Citizens Discuss Projects Badly Needed in Ballinger

A meeting of the chamber of commerce and the city officials was held Wednesday morning at the chamber of commerce offices to discuss matters of vital importance to the citizenship of Ballinger.

After being called to order the board of directors voted to turn the tourist park at the south end of Eighth Street over to the Boy Scout council to be turned into a park to carry on boys' activities in the city. The council will accept the park and start a program of work to make it into a modern home where the boys may meet to work or play and also to improve the place and try and make it a credit to the City of Ballinger.

Following this piece of business a discussion was entered into by all present relative to the present water supply laying of mains, the building of a city hall and the purchasing of a new fire truck.

For some time City Engineer Davis has been working on a survey on Elm Creek to increase the city's water supply. Several logical plans will likely be presented, one of which can be built below the present dam and will increase the water supply about 20 times over the present supply. This plan is very inexpensive according to the amount of water which can be compounded and figures will be ready soon to be presented to the commission and the committee appointed by the chamber of commerce at the suggestion of the city commission to advise with them.

Some of the mains now in use have been laid for many years and are too small to supply adequate pressure for the town since the growth of the last few years. It is the plan to replace these with larger mains giving a distributing system that will properly care for the entire town.

The need of a city hall is being felt more in Ballinger all the time. It was pointed out at the meeting Wednesday morning during the discussion that Ballinger is the only town in this section of the state without a city hall. The city has rented a building to have a small office without any real files and equipment and such a place is the only solution according to those who entered into the discussion.

The fire truck here has been in use since 1916 and served the city well. Members of the department declare that the truck is about used up and should they experience a fire similar to the oil mill fire of a few years ago, where an all-night run would have to be made with the pump, that it might play out at any minute. The pump is only a 500-gallon capacity pump and is not ample to take care of more than two strings of hose properly. A new, modern truck would greatly lessen the insurance rate and in time would save the tax payers more than new equipment would cost.

A definite plan could not be presented Wednesday morning for the putting over of this project, but as soon as additional figures and information is ready, a plan will be presented.

Those present at the meeting Wednesday seemed to favor a bond issue that would take up the present outstanding indebtedness of the city and pay for the new projects.

The chamber of commerce committee will advise with the city commission in these matters and as soon as costs can be estimated some plan will be presented for the accomplishment of the above needed projects for Ballinger.

Ed Gentry has let a contract for the building of a new five-room residence with bath and other conveniences, to be erected on Seventh Street in the eleven hundred block.

Passengers Go Down On Hull of Vestris

(By International News Service)

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—Of the first three life boats launched from the sunken steamer Vestris, two sank and one capsized. While the launching of the life boats was in progress the Vestris turned over on its side and the panic-stricken passengers climbed from the water upon the keel and clung there until the hull sank.

These grim facts were brought to port by five passengers and 18 seamen who were snatched from death by the North German Lloyd steamer Berlin. The old order of "women and children first" was carried out.

Carlos Quiros, chancellor of the Argentine embassy at Washington, a passenger, strongly censured the life saving operations on the Vestris and the lack of discipline of the crew. He declared that all boats were overloaded and that one had a large hole in it and sank within 60 feet from the stricken Vestris.

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—Lampert and Holt Steamship company officials said today that the French liner Myriam, bearing 54 survivors from the liner Vestris will not reach here until 10 o'clock tonight. It will not dock tonight but tugs will go out into the harbor and remove the refugees after which the Myriam will proceed to England.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—Admiral C. F. Hughes, chief of naval operations, today stated that he regarded the rescue of further living members of the crew or passengers from the sunken Vestris as "practically impossible" owing to the high seas running since the sinking of the vessel.

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—The North German Lloyd steamer Berlin, with 23 survivors from the Vestris docked at the pier at Forty-two North River this morning. The American Shipper with 123 refugees is due to dock today at the pier at 7 o'clock. The Myran.

Safety Meeting Thursday Night

R. L. Dowden, superintendent of safety for the Oklahoma Natural Gas corporation with headquarters at Tulsa, Okla., arrived in Ballinger Wednesday morning and will hold a safety meeting at the American Legion auditorium on Thursday night at 7:30.

