Soldiers Withdraw From Nicaragua

(By International News Service)
 WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—270 enlisted men and 49 officers comprising the naval detachment which assisted in the Nicaraguan presidential election are being withdrawn, the navy department announced today. They are being taken aboard the Vega en route to San Diego and the Kanawha en route to San Pedro, Calif.

Pearce Drug is Damaged \$3,000

Fire was discovered in the J. Y. Pearce Drug Store Monday morning at 5 o'clock. The fire had gained considerable headway when the alarm was turned in but the fire department did a nice job in handling it without using the large water hose and within a short time had the blaze under control with the chemical wagon. The fire started behind one of the large medicine cases in the front of the store and that case was completely destroyed and the blaze reached the ceiling before the firemen arrived. It is not known how it could have started. There is no wiring behind the case and the only reason for the blaze starting there is thought to have been a rat setting a match on fire or some like mishap.

Frank Pearce estimated his loss Monday morning at \$3,000. Some of his fixtures are entirely ruined, much stock is destroyed and the entire inside of his store will have to be gone over as well as all fixtures.

The local fire department responded quickly and it was due to their fast work that the entire store was not destroyed and adjoining places endangered. Smoke from the blaze poured over into the Ballinger Dry Goods company and into D. Reeder Dry Goods company but no damage was done after the buildings were opened and the smoke cleared.

Ten are Killed; Thirty Wounded

 MEXICO CITY, Nov. 26.—Ten were killed and 30 wounded in political rioting in Pueblo during the election Sunday according to Pueblo dispatches today. Factions supporting the gubernatorial candidates, Leonidas Almazan and General Luis Sierra, clashed and fighting ranged over the city.

Rain and Snow Over This Area

Rain started falling in Ballinger Sunday night and a slight sprinkle continued all day Monday with heavy showers occasionally. Sleet also fell early Monday morning and some was still on the ground at 8 o'clock today.

Following is a report sent in from Abilene at noon Monday.

Rain, sleet and snow fell over the 42 counties served by West Texas Utilities company last night and this morning, according to reports received by the traffic department. The area covered by sleet extended from Shamrock on the north, to Mason on the South, and east to Cisco, from Abilene northwest to Spur and southwest to McCamey. Rain fell and snow was recorded in Munday and surrounding territory in virtually all of the towns and cities served by the company the temperature dropped sharply, registering as low as 35 at McCamey where a rain measuring one-half inch fell. While graded roads in West Texas were becoming muddy at mid-forenoon they were still passable to automobile traffic.

Freight Trains in Head-on Collision

 MINERAL WELLS, Nov. 26.—A. R. Keister, engineer, and M. B. Baldwin, fireman, were severely injured today in a head-on collision of two freight trains on the Texas & Pacific railroad at Gordon, Palo Pinto county. Confusion in orders is believed to be responsible. The fire which followed the crash spread to an oil car and two carloads of cattle and one of mules were destroyed. An unconfirmed report stated that two hoboes, believed to have been on the train, are missing.

Col. Lindbergh Hops from Kelly

Many of the bodies which were recovered had their head and feet in the water but their waist was up. He favored the life belts used by the navy.

Sixteen of Crew Drown is Report

 PARIS, Nov. 26.—Sixteen members of the crew of the French ship Cesare were drowned when the vessel foundered off Cape Caxine, north of Africa, during a terrific tempest, according to Algerine dispatches. Six others were rescued by other crafts.

The judge said that he had heard some objection to the boys using the park for a playground, but stated that he had very promptly refused to have anything to do with anything that might keep the boys from playing there. As a consequence the boys are privileged to play all they please on that side of the park.

The judge said that unless some money is spent to beautify that portion of the park he could see no harm from the boys playing there. He is the father of two boys himself, and knows pretty well what boys enjoy.

We should provide more places for our boys to play. Many cities have regular playgrounds for the children and the great number taking advantage of the liberty would surprise almost anyone. Where children are provided with community playgrounds less mischief is done and fewer of the youths get into trouble.

TO ISSUE A SPECIAL ANNIVERSARY EDITION

In its issue of Sunday, December 2, the St. Louis Post-Dispatch will have this to say regarding its big Fiftieth Anniversary number:

The St. Louis Post-Dispatch, founded by Joseph Pulitzer December 12, 1878, will celebrate its fiftieth birthday on the Sunday nearest that anniversary which is December 9.

The four-page paper which the founder was just able to get out, with one rickety press, on that first day, will be distributed, in facsimile, as part of a special number of more than 200 pages. Seven special rotogravure sections will contain contributed articles by writers of world eminence, local and historical sketches by well-qualified St. Louis writers, and color illustrations by leading artists.

