolics into mining camps, but their brethren are far from disturbed.

Prospectors are taking their ham and their bacon to bed with them to protect their grub, but the bear goes after it just the same. In some areas, bruin cares not where the delectable meat is placed. He goes after it in spite of rifle bullets.

When he is not hungry, Mr. Bruin is curious. He insists upon watching diamond drills, picks and shovels at close range, and is making nervous cases of many of the hard-boiled prospectors.

Trial Marriage As Educational Is Vienna Plan

By Alfred Tyrnauer
(International News Service Staff Correspondent)

VIENNA, Nov. 13.—The only solution of the marriage problems is to introduce one year trial marriage, as a sort of compulsory education, instead of the present insignificant and useless engagements," said the well-known Vienna psychologist Dr. Rudolf Urbantschitsch in a recent, much discussed public lecture.

"Parents should not only permit, but should advise a year's trial marriage, before sanctioning the official matrimony of their children. Thus they could prevent the lasting union of young people who are not suited for each other and for whom marriage would mean but an everlasting suffering."

Hollywood seems to be resolved on monopolizing the Viennese operetta for the "talkies," as most of the prominent musicians, directors and stars of the Viennese operetta stage were wooed and many of them won by American talking film companies during the last few months.

The best-known Viennese producer of musical comedies, Director Hubert Marischka, has also been engaged to produce several classic Viennese operetta in Viennese style at Hollywood next summer.

The fashion to spend a part of the year in America and a part of it in Austria, which has been inaugurated by Max Reinhardt and Maria Jeritza, has come into vogue among Viennese stage celebrities. And it proves to be a very profitable fashion.

Few other places of the world offer such a unique opportunity to study simultaneously a masterpiece of ancient architecture and the latest examples of modern painting as the recently opened permanent art exhibition in the Schallaburg Castle near the old Austrian town Melk.

Schallaburg, now owned by Baron K. F. Tinty, is one of the most splendid architectural monuments of the Renaissance style, though parts of it show influences of older periods dating as far back as in the time of the Roman invasion.

The owner has now placed his castle at the disposal of Austrian artists, and a most interesting modern exhibition has been arranged there under the protectorate of the Austrian government.

The underlying idea of the promoter of the exhibition, Baron Tinty, was to foster economically the living arts, (and living artists) which he considers the pillars of civilization.

The "Schubert Year" during which Vienna paid homage to her great son, Franz Schubert, with countless musical festivals, is now approaching its climax. The Austrian government and the Municipality of Vienna are making extensive arrangements for the official celebrations, centering around the 100th anniversary of Schubert's death on the 19th of November, 1828.

The program of the celebration under the auspices of the government will commence on the 17th of November and will conclude on the 25th. The municipality's program will last from November 15 to the 19th. Both will include many receptions, assemblies, concerts, quartets, quintets, choral-concerts, brass bands, songs, dances, serenades, masses, symphonies, the un-

veiling of a "Schubert Fountain," and speeches. Franz Schubert will be feted like a king. He will be meritoriously rewarded for his great contribution to art.

Naval Range Finder

An accurate method of computing the distance between ships when the height of the enemy ship is not known is by the use of the optical range finder. This instrument is installed in the turrets of battleships. It consists of a long tube with optical prisms. The length of the tube is taken as the base of a triangle. The distance is then figured out mathematically. The degree of accuracy depends upon the visibility conditions and the distance can usually be ascertained within a few hundred yards of the exact distance.

Mispronunciations

As many words are mispronounced as are misspelled, according to a writer in *Capper's Weekly*. "Among the mispronounced ones," he says, "are aviator, aviation and radiator. The first 'a' is pronounced as in 'bite,' 'late,' not as in 'rather.' The word 'grimy' is often pronounced as if it were spelled 'grimony.' The 't' should be given the long sound. 'Route' is often pronounced 'rout.' It should be 'rood.' The word 'address,' bearing the superscription on a letter, is not address, but plain address with accent on last syllable."

Pueblo Bank Has Sharp Shooters' Nest to Guard Against Robberies

(By International News Service)
DENVER, Nov. 13.—The first "sharpshooter's nest" to be installed in a bank west of Chicago, to be used as a safeguard against bank robbery, will be placed in a bank of Pueblo, it was learned here today.