The West Texas Utilities company will co-operate in the meeting and assist in the work that is done. The public is invited to attend this meeting and hear the lectures delivered on safety subjects and see the motion pictures which will be shown by Mr. Dowden.

The Oklahoma Natural Gas corporation expects about 400 of its employees to be present at the meeting from Coleman, Ballinger and San Angelo. At present the company is working about 120 men in Ballinger in the local office and in the construction of the new booster station that is being built here north of town. San Angelo has about 150 men at work there and Coleman between 35 and 40. Rowena, Miles, Talpa, and other small towns in this section have small crews who will swell the attendance at the meeting to the expected number.

Mr. Dowden was especially invited that women were especially invited to the meeting and that he hoped as many of the townspeople as possible would attend.

Meanwhile the United States Navy and Coast Guard is combing the surface of the sea where the Vestris sunk for a trace of the 105 who are still missing, nearly 20 of whom are children. Capt. William J. Carey, master of the Vestris and Radio Operator Laughlin are among the missing.

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—The owners of the Vestris today reserved all comments on the wreck of their liner and rescue until statements taken from the surviving officers of the ship had been had.

David Cook, vice president, Sanderson & Sons, Inc., are the agents for Lampert and Holt lines. The owners said "Officers are not yet in condition to make statements and we will issue statements later."

SHERIFF CATCHES ANOTHER BOOTLEGGER AT WINTERS

The sheriff's department reports the arrest of Henry Noble of Winters, for the possession and sale of liquor. Bond was set at \$1000 and had not been made up to noon Wednesday.

This is the second bootlegging case to come to light in the last week, the other being a Mexican who was arrested last Friday.

Part Optometry Law is Illegal

AUSTIN, Nov. 14.—The court of criminal appeals today held unconstitutional that part of the state optometry license law forbidding unlicensed merchants to aid customers in selecting eyeglasses. Other provisions were left undisturbed. The decision followed the appeal of A. H. Burl, of Llano, a merchant, who was fined \$50 because he had customers use Selen fitting and testing machine. The case was reversed and dismissed.

Increase Panama Canal Capacity 70 Per Cent For Future Traffic

(By International News Service)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—Ultimate enlargement of the Panama Canal increasing its present capacity 70 per cent, is forecast in the annual report of Gov. M. L. Walker, made public today.

The first move to take care of future increases in traffic has already been made through the development of a supplemental water supply to assure sufficient depth of water in the cut and over the upper sills of the locks, Walker reported.

The eventual construction of a third flight of locks, paralleling the existing twin flights, will, with increased storage of water, make possible 70 per cent increase, according to the governor's estimate of the situation. Present traffic, Walker reported, is 45 to 50 per cent of what the canal can handle under existing facilities.

Big Net Revenue

The total net revenue from the Panama Canal and the Panama Railroad operations, for the last fiscal year the report showed, was \$20,621,314.82, the largest annual return since the canal opened.

Walker referred to suggestions being made that the tolls be reduced because of the increased revenues, and calling attention to the function of Congress to determine a policy, he indicated a reduction might offset benefits which would accrue "only to limited special interests."

"It is pertinent," he said, "for the administration of the canal to point out that heavy expenditures are yet due to be made for additions and replacements in the plant, for the adequate quartering of employees, for suitable retirement of employes grown old or disabled in this existing service; that tolls at Panama are lower

(by approximately a third) than the tolls at Suez; that reductions will benefit foreign vessels in foreign trade as well as United States vessels in domestic trade; that the intercoastal lines are competing severely with the railroads, and a lowering of tolls may cripple the internal transportation system of the United States while reducing the government's revenue, with offsetting benefits accruing only to limited special interests."

Prompt Service

During the past year, Walker said, the canal force has maintained its high standards of expeditious service. In the actual transiting of ships and in the supplementary services to shipping using the canal.