Since mid-October, the special number has been in process of printing. Plans for the edition were begun nearly two years ago, and representatives were in Europe more than a year ago, enlisting noted writers as contributors. The result of this quest, and the direction which the special articles have taken, are announced in these words:

"The greatest number of the world's eminent thinkers ever grouped in one publication explore the fascinating field of man's achievements and his probable future scores to determine what life may be like on our globe in years to come."

The list of American and foreign contributors will be recognized as containing authorities in science, exploration, medicine, philosophy, history, religion, literature, industry and government. It includes the names of President Coolidge, Chief Justice Taft, Henry Ford, Owen D. Young, Richard E. Byrd, H. G. Wells, Sir Philip Gibbs, Count Hermann Keyserling, Michael Pupin, Bertrand Russell, James Harvey Robinson, Dean William R. Inge, J. B. S. 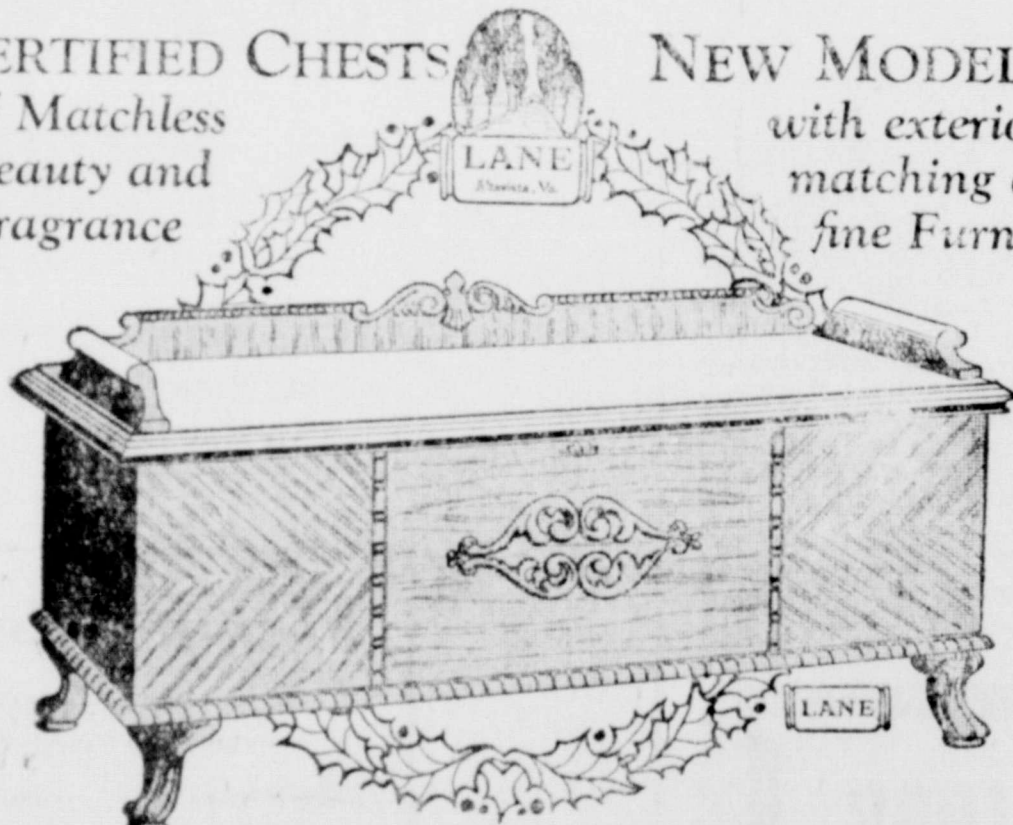

Teachers Hold Good Institute

The first teachers institute under the new law was held in Ballinger Saturday with the Runnels county rural teachers present. County Superintendent R. E. White was delighted with the results of the meeting and especially the attendance. There were 102 of the rural teachers present with only six absent. In addition to this there were 10 present from the Wingate Independent District, six from Norton and one from Rowena.

The Ballinger and Winters districts were both represented by teachers who took a part on the program Saturday.

Dean J. Thomas Davis of John Tarleton brought a great message to the teachers from 11 to 12 o'clock Saturday morning. Mr. Thomas talked from personal experience gathered from his long experience as a teacher and most of the experiences were problems that confront the teachers today. His message was educational to the teachers and was enjoyed by everyone present.

Superintendent A. H. Smith of Winters addressed the meeting in the afternoon on Interscholastic League matters. Mr. Smith is director general of the league in this county and gave the teachers information pertaining to the working of the league that will be helpful to them as every school in this county is a member of the league.