Two major bank holdups in the state within a few months has resulted in action upon the part of the Pueblo bank officials to forestall any daring daylight burglary, and it is expected other banks in the Rock Mountain region will soon follow the lead of the Pueblo institution.

A lone bandit scoured \$13,000 in the holdup of a bank at Littleton early in October, and the sensational \$200,000 robbery of the Lamar bank, which resulted in four deaths, has prompted bank officials in the region to inaugurate methods to prevent future holdups.

The "sharpshooter's nest" is arranged within the bank so as to give full view of every part of the interior of the institution. The "nest" is occupied during the daylight hours by a man armed with rapid fire rifles.

\$30,000,000 OCEAN LINER OF 60,000 TON REGISTER BIG SHIPYARD SECRET

BELFAST, Nov. 10.—Desperate attempts to retain British sea supremacy are now being made in the shipyards of this city.

The chief effort is being concentrated on the world's largest ship, the "mystery" Oceanic, of 60,000 tons register. Her cost will be around \$30,000,000 and she is intended to combat the challenge of other nations.

Lining Up Votes For Speakership

(By International News Service)
AUSTIN, Nov. 13.—W. S. Barron, member of the legislature from Bryan, and candidate for the speakership of the house in the next legislature, has 69 pledged votes, and his election is practically assured, Rep. Ray Holder, of Lancaster who is advocating his election, said here.

"We have 69 pledged votes for Mr. Barron," said Holder, "and I feel confident that we will have no trouble in garnering the nine additional votes needed to win the contest."

The only other avowed candidate for the speakership is Rep. H. M. Montgomery of Edinburg who has a large following of friends in the next legislature. He has not announced figures in the race for the speakership as yet.

While here Holder announced he will introduce a bill in the legislature permitting persons to pay their poll tax after January 31, now the time limit. At the present time any person who fails to pay his poll tax on or before January 31 is deprived of his right of franchise.

Holder said his bill will permit anyone to pay his poll tax to the county tax collector 14 days before any state election or primary election on payment of a penalty of one dollar.

Holder said enactment of such a law will add \$100,000 a year to the state treasury and "at the same time permit a large number of persons to vote who would otherwise be deprived of the right of franchise."

Brownwood Mayor Shoots Man Sunday

Clyde Maner, 21, an employee of the United Tire company, was shot through both legs by Mayor Palmer C. McInnis about 6 p. m. Sunday on the highway about a half a mile west of Blanket. Only one shot was fired, the bullet penetrating both legs. Maner was taken to the Central Texas Hospital where it was found his condition was not serious, but Monday morning he was in a nervous condition, hospital attendants reported. A branch of the big artery in one of his legs was severed, but no bones were fractured by the shot. Mr. McInnis declined Monday morning to make a statement to the press. He voluntarily surrendered to officers and was released Sunday night on posting of \$1000 bond for appearance at an examining trial at 10 a. m. Tuesday before Judge E. T. Perkinson.

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Hammond who said they were witnesses, told their story of the shooting to a Bulletin reporter Monday. They said that Mr. and Mrs. Maner and themselves were riding in a car, headed toward Brownwood, Mr. Maner driving. They said that Mr. McInnis was in another car with his young son, and as he approached them he signaled Mr. Maner to stop.

Having stopped, the Hammonds said, Mr. McInnis called Mr. Maner out of the car and struck him. Mr. McInnis dropped a gun, picked it up and shot Mr. Maner, they said. The Hammonds said that Mrs. Maner stepped in front of her husband immediately after the shot was fired.

Hooper Leaves For Conference

Rev. R. B. Hooper, pastor of the Methodist church, and his wife left early Tuesday morning for Ranger to attend the annual conference which will convene there the remainder of the week and through next Sunday. Rev. Hooper closed the work here Sunday for the church year and goes to conference with a wonderful report from the Ballinger church. All obligations were paid by the church and his report on all activities will be "paid in full."

In addition to the regular report he will report the new church which will be completed within another two weeks, the installation of a pipe organ, new chairs for the auditorium and new furnishings throughout.

