Taps Sounded for Marshal Foch

Ballinger is Assured a Berth in W. T. League

The four committees working on the baseball project in regard to entering the West Texas League this summer were nearing the goal Wednesday at noon with a good many people yet to see. It was decided to notify league officials that we are ready to go and to send representatives here within the next few days to attend a mass meeting at which time directors for the Ballinger club will be elected.

The full \$3000 has not been raised yet but the fund was around \$2700 and the committees will continue to work for the next few days and will have no trouble in finishing the fund. There are some people out of town at present who cannot be seen. Other firms had to take the matter up with the heads of their business at other places and it will require several days before the amount of their pledges will be known, but the committee was near enough at noon Wednesday to know that the deal would go over and that we have met every requirement regarding the proposition.

As soon as it is learned when the backers of the club and West Texas League officials can get to Ballinger a mass meeting will be called of all donors and interested fans at which time the organization will be formed. The San Angelo Morning Times Wednesday morning indicated that the amount being raised in Ballinger was very small and that somebody would lose money. This is not a worry of ours according to the agreement and after donating \$2500 we are through except to buy our tickets to the games. They also kindly offered to sell us Eddie McMillan for \$1500. We would like to see Eddie in one of our garden positions this summer and in conversation with him at noon Wednesday he stated that he would like to play ball here this summer. "I have not signed a contract with San Angelo yet and don't know if I will or not," he said. Eddie finished the season with San Angelo last year and has received a contract from them this year which he still has unsigned. We don't know much about league baseball and he may belong to San Angelo, but if he is a free agent, we would sure like to see him busting the apple for the Bears this season.

Those who have not been solicited on the \$3000 fund to be raised here will be seen in the next few days by some members of the committee.

Teachers Answer Invitation to Meet

Indications continue to grow daily for a record-breaking attendance of teachers here at the Mid-Texas Educational Association meeting of April 5 and 6. Most of the schools in this section of the state will close on Friday, April 5 in order to allow their teaching staff to be here for the gathering and to hear the program.

H. C. Lyon has received many letters from city and county superintendents in this section of the state saying that they will be in Ballinger for all the program.

Geneva Sill, county superintendent of Hamilton county, writes that she will be present together with several teachers from the rural schools.

C. A. Cowan, superintendent at Menard, stated that he is coming and that he has been planning all the year for this meeting. Several of his teachers will come to Ballinger with him.

Frank L. Williams, superintendent at Roscoe, writes that he is coming and says there will be a large crowd from that section of the country.

Superintendent A. M. Limmer of Desdemona says that he will be present with several teachers.

The superintendent at Santa Anna will be here and will bring 19 teachers from Santa Anna with him.

Superintendent B. H. McClain of Sweetwater has written that he and teachers from that city will be present.

Superintendent E. J. Woodward of Brownwood will be present and will have five or six teachers from Brownwood with him and possibly more.

Superintendent N. S. Holland of Breckenridge is coming and will bring other teachers from that city with him.

A. H. Smith, superintendent of Winters, will be here and will bring all the teachers from the Winters school with him.

Such letters as these are being received daily and with the large territory covered by the organization the attendance is expected to be the largest ever had at a meeting of the association before. The meeting is being advertised extensively both from Ballinger and from the office of the president and no teacher in the territory will fail to receive an invitation and a complete program of the meeting which included some of the outstanding educators of the state.

Dallas Man is Instantly Killed

DALLAS, Mar. 20.—Andrew M. Blue was shot and killed today in the office of G. B. Pierce, in the Marvin Building. Pierce was arrested shortly after the shooting by Police Sergeant Louis Senser. Blue was shot above the heart and died instantly.

It was announced that the San Angelo Rotary Club would come to Ballinger on April 11 to return the call of the local club made to San Angelo last fall. Killing Season On at New York

NEW YORK, Mar. 20.—A liquor war between rival gangs opened here today. Some say that it is just the killing season, others attribute it to the heavy penalties of the Jones law. Frank Sacco, underworld character, and his wife were found shot to death today. They were crumpled behind a specially constructed door in their home. The bullet riddled body of James Dunfio was found on the sidewalk in Greenwich Village, close to Speakeasy Row.