Superintendent H. C. Lyon was called out of town Saturday and Mrs. Joe Forman very ably substituted for him before the institute and addressed the teachers on the Texas Teachers' Association. Mrs. Forman brought a real inspirational message to the teachers regarding the association and the coming meeting at San Antonio which begins the day after Thanksgiving. There are about 42 teachers in the county who hold memberships in the Texas Teachers' Association among the rural teachers and 10 stated Saturday that they would attend the San Antonio meeting. In addition to this number a good crowd of teachers from independent districts will attend.

Dr. W. B. Halley addressed the meeting Saturday afternoon on Health Education and brought many matters of educational importance to the attention of the teachers.

Just before the close of the session a round table discussion of important school matters was held with Superintendent White presiding. High school tuition was discussed from every angle and was the most important subject that was discussed.

The institute passed resolutions thanking the American Legion for the use of the auditorium which was furnished them without cost, and also thanking Moody's Melody Makers for the music furnished at the opening of the morning session.

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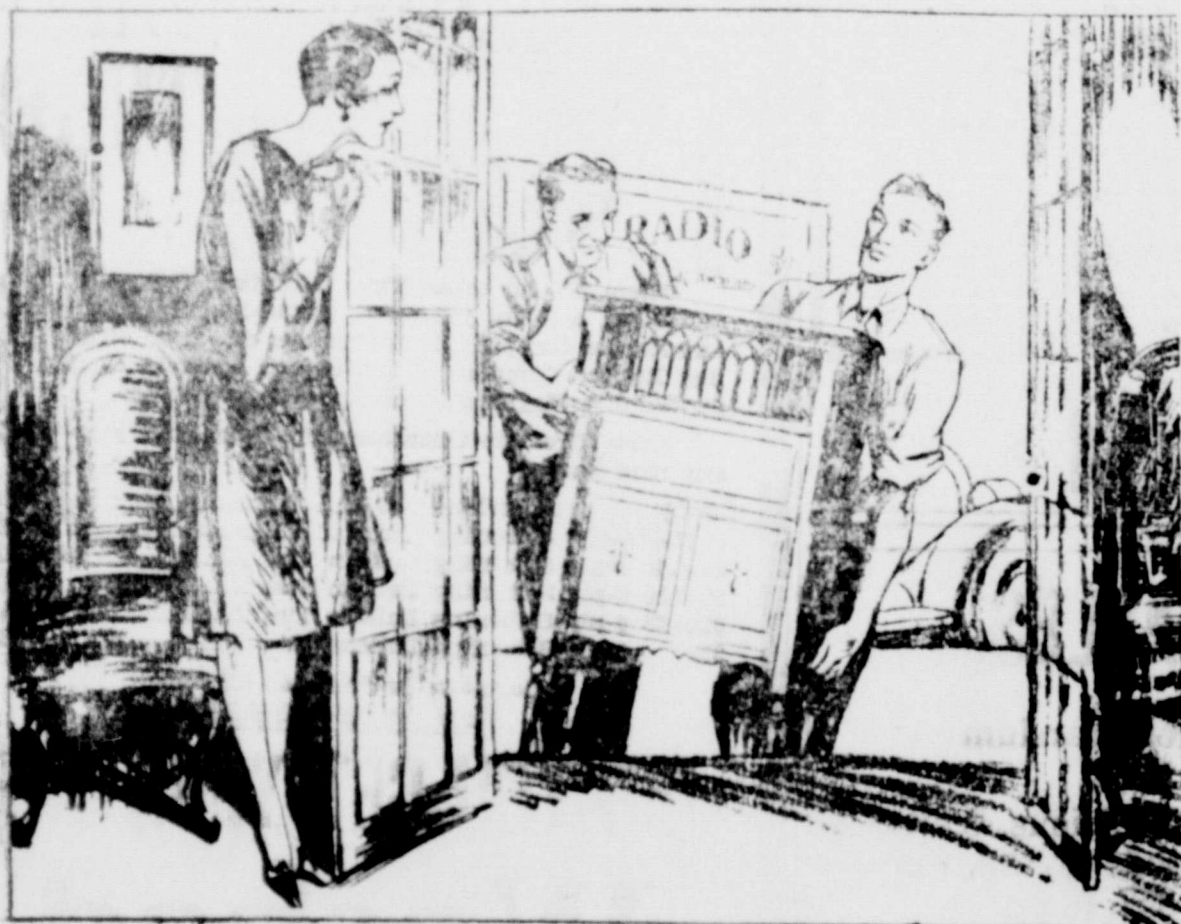
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
