FALL OF NUEVO LAREDO IS EXPECTED

Teachers' Program is Completed; Need Rooms

Entertainment committees from the chamber of commerce and other organizations of the town met Monday afternoon to arrange for entertainment for the teachers of the Mid-Texas Educational Association when they come here for their meeting on April 5 and 6.

The regular program has been announced and is carried in full below for the two days meet. Poison Liquor Causes Raids

PEORIA, Ill., Mar. 5.—Police raiders began cleaning all speakeasies and blind pigs here today following the deaths of 15 and blinding of more than a score as a result of drinking poisoned liquor.

Three thousand bootleggers are said to have closed shop as the result of the alarming death rate and subsequent investigations. Several arrests have been made in connection with the deaths. Some of the poisonous liquor has been shipped to other cities in this state.

County Meet Dates March 22 and 23

The dates of the county inter-scholastic meet has been set for March 22 and 23 and will be held at Winters. This year in all events the high school and grammar schools will compete for a separate championship and all events will be held in different groups. This competition will be effective in track, literature, debating, declamation, tennis and all other competition of the meet. Champions in the county meet at Winters, or winners of first places will go to San Angelo in April to compete in the district meet and winners from the district will go to Austin to compete in the state meet.

The Ballinger High School and grammar school are working hard now and will have entries in all events at Winters. They expect to take their share of first places and be well represented at the district meet in San Angelo next month. The boys are working each afternoon on track events at Fair Park and different teachers are drilling their other teams in preparation for the events in which they will contest at Winters.

Supt. H. C. Lyon stated Tuesday morning that they will have well drilled and trained students to compete for every first place offered and many Ballinger people will go to Winters to boost local students on to victory.

The school was represented in the state meet last year in tennis and is expecting someone to get that far this year.

For a number of years now the girls choral club has been successful in winning at the district meet and Miss Dorothy Chancey is rehearsing the girls to duplicate this feat. The girls are about the same this year as in years past and have an excellent chance to win first place at San Angelo. This competition does not go to the state meet and after winning in the district the victorious club receives a loving cup for its work.

Radio Driven Car Brings Out Crowd

The mystery car proved a feature here Tuesday that caused many people to come here for the afternoon. By the time advertised for the car to make its appearance the streets were lined like a parade was coming on circus day or during the fall fair.

The car was all that was advertised or expected. A Chevrolet coach was rigged up with the special radio control and in a second car Miss Gloria Hall operated the contraption that made the driverless car wind its way through the traffic, stop, start, blow the horn and do anything else that a car can do with a driver at the wheel. The car was driven at a slow rate of speed and was followed by the second car at a short distance.

A 15 minute stop was made each hour at different places in the town and at each of these stops many who were curious carefully examined the car and its equipment while they could get close to it and look inside. The car at the end of the stop would sound the horn and the motor would spin and away it would go with a crowd following after it.

The reward of \$1000 offered for anyone who found someone concealed in the car caused several to look carefully inside to be sure that the car was empty except for the extra radio equipment within it.

Mr. Bird stated that they were not so interested in getting the store here in Ballinger as they were in getting the services of Mr. Behringer. Mr. Behringer will be transferred to Abilene about the first of April and will be district manager of the stores in that section. He will include in his territory a radius of 100 miles around Abilene but will not be given Ballinger in that territory. Mr. Bird stated to a reporter that the executive ability Mr. Behringer had shown in managing the Ballinger store had attracted their attention and that they wanted him in the organization. He said that they had to pay to get him but that they were satisfied and believed they had gotten their money's worth.

In speaking of the new organization coming into charge of the Piggly Wiggly store here Mr. Baird stated that it was one of the largest chain store organizations in the United States at present and the fastest growing of all stores of that type. They are at present operating over 300 stores in 22 states West of the Mississippi, Hawaiian Islands, western Canada, Maryland and Virginia and will soon open stores in Australia.

L. R. Bradford will be in charge of the grocery part of the store and Weidon Howell in charge of the market. These managers will share in the profits of the store and will have full charge and will carry the store on about the same as heretofore Mr. Bird stated that it was the policy of their organi-

LAREDO, Tex., March 5.—With General Gorestieta, former commander of the rebel forces at Monterey, and Colonel Zenon Avila, commanding a force of 2,000 rebels at Rodriguez, about half way between Nuevo Laredo and Monterey, it is possible that Nuevo Laredo soon will be in the hands of the revolutionary forces.

The garrison at Nuevo Laredo, under the command of General Torres, marched out of the city this morning, ostensibly for Villaladama, where a skirmish took place.

The surrender of Nuevo Laredo is expected to be made without bloodshed.

Jury Completed In the Cox Case

Attorneys completed the jury late Monday afternoon in the case of the State of Texas vs. Delbert Cox. The defense filed a motion for a continuance but the court overruled this motion and ordered that a jury be selected. Fifty-odd men were examined from the special venire of 72 men before the needed 12 were accepted by both sides.