PARIS, March 20.—Marshal Ferdinand Foch, one of the greatest soldiers of modern times and generalissimo of the allied armies in the field at the end of the World War, died this afternoon after a long illness.

The aged French general suffered from a heart attack and kidney trouble. It had been evident for the last forty-eight hours that the veteran warrior could not recover. Foch was 78.

The victory over the mighty Germany armies in the last year of the conflict was attributed to the genius of Marshal Foch. After the war the heavy burden of seeing that the military clauses of the Treaty of Versailles were executed was devolved upon Foch. The French leader's health seemed normal until last fall.

Negro Murder Case to Jury

DALLAS, Mar. 20.—The case of the State of Texas versus L. M. Lacey, negro, charged with the murder of Joe Piccola, grocer, last February 9, is expected to go to the jury today. Lacey claims the killing was done by Ardel and Edward Landers, negroes.

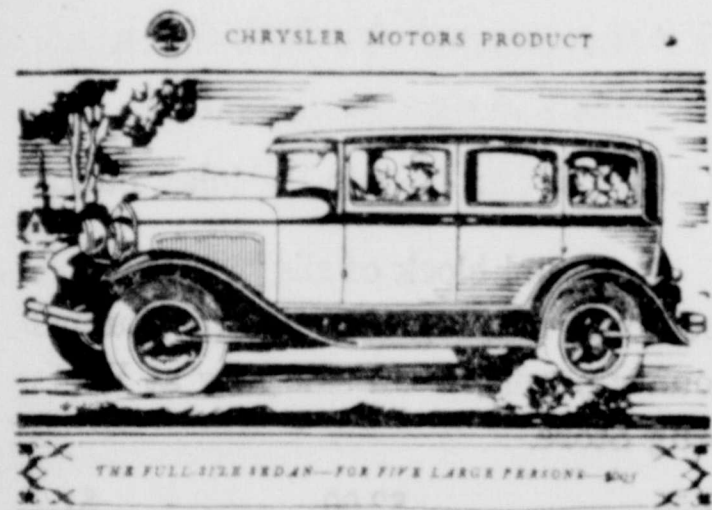

Representative Lee Reports Work Done

Eden Texas, March 18th, 1929.

Dear Editor:

The regular session of the Texas Legislature has closed and I am sending this partial report of my work in that body performed for the people of the 92nd District.

There were about 800 bills introduced in the House making about two hundred per week, besides more than five hundred introduced in the Senate.

The Constitutional Amendment No. 19, was introduced by me in the House and was sponsored in the Senate by Senator Woodward, the one offered in the Senate being identical with the one in the House. The Senate passed this measure and when the one offered by me came up on the calendar for consideration, I moved to substitute the Senate Resolution for the one on the calendar, which was done, and it was passed almost by unanimous vote.

It provides, that when the Legislature assembles, that the first thirty days shall be devoted to the confirmation of recess appointments by the Governor, passing on emergency legislation, the introduction of Bills, and the appointment of committees. The next thirty days shall be devoted to the consideration of the bills introduced, the holding of hearings by the committees so that the people may have a chance to be heard on any measure.

The next sixty days shall be devoted to the discussion and passage of measures. Another part of the resolution provides for a decrease of 50 per cent in the mileage paid to members, and an increase of the per diem paid them from \$5.00 per day to \$10.00 per day of the regular session, and \$5.00 per day for all over one hundred and twenty days.

The need for this change of time is very apparent. As the session is now held with an average of 200 new bills coming into the hopper per week with very little time for combination and is the direct cause of so much ill advised legislation going into our statutes that has to be repealed at the next meeting of the Assembly.

All of which is costly to the state and has a tendency to cause disregard for law.

Joint Resolution No. 10, did not get the required amount of votes to be submitted to the people, this is known as the BOND Amendment. At my insistent request there was written into the measure as finally offered the exemption of all ad valorem taxes, that no part of which could ever be applied to pay any interest of sinking fund of any bonds issued by virtue of the meas-

ure, after getting this into the measure I supported it. My reason for doing so was that it protected the farm and other real estate as well as personal property from paying any part of a tax to the support of our highways and would make the traffic bear the burden, and would save the counties from having to issue County Bonds supported by an ad valorem tax to build their roads. Therefore I was willing for the measure to go to the people for their consideration.

