



Modest Business Grows to Billions As Farmers Endorse Grain Exchange

CHICAGO .- Far back in November 1848, a few weeks after the Chicago Board of Trade was organized, the first rall shipment of wheat was hauled in to what is now the world's greatest central market.

"The Pioneer," first locomotive in Chicago, made an inspection run over the original ten miles of the present North Western system.

On the return "spin," a farmer with broken down wagonload of wheat was encountered. After negotiations. his grain was brought in to the Chi-BETZ cago market by the wood burner

Since that day, billions of bushels of farm products have been bought and sold at the Chicago Board of Trade. In 1928, 37,152,000 pustiels of wheat were received from lake vessels and railroads.