The jury that will hear the case is composed of the following: O. C. Sykes, Joe Huffman, Henry Bright, Ed McCauley, Edward Glass, Lem Harvey, Gay Mullins, Paul Martin, E. A. Jeanes, Dave Forgey, D. A. Dobbins and A. E. Williams.

When the case was called Monday morning attorneys for the defense filed a motion with the court to quash the indictment and named several grounds for their contentions. Among other things they declared that written evidence in the case which was presented to the grand jury was not sworn to and that the district attorney was present in the grand jury room when the jury discussed the case with the view of finding an indictment. The motion was overruled and the case started with the understanding that the defense might place members of the grand jury on the stand as soon as they could be summoned to try and prove their charges.

The defendant was ordered to stand and the charge read to him to which he refused to enter a plea and the court entered a plea of guilty for him.

Three Named in Massacre

CHICAGO, Mar. 5.—Three men were named today by the state's attorney's office as actual participants in the St. Valentine Day massacre of seven Chicago gangsters. Those named are: Joseph Lolordo, a brother to Pasqualino Lolordo who was assassinated by a gangster in his home on January 8th; Frederick R. Bruke of St. Louis, and James Ray, of St. Louis.

Baptist Meeting At Texarkana

TEXARKANA, Mar. 5.—The American Baptist Association began its fourth annual convention here today with approximately 500 delegates here from 15 Southern states. Sessions will cover three days.

MEXICO CITY, Mar. 5.—The Mexican revolt has spread from the northwestern states into communities south of the capitol. The states which are now controlled either wholly or in part by rebels are Sonora, Oaxaca, Sinaloa, Durango, Coahuila, Nueva Leon, Jalisco, Vera Cruz, Zacatecas and Nayarit. The state of Chihuahua seems to have remained loyal. The sensational rumor circulated on the border and in Europe that President Portes Gil had been seized and imprisoned has proven untrue.

General Gonzales Cobar, well known Mexican military leader is the latest to desert the federal army and join the rebels. He was military commander of the state of Coahuila.

From Nogales comes news that 3000 rebel troops under the leadership of General Rabele today were concentrating at Navojoa, and Sonora, to prepare a march on Mexico City. Federal Troops under General Jaime Carrillo have retreated to Mazatlan from Sonora.

MEXICO CITY, Mar. 5.—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh apparently was stranded here today temporarily as his plane has not been repaired and train service between this city and the American border has been disrupted by rebels. The famous air soloist is with his fiancée and not much perturbed.

Four Billion to Run Government

WASHINGTON, Mar. 5.—The lame duck session of congress appropriated more than three billion dollars to run the government next year, and indefinite appropriations upon which no legislative action is necessary will increase the total to more than four and a half billion. Congress hewed closely to the line of demarcation as set down in the Coolidge budget.

2 Cabinet Members To Continue at Posts

WASHINGTON, Mar. 5.—The names of Secretary of the Treasury Andrew W. Mellon, Secretary of Labor James J. Davis, both of Pennsylvania, will not be sent to the senate for confirmation anew when President Hoover asks approval of his cabinet. They will continue in office under appointments given by Coolidge, it was learned.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 5.—The congressional reapportionment of tariff farm relief will be the major issue of the special session of congress called for April, it was announced today by Senator Watson, republican of Indiana, the new floor leader of that party in the senate.

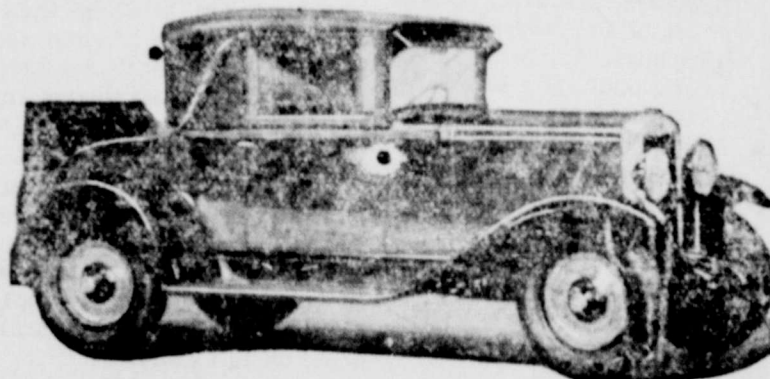

Huggins has been nursing these two boys along for years, just as he did with Pipgras and Johnson, and professes to believe that one or both of them will make the grade this season.

The crop of pitching recruits includes Ed Wells, Gordon Rhodes, from the coast, Roy Sherrid, and Fay Thomas. Wells failed to make good at Detroit and Washington, but won 2 games for Birmingham last year in addition to batting .374. Glennon Death Reminds of Old N.Y. Tenderloin

(By International News Service) NEW YORK, Mar. 5.—Eddie Glennon is dead!

That means nothing to the modern generation of New Yorkers. To old timers, however, the mention of Eddie Glennon brings memories of gang warfare, a free and open tenderloin, vice and graft.

Eddie Glennon, or properly speaking, Police Captain Edward Glennon, was the czar of the tenderloin when New York was a "wide open town."