I supported Senate Bill 150, by Senator Small, validation the title to lands sold more than ten years ago and which the State had received pay for. I think that the State of Texas, should set an example for its citizens, that it should be very careful to stand by its contracts with its people and do and perform each and every act in a business transaction that it would require or expect to be fulfilled and performed by one of its citizens. I want my State to be jealous of its honor and its integrity and to carefully and accurately stand by its contracts.

I did not support the Wirtz Bill, that passed both houses, and I wish the Governor would veto the measure, it provided that the Democratic committee should have the power and right to say who should vote or participate in the Democratic Primary. This is a measure that is fraught with much potential evil, there are too many men that desire to dominate in a selfish way matters and men under their control.

There can be no advance in life, there can be no advance in Democracy except that predicated upon FAITH in its righteous cause, duress can only bring disaster.

I supported many measures of minor importance and was opposed to many others, among which was the bill providing for a trial fee of \$7.0 in misdemeanor cases in the Justice Courts. This was charged to take care of trials where there were no judgments rendered. It is not right to compel a convicted person to pay the expense of a trial where the court does not receive a fee. If our laws and courts are not conducted upon a high plane of common justice it will not receive the honor and respect due a court of State. I have tried to render you a service founded upon honest endeavor. I cast the only vote against

the last named measure. I am glad to render you this report. Respectfully,

All Methodists are expected to be present. Each Wednesday night Church Night will be observed with a different department having charge of the devotional each night. Each night following the devotional service the recreational committee of the church, Mrs. Joe Forman, Miss Helen Brewer and Miss Irene Trousdale, will have some kind of recreational program such as musical program, games, plays, book reviews, sing songs, nature study, art programs, which they hope will help to develop the four square boy and enjoy every minute if you will come, says the committee, and each program they arrange will be entertaining and educational. Aside from studying together they plan for the young and old to play together and in this way make the programs so attractive that many will be attracted to the church on Wednesday nights.

Mrs. J. P. Pogue has gone to Dallas to represent the Ballinger grove of Royal Neighbors, as a delegate to the state convention in that city.

Heavy Rain is Falling In 20 Counties Today

ABILENE, Mar. 20.—A steady rain that began last night and was still falling this morning was reported to the company dispatcher of the West Texas Utilities Company from some 20 or 25 counties on their properties at Mason, Junction, Menard, Ozona and McCamey. San Angelo and Ballinger report a heavy rain, starting last night and still continuing at this report. They also report the roads in the southern district to be in a very bad condition. Stamford, Anson, Hamilton and Cisco report small showers and cloudy weather this

morning. A slow mist is falling in Abilene with indications of a heavy rain. Quanah and the northern district report no rain. The rain which started falling Wednesday morning seems to have been general all over the county Wednesday at noon. In some places the rain began falling shortly after midnight Tuesday and at noon Wednesday there had been no let-up. Coming so close after the other rains, roads in this section are in a bad condition and farmers will be kept out of the fields for some

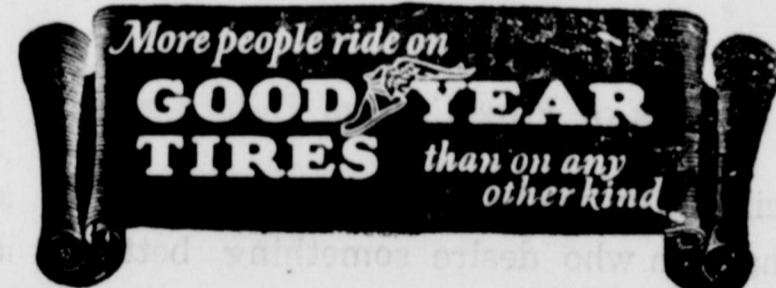

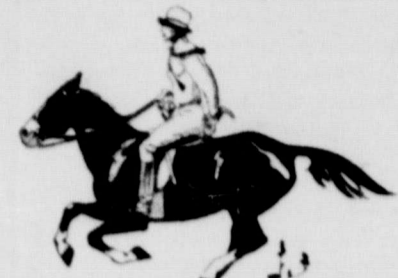

PARIS, March 20.—Marshal Ferdinand Foch, one of the greatest soldiers of modern times and generalissimo of the allied armies in the field at the end of the World War, died this afternoon after a long illness.