Hooper has served the church for two years and before going to conference the entire board of stewards and other officials of the church petitioned the presiding elder that he be returned to this charge to serve for a year in the new church. Rev. Hooper has worked hard to get the big job over and should be removed from Ballinger would have to leave just as the church was being completed. 400 from Here Visit at Brady

A caravan of automobiles carrying 250 Ballinger people, the pep squad of about 75, the football squad of 20, and the Ballinger band composed of 30 pieces, left early Monday for Brady to storm that city on Armistice Day and witness the football game in the afternoon.

The Brady band was out on the courthouse lawn to welcome the delegation from Ballinger all the forenoon, but due to car trouble on the road, the most of the party were late in arriving and the local parade and demonstration was postponed until afternoon.

W. D. Scales had a narrow escape from a serious accident at Brady Creek, three miles west of Melvin when his car went into the water. Mr. Scales, with a good-sized load in his car, averted a serious accident by using his head and doing some good driving. When he approached the creek, he saw that water was running over the cement causeway and when he applied his brakes to slow down to cross the water, the brakes were out of adjustment and his car swung to the left and out of the road. He made an effort to get back on the bridge and succeeded in getting two wheels on and stopped his car before it turned over in the water. Had the car headed straight into the water it is likely that someone would have been drowned, as the water was deep at the edge of the hole. Hallie Duke, one of the pep squad girls, received a slight bruise on her face, and outside of this no one was injured. Mr. Scales' car was removed from the creek by a wrecker and was uninjured. Davis Sims lost a wheel from his car on the way and no one was hurt from this accident.

The delegation returned to Ballinger as soon as the game was completed.

NIG McCARVER IS STAR IN ST. EDWARDS GAME

Nig McCarver was the outstanding star when Howard Payne College defeated St. Edwards University at Austin Saturday in a Texas Conference game that almost cinched the championship of that conference for Howard Payne. The fleet-footed Ballinger boy played one of the most outstanding games of the year in Texas, gaining many yards on running plays and snagging passes from Boyd for many more yards.

He was directly responsible many times for placing the ball within striking distance of the St. Edwards goal. He was removed from the game in the last few minutes of play and was given a big ovation from both Howard Payne fans and St. Edwards as he trotted to the sidelines.

Bearcats Take Armistice Game

The Ballinger Bearcats trampled the Brady Bulldogs under foot Monday at Brady before a crowd of 2500 people. The Bearcats held the upper hand the entire game and should not have been scored on. A long pass in the last quarter to a Brady end succeeded in crossing the Ballinger goal line for the lone counter of the game as far as Brady was concerned. Ballinger kept the ball pretty well in the air Monday and very few line plays were tried. With Schuman doing the majority of the passing the Bearcats tried short passes, long passes, lateral passes and every other kind known.

The game was full of sensations with long runs and gains and many completed passes, some going for touchdowns and others for long gains. The first counter came in the first quarter when Schuman passed to Parrish for 40 yards. Coker carried the ball out of bounds on the next play and Schuman passed to Coker who received the ball and carried it across the line for a touchdown. The try for the extra point failed. A few minutes later with the ball on Ballinger's 25 yard line, Schuman passed to Wilson who took the ball under his arm and behind beautiful interference ran the remainder of the field for a touchdown. This was the prettiest play of the game, and some excellent work was done by those helping Wilson to advance the ball. Two Brady men who threatened to stop the field were put on the ground with hard interference, leaving the remainder of the field clear for the runner.

Between the halves both pep squads did some clever work on the field for the amusement of the crowd. The Ballinger band assisted the local squad and the Heart of Texas Band from Brady helped the Brady girls do their stuff. Both squads made a large "B" on the field. Early in the third quarter a pass, Schuman to Lusk, was good for a 70-yard gain placing the ball on the Brady five yard line. Lusk made a nice run after receiving the pass and twice evaded tacklers who threatened his advance. The ball zig-zagged in mid-field until Brady secured the ball on downs on their 10 yard line. They got off a short kick which was swooped up by Jones Parrish who dashed back through the entire team for a touchdown. The final score came in the last minutes of play when a pass, Parrish to Wheeler, was good for 45 yards and placed the ball on the Bulldogs' one yard line. Wheeler carried the ball over on the next play.

Ballinger made 17 first downs to Brady's six. Ballinger completed passes for a total of 310 yards.