He was the friend of Commissioner "Big Bill" Devery, the only man inside or outside of the police department that "the boss" trusted, and no policeman dared question his words or orders.

Glennon was born in Second Avenue, and was appointed to the police department as a patrolman in 1885. Slowly, but surely, he ascended the ladder until he became a captain. Although he had never drawn a salary larger than \$1,400 Glennon is said to have died a rich man.

Along with Devery he was dismissed from the force for neglect of duty in 1894 when complaints were made that they failed to suppress resorts in the tenderloin. In 1895 both men were reinstated.

He was again found guilty of neglect of duty in 1903. He appealed to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, which affirmed the conviction.

The court of appeals reversed the decision and ordered a new trial, which resulted in his acquittal.

A month later he was reinstated by Commissioner Greene and sent to the old Mulberry Street Station as a patrolman. Within the next two years he retired on a pension.

Glennon was 72 years old. He died from a heart attack. For the last few years he had lived in comparative obscurity in an uptown apartment.

DENVER STUDENTS PLAN OUR POLITICAL PARTY

DENVER, Mar. 5.—Believing that student affairs have been settled in the past by a small group of leaders, and not by the students themselves, a movement has been started on the University of Denver campus to organize a "liberal political party."

The movement was at first overruled by the student council because they feared it was a radical idea to be used in putting over selfish plans. On a re-hearing, however, the move was given accord by the council.

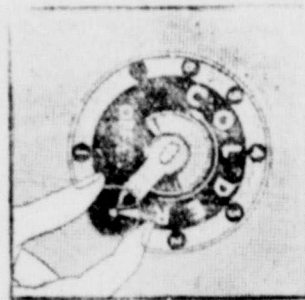

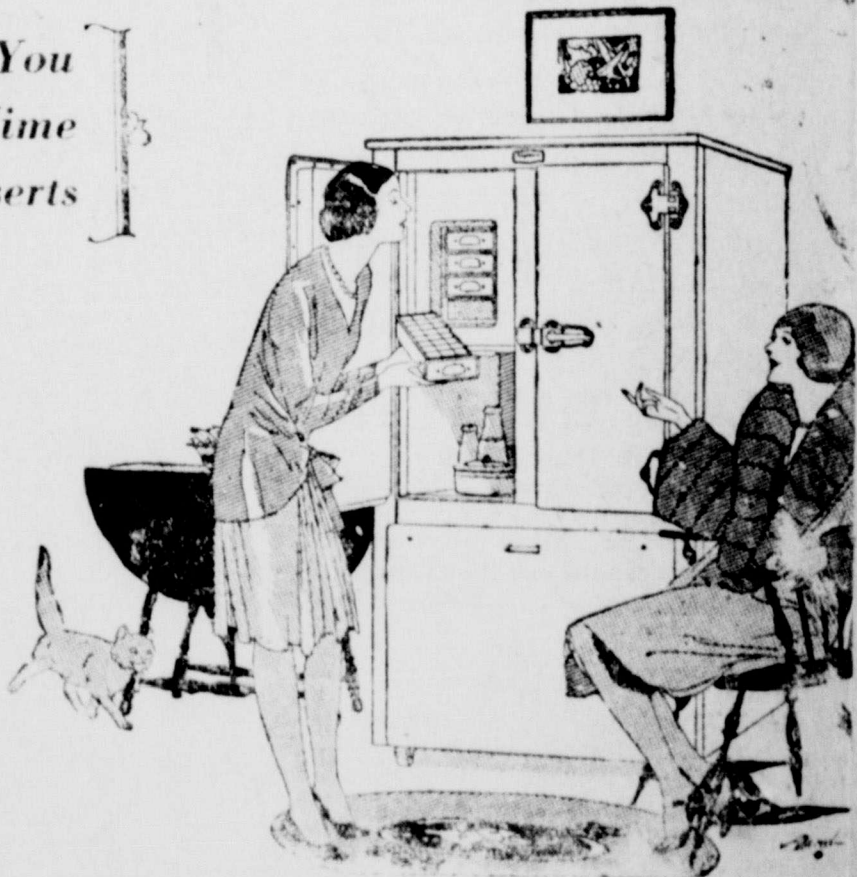

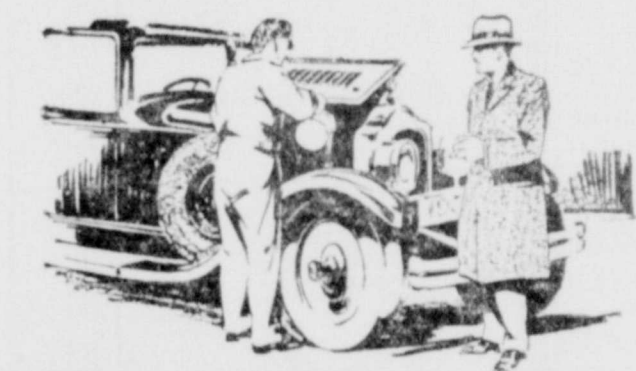