The last fiscal year, the report shows, was devoid of delays of consequence to traffic, and vessels were handled both in transit and at the terminals with a promptness which operators have learned to expect and to demand. During the year 6,959 seagoing vessels, an average of 19 daily, passed through the canal, of these, 2,442, about one-third, used the terminal ports in discharging or loading passengers or cargo.

"One of the permanent problems of the canal," Walker pointed out, "is the avoidance of accidents of the sort inherent in traffic through restricted channels; such as groundings due to faulty operation of steering gear, often at time of sheers which result from currents in close waters; striking against the lock walls or piers and wharves, collisions with other vessels, etc. During the fiscal year 1928 a total of 99 accidents occurred as compared with 60 during the preceding year; those in which the estimated damage was \$1,000 or more numbered 14 as compared with 15 during 1927.

"The deepening of the Pacific sea-level section and Balboa inner harbor, the removal of material brought into the canal by small slides, and the general maintenance of channel and locks were carried on through the year without interference with traffic."

AUSTIN, Nov. 14.—The appellate motion for a rehearing in the case of F. J. Skelton, convicted of murder in Hopkins county, was overruled by the court of criminal appeals today when they denied the plea of the former. Skelton was sentenced nine years ago for the murder of Clarence Smith.

To Make Study Of Atom During A Total Eclipse

LONDON, Nov. 13.—A new attempt to solve the secret of the atom during a feverish five minutes while the sun is in a total eclipse is to be made by four British scientists in the jungle of the Malay Peninsula next spring.

All preparations have already been made for the expedition, which is to start in February. The eclipse is due to occur on May 9, and in order to be fully prepared for the investigations which are to be made during the brief period of totality, scientific instruments of every description are being taken on the long journey.

The four scientists, who have been appointed by the Joint Permanent Committee of the Royal Society and the Royal Astronomical Society, are Dr. J. Jackson and P. J. Mollot of Greenwich, and Colonel F. J. M. Stratton and Dr. E. Carroll of Cambridge University.

Uppermost Thought

One thought is uppermost in the minds of all scientists today, as the eagerly awaited period draws nearer. Will the secret of the atom, which has baffled scientists for centuries, and whose possibilities are believed only to have been partially scratched by the discoveries of recent years, be solved during the five minutes during which the light of the sun is to be eclipsed entirely?

It is hoped that at least a clue may be obtained, for while living the life of bushmen in the Malay jungles, the scientists intend to attempt to measure the temperatures and pressures of the gases around the sun, which cannot be reproduced in a laboratory.

Dr. Jackson and Dr. Carroll, who are connected with the Solar Physics Laboratory of Cambridge, will make their headquarters at Alor Star, in the Malay state of Kedah, on the western side of the peninsula. Col. Stratton and Mollot will camp near Patani, in Siam. Dr. Carroll and Col. Stratton will carry out the spectroscopic obser-

vations which it is hoped may assist scientists to understand something of the constitution of the atom. Dr. Jackson and Mollot will concentrate on attempting to reaffirm Einstein's theory of relativity by what is known as the astronomical test.

"Professor Einstein," Mollot said in explaining the expedition, "formulated three tests by which human beings could affirm his theory of a fourth dimension.

"The first test was to prove that a ray of light would be diverted from its course if it passed close to the sun.

Photograph Stars

"Therefore, while the eclipse is in progress we shall take a photograph of the field of stars behind the sun, and immediately afterwards take another exposure on the same plate of a field of stars some distance away. This will give us a scale to work by.

"Three months later, when the sun is out of the way, we shall take two more exposures. A comparison of the two plates will prove to us the exact position of the stars in relation to light which appears to be the stars."

Greenwich Observatory is buzzing with excitement in preparation for the expedition. The gigantic 21-foot telescope which is to be used will occupy the entire time of two carpenters for two months in packing. Wooden sheds are being taken in sections to Malay.

The astronomers will have a tremendous advantage over the last period of eclipse, when the sun was obscured for only 24 seconds at the depth of the belt of totality. This time the eclipse will last for a full five minutes, and the scientists are working out elaborate calculations.

The belt of totality—the band of earth along which the full eclipse will be visible—will stretch across the north of Sumatra, the Malay Peninsula, the southern portion of Indo-China and the Philippine Islands to end in the Pacific.

