Fight on Against Kellogg Treaty

(By International News Service)
 WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—A battle against the unrestricted approval of the Kellogg multilateral anti-war treaty opened today with the old irreconcilable group sponsoring the resolution explaining that America's "pending ratification." The resolution was sponsored by Senators Moses and Reed and would set forth the terms under which America ratifies the treaty as follows: 1—Impose no obligation on the United States to resort to punitive measures against any offending nation. 2—Impose no limitation of the Monroe Doctrine. 3—Does not impair the right of the United States to defend its territory, trade or commerce. 4—Does not obligate the United States to any treaty to which the United States is not a party. President Coolidge opposes all the reservations.

Hoppe is Given Poultry Prizes

Wm. Hoppe, of Hatchel, won 27 ribbons and considerable cash in prizes at the Coleman county poultry show, when he exhibited his fine Cornish Games at the show there last week.
 Mr. Hoppe exhibited his birds at the Runnels county fair, the San Angelo and Abilene fairs and this week showed the birds at Brownwood, and in each instance has been awarded many prizes, thus making for himself a wonderful reputation as a breeder of fine chickens as well as to substantiate our claim of the past that Runnels county is the best poultry breeding county in Texas.
 At Coleman Mr. Hoppe won six first prizes, best patri-colored pen, champion pen of the show, best five male birds, best white solid color pullet, best 15 birds in the show, best 25 birds in the show.

Early Mailing Not in Effect

The early mailing of Christmas packages has failed to materialize this year, according to employees of the local postoffice. In fact, so light has been the expected Christmas rush that the force at the office expects that most everyone will be trying to mail their packages at the same time.
 It has been the custom for years for people to mail their package early and mark them "don't open till Christmas" but this year it seems that most everyone will not risk the packages in advance and have adopted the slogan "Don't mail till Christmas."

If the present rate of mailing is maintained it is expected that by the middle of next week a person will necessarily have to wait in line at the postoffice from one to four hours to mail a package.
 Thousands of packages are mailed at the Ballinger office each year and so far only a few hundred have been mailed and there remain only seven mailing days before Christmas.

This year's business is expected to be much heavier than that of a year ago, owing to the fact that business for the entire year has been heavier by far than it was in 1927.

Cramer Well is Setting Casing

The Cramer well, four miles south of Winters has been shut down so far as drilling is concerned at 1500 feet, and the crews are busily engaged in setting 12-inch casing.
 The progress of the well has been very satisfactory to the promoters thus far, having been drilled at the rate of 100 feet per 24 hours, and it is expected, of course, that as the hole gets deeper the average will be lessened, but it is expected with favorable conditions, that the well will be completed in the early part of January.

"I believe that it is an established fact that the people of Texas favor prohibition, and a repeal of the search and seizure law and the limiting of the amount of prescription liquor will have the desired effect," King said.

The two gunmen pulled up in front of the house in an old model sedan and began pumping shots towards the house. Overton and his son immediately returned the fire and the men fled.

Crowds Throng City to View Artistic Windows

The first show window fair ever held in Ballinger was a success from every standpoint. Fifteen firms with a total of 26 Christmas windows entered the competition complying with the rules laid down by the committee and no city in Texas is any prettier than Ballinger with her decorations this year. Perhaps the biggest success of the entire occasion was the fact that more than 50 windows were decorated here in the spirit of Christmas, as a result of the Christmas show window fair. Not more than half the windows were entered to be judged and many firms caught the fever late Friday and put men to work building windows to be opened Friday night for the purpose of beautifying the town.

The judges were loud in their praise of Ballinger and the beauty of windows over the entire business district. The thing seems to be catching, stated one judge, when he noticed trees and colored lights being installed in the residential section of the town. Another judge from a larger city stated that he had never seen anything like it and complimented the co-operation of the people of Ballinger on every progressive move that is ever started.
 It was near midnight before the judges finally made their decisions. Many windows were visited for the fourth and some for the fifth time by the judges in an effort to give a fair and impartial opinion. The windows were judged on the basis of Christmas spirit only and merchandise advertising was not considered.
 The following order was given on the final vote. First, Higginbotham Bros. & Co.; second, Stone's; third, Bettis & Sturges; fourth, The Hub, and fifth, D. Reeder. These prize winning windows will be marked by ribbons so that everyone can see the windows which won places and study them. It was also a rule that no firm could win more than one prize.

The winning window at Higginbotham Bros. & Co. was a child's window, a fire place scene with tiny stockings hung on the mantel which had been filled upon Santa's visit to the room. Children's chairs in different sizes were in the room with children's clothes thrown about giving it a real touch of life and cheer. A window in the back of the room is draped in good taste, and not only by the judges, but by the many others who viewed the windows, this one was chosen as first prize winner. The lighting in this window also was very good.
 Stone's was awarded second prize on a window that perhaps is getting more attention than any other window in town. The window was turned into a scene with a miniature train in motion.

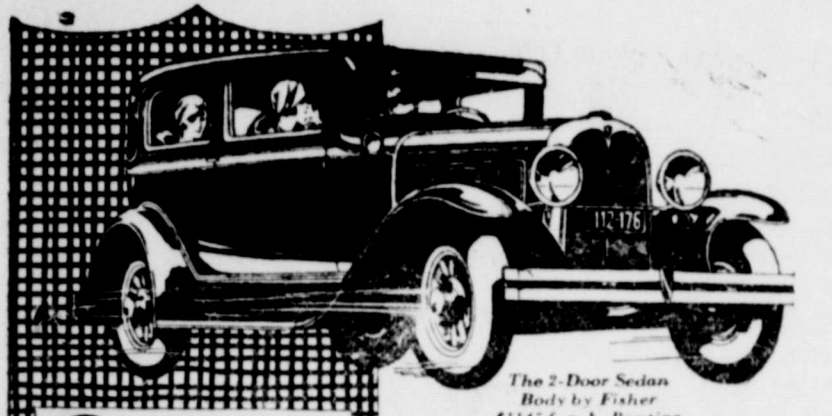
