Bergere Enters 5°0 Mile Race At Indianapolis

(By International News Service)

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Mar. 19.-Cliff Bergere, the Hollywood, Calif., race driver, has the honor of being the first to enter the seventeenth annual 500-mile international sweepstakes, now known as the grand prize of America, which will be held at the world famous Indianapolis Speedway here May 30.

A record entry list for the Hoosier speed classic was in sight today according to officials of the speedway.

The coming race will witness Bergeres' third attempt to win the world's most fam-us automobile contest. He will drive a front-drive Miller on May 30th.

Last Memorial Day Bergere had the position on the outside of the front row for the start of the race, having qualified at a speed of 119 .-95 miles an hour with his front drive. In the early laps of the 1928 race he and Leon Duray, in another front drive Miller, battled for the lead, Bergere losing out because his timing gears failed to function. He has spent the winter rebuilding his car and expects to have the fastest car in the field for the final race of 911-2 cubic inch engines.

Before Bergere came east from California for the major league races he was a stunt man in the movies and appeared on the vaudeville stage. In his first appearance in the 500-mile race he also had all the thrills which could go with making a film. During the 1927 race, going down the home stretch in front of the stands he narrowly escaped a serious spill. Henry Kohlert lost control of his car when running close to Bergere and the fans got more thrills than they had at this spot since, Harry Knight's famous spill in the first 500-mile race back in 1911.

Bergere's car and Kohlert's machine tangled up, "kissed" the concrete retaining wall, and finally when Kohlert's car went "head over heels" Bergere shot under it and was lucky enough to be out of the path of the tumbling racer when it catapulted across the track.