INDIA WOMAN LEADER ADMIRES ENERGY OF SLENDER U. S. WOMEN

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—To the woman leader of India the slenderness of ankles of American women is the most striking thing about this country.

Mme. Sarojini Naidu, successor of Mahatma Gandhi as president of the Indian National Council, revealed this when she admitted that her outstanding impression since coming to America is American women's slim ankles.

We in India are of an older nation and we realize that it is not a question whether a man or a woman should do this or that, but what special work a particular human being is best fitted for."

Mme. Naidu speaks perfect English. She is small with brown eyes and a soft voice and dresses in her native costume. She is to spend several weeks visiting America.

Ed C. Lasater, Texas; D. O. Bull, Canada, and E. C. Perredes, Island of Jersey

Ed C. Lasater, Texas, owner of the largest Jersey herd in the world, D. O. Bull, largest breeder of Jerseys in the British Empire, and E. C. Perredes, largest breeder of Jerseys on the Island of Jersey, met for the first time at the 1928 National Dairy Exposition, Memphis, Tenn. These three internationally famous breeders were the center of a great deal of interest and were constantly interviewed by other breeders anxious to discuss livestock and dairy matters.

Lasater, picturesque pioneer and cattle baron of South Texas, once owned a 360,000-acre ranch with title direct from the Spanish grandees and stocked with 20,000 head of beef cattle, but has cut this to the more efficient size of 100,000 acres with a herd of 2,000, to 2,500 purebred Jerseys, 3,500 head of beef cattle and 1,000 head of horse stock. Entirely fenced, Lasater's Falfurrias Jersey Farm is diversified with cotton, feed crops and pastures that often reach 2,500-acre size. Going into the dairy business in the face of direful predictions, Lasater now has a daily output at his creamery of a ton and a half of Jersey butter and pays \$1,000 daily for

additional cream. His product, the butter standard of Texas, sells easily for the top market price. D. O. Bull, owner of 1,200 acres of the best land in Canada at Brampton, Ontario, 20 miles from Toronto, has a herd of 600 Jerseys and markets about 1,500 quarts of milk daily. He is recognized as the largest owner and breeder of Jerseys in the British Empire, and is an active importer of Jerseys, bringing over 350 head from the Island of Jersey since last January. Associated with his brother, Col. Bartley Bull, he has sold over 1,200 Jerseys in Canada and the United States this year, importing many of the most successful animals in the show ring. Eugene Perredes, who came from the Island of Jersey to judge the Fifth Annual Parish Show held in October near Philadelphia, is known as one of the best young judges of cattle in Europe. As the largest breeder of Jerseys on the island, he has a herd of 153 head distributed on his three farms, and has bred many noted sires in use in the United States.

100 PIECE COMPACT IN ONE WALKING CANE

Unique Exhibits Are Announced for Texas Cotton Palace, November 9-18.

Two walking canes, hand-carved, and with interlocking pieces of wooden blocks will be exhibited at the Texas Cotton Palace Exposition in Waco, November 9 to 18th, inclusive, this year by their owner and maker, D. Thornton, of Wortham, Texas.

One of the sticks was made out of a hundred pieces of wood coming from five different states. Thornton did the work in 75 hours using odd hours and rainy days and keeping close tab on his time. Each different variety of wood has the name stamped on it.

The other cane was started with the big end of a billiard cue in which he cut out a marble which remains inside the stick and has a couple of inches to play up and down in. Twenty-eight different kinds of wood are used in this stick with each piece dove-tailed onto each succeeding joint as in the other unique cane.

Both sticks were made by Thornton employing his pocket knife and a small saw only. Thornton is a farmer and does this work only as a pastime.

The third article is joined blocks of wood two pieces of poplar from Georgia and pressed through a hole in the center of a block of Texas bois d'arc. The poplar is notched so that when dried and expanded it cannot be released, forming somewhat of a puzzle.