The aged French general suffered from a heart attack and kidney trouble. It had been evident for the last forty-eight hours that the veteran warrior could not recover. Foch was 78.

The victory over the mighty Germany armies in the last year of the conflict was attributed to the genius of Marshal Foch. After the war the heavy burden of seeing that the military clauses of the Treaty of Versailles were executed was devolved upon Foch. The French leader's health seemed normal until last fall.

Negro Murder Case to Jury

DALLAS, Mar. 20.—The case of the State of Texas versus L. M. Lacey, negro, charged with the murder of Joe Piccola, grocer, last February 9, is expected to go to the jury today. Lacey claims the killing was done by Ardel and Edward Landers, negroes.

Representative Lee Reports Work Done

Eden Texas, March 18th, 1929.

Dear Editor:

The regular session of the Texas Legislature has closed and I am sending this partial report of my work in that body performed for the people of the 92nd District.

There were about 800 bills introduced in the House making about two hundred per week, besides more than five hundred introduced in the Senate.

The Constitutional Amendment No. 19, was introduced by me in the House and was sponsored in the Senate by Senator Woodward, the one offered in the Senate being identical with the one in the House. The Senate passed this measure and when the one offered by me came up on the calendar for consideration, I moved to substitute the Senate Resolution for the one on the calendar, which was done, and it was passed almost by unanimous vote.

It provides, that when the Legislature assembles, that the first thirty days shall be devoted to the confirmation of recess appointments by the Governor, passing on emergency legislation, the introduction of Bills, and the appointment of committees. The next thirty days shall be devoted to the consideration of the bills introduced, the holding of hearings by the committees so that the people may have a chance to be heard on any measure.

The next sixty days shall be devoted to the discussion and passage of measures. Another part of the resolution provides for a decrease of 50 per cent in the mileage paid to members, and an increase of the per diem paid them from \$5.00 per day to \$10.00 per day of the regular session, and \$5.00 per day for all over one hundred and twenty days.

The need for this change of time is very apparent. As the session is now held with an average of 200 new bills coming into the hopper per week with very little time for combination and is the direct cause of so much ill advised legislation going into our statutes that has to be repealed at the next meeting of the Assembly.

All of which is costly to the state and has a tendency to cause disregard for law.

Joint Resolution No. 10, did not get the required amount of votes to be submitted to the people, this is known as the BOND Amendment. At my insistent request there was written into the measure as finally offered the exemption of all ad valorem taxes, that no part of which could ever be applied to pay any interest of sinking fund of any bonds issued by virtue of the meas-

ure, after getting this into the measure I supported it. My reason for doing so was that it protected the farm and other real estate as well as personal property from paying any part of a tax to the support of our highways and would make the traffic bear the burden, and would save the counties from having to issue County Bonds supported by an ad valorem tax to build their roads. Therefore I was willing for the measure to go to the people for their consideration.

I supported Senate Bill 150, by Senator Small, validation the title to lands sold more than ten years ago and which the State had received pay for. I think that the State of Texas, should set an example for its citizens, that it should be very careful to stand by its contracts with its people and do and perform each and every act in a business transaction that it would require or expect to be fulfilled and performed by one of its citizens. I want my State to be jealous of its honor and its integrity and to carefully and accurately stand by its contracts.

I did not support the Wirtz Bill, that passed both houses, and I wish the Governor would veto the measure, it provided that the Democratic committee should have the power and right to say who should vote or participate in the Democratic Primary. This is a measure that is fraught with much potential evil, there are too many men that desire to dominate in a selfish way matters and men under their control.

There can be no advance in life, there can be no advance in Democracy except that predicated upon FAITH in its righteous cause; duress can only bring disaster.

I supported many measures of minor importance and was opposed to many others, among which was the bill providing for a trial fee of \$7.00 in misdemeanor cases in the Justice Courts. This was charged to take care of trials where there were no judgments rendered. It is not right to compel a convicted person to pay the expense of a trial where the court does not receive a fee. If our laws and courts are not conducted upon a high plane of common justice it will not receive the honor and respect due a court or State. I have tried to render you a service founded upon honest endeavor. I cast the only vote against

the last named measure. I am glad to render you this report.

Aside from studying together they plan for the young and old to play together and in this way make the programs so attractive that many will be attracted to the church on Wednesday nights.