ARMY ENGINEERS ARE VERY SHORT OF OFFICERS REPORT DISCLOSES TODAY

(By International News Service) WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—The Engineer Corps of the U. S. Army is short of officer personnel despite the transfer of officers from other branches, it was disclosed today in the annual report of Maj. Gen. Edgar Jadwin, chief of engineers, for the fiscal year ending June 30 last.

The engineer corps as a whole, however, is larger than at any time in its history. The present commissioned strength is 538, a shortage of 22 under the authorized strength, Jadwin reported. Most of the shortage is in colonels, with a corresponding preponderance of majors and first and second lieutenants.

"This has resulted," Jadwin said, "in the necessary assignment of majors to duties and responsibilities which should normally be borne by colonel and lieutenant colonels, and a greater proportion of lieutenants to regiments than prescribed by tables of organization."

During the year, however, a net gain of 398 was made in the number of reserve officers commissioned in the engineer section, officers' reserve corps, making a total of 7,742 such officers available for active service in time of emergency.

Jadwin also reported on the engineer corps operations in connection with seacoast fortifications and the Panama Canal Zone.

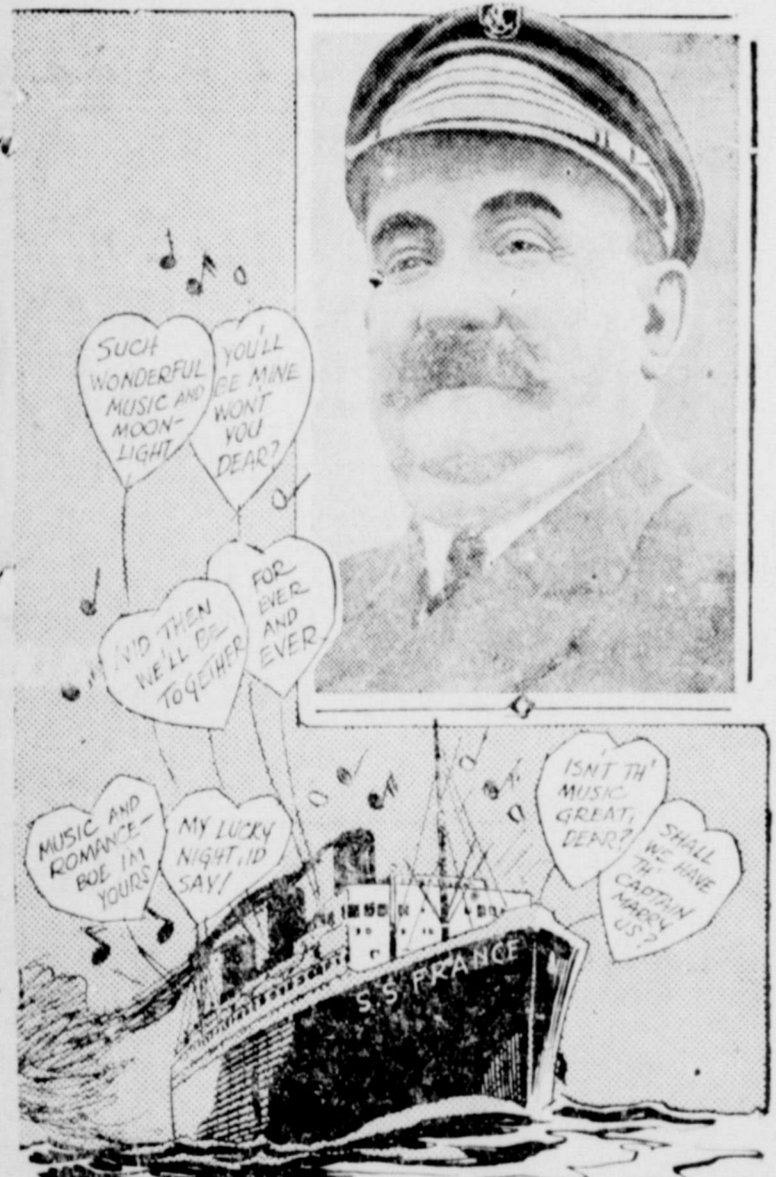
