## FORCED LANDING CAUSE AVIATRIX'S DEATH

### Chinese Swarm to Interior; Russian Troops Threaten Frontier

(By International News Service)  
**HARBIN, Manchuria, Aug. 20.**—In their wholesale evacuation from towns along the Manchurian frontier, hundreds of Chinese swarming toward the interior, were thrown into a panic by recurring raids by Soviet troops stationed on the frontier. This evacuation was reverted today in official customs dispatches from Taheimo. These dispatches also confirmed reports that the Sino-Russian crisis is becoming more serious every hour. A total of 150,000 Chinese troops, well armed and well equipped are being rushed to strategic border points.

#### Old Settlers Hold Twentieth Reunion

Old Settlers began arriving in Ballinger Tuesday morning for their annual reunion to be held here on Tuesday night and Wednesday. The regular meeting place, the L. P. Wood pasture near Old Runnels, will be used again this year.

J. M. Johnson, of Winters, was among the first to arrive here. He is president of the body and has served in that capacity for the past twenty years or since the Old Settlers was organized. Mr. Johnson is truly an "old timer," coming to this county in 1876 and living here for the past 53 years. The pioneers were busy all day Tuesday, greeting new arrivals of the early day who continued to drift into the city. The greetings of the old time friends were filled with enthusiasm and many tales of the early days in this section of the state were swapped.

Mr. Johnson stated that supper would be served at the grounds Tuesday night and that the regular annual barbecue would be served Wednesday at noon. Quite a number of invited guests will be present at the Wednesday noon meal.

The organization was originally made up of the pioneer settlers of Runnels county, but in the last few years their children have begun to play an important part in their meetings. Each year, due to the age of some of the original members and others who have gone West, the meetings dwindle. Some have moved to places so far distant that it is impossible to get back for the annual get-togethers, however attendance is punctual of those who live here and in adjoining territory.

The reunion was not held last year on account of the illness of L. P. Wood, on whose ranch the Ex-Cowpunchers Association has always met. The gathering was called again this year, and Mr. Wood will be one of the old timers who will be missed from the councils. He was a faithful member and was always present at the reunions until his health became so bad he could not join the festivities.

#### Pittsburgh in Move for More Rapid Transit

**PITTSBURGH, August 20.**—The speed craze is waking Old Pa Pitt from his more and more infrequent naps. Airplanes hum over his head, fast ships race down the river, and speed trains rush into his stations in more profusion daily.

The latest rapid transit bug to bite the old gentleman is the desire for faster trolley transportation.

Pittsburgh has no elevated railroads and no subway system. The task of transporting thousands of persons is left to automobiles and the street cars. Burdened with tremendous crowds, especially during the rush hours, officials of the railway company have been prevailed upon to attempt a speeding up of the system.

In place of the 35-horsepower units, the new cars will have 50-horsepower motors. The new high speed cars will be tried first in the Mt. Lebanon and Dormont districts, and if found satisfactory will be placed on all city lines.

High speed street cars soon may be dashing over all lines in the city, hurrying workers to the office and hurrying them home again as rapidly as Chicago and New York speeds the crowds via elevated railroads and subways.

Neither, engineers believe, is practicable in this city because of the number of hills that extend even to the business district in the Golden Triangle where the Alleghany and Monongahela rivers converge into the Ohio.

Running time will be cut fifteen per cent by the new high speed trolleys, officials estimated, and if the high motored cars are extended throughout the city, Pittsburgh would have one of the most rapid surface lines in the country.

#### No Word Received From Swiss Fliers

**ST. JOHNS, Newfoundland, Aug. 20.**—Overcast skies and drizzling rain today furnished unfavorable flying weather for the two daring Swiss trans-Atlantic airmen, Oscar Kaeser and Kurt Lucscher, who are attempting a non-stop flight from Portugal to the North American continent.

Although a close watch has been maintained all along the eastern coast since early last night, no word of the fliers has reached St. Johns since they passed over the Azores Islands early last evening.

#### Thief Loots Safe Of Service Station

Some time during the night Monday a party or parties unknown entered the Magnolia filling station at the intersection of Hutchings Avenue and Broadway, and rifled the safe. A check-up Tuesday morning showed that the thief escaped with about \$40 in cash and \$20 in checks.

Entrance was made by scaling the high wire fence which surrounds the station, and either picking the lock on the door or using a pass key. The latch is the common house door variety and any skeleton key will fit it.

The safe was left unlocked Monday night and the robbers had no trouble gaining access to the strong-box.

No clue was in the hands of the sheriff's department at press time, as no marks or tracks had been discovered. An effort was being made to trace some of the missing checks.

Whether the plane will land here or proceed on to San Francisco has not yet been determined.

**WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.**—The terrible overcrowding of federal prisons will be relieved temporarily by the transfer of all military prisoners, now at the Leavenworth, Kansas, penitentiary to Blackwell's Island, New York, and Alcatraz Island, California, it was announced today.

Some 1,600 military prisoners are involved in the transfer.

#### Old Texas Port is Recalled by Bell

**VICTORIA, Tex., Aug. 20.**—Memories of the tragic fate of Indianola, once a prosperous Texas port, were revived by the discovery of a large bronze bell, in an almost perfect state of preservation, which was unearthed by the recent hurricane which swept the Gulf Coast. It was ascertained upon cleaning the bell that it had been made in Cincinnati in 1871.

Indianola was almost destroyed by a storm in 1875, and in 1886 a fire which swept it completed the work of destruction. The once prosperous port was abandoned.

It is thought the bell belonged to a church in Indianola. Efforts were being made to establish its ownership by Frank Montier, who found it.

#### Yosemite National Park Plan Aerial Cable For Glacier Point

**YOSEMITE NATIONAL PARK, Aug. 19.**—An aerial cableway system may soon link the far-famed and lofty Glacier Point, the most celebrated precipice of gorgeous Yosemite with the floor of the valley 3,234 feet below.

While no action has yet been taken, officials of the park, the chief scenic wonder of the Pacific coast, said that they have been studying the various tramways in an effort to settle upon a safe, inexpensive means of transportation between the two places.

At present, Glacier Point is only reached by climbing a steep zig-zag and somewhat perilous trail, or by a roundabout mountain road for automobiles.

An aerial cableway, first used in the higher regions of Germany in 1925, and now installed in the Alps in Switzerland, in Spain, in Sweden and South Africa, has been suggested as the most logical for Yosemite.

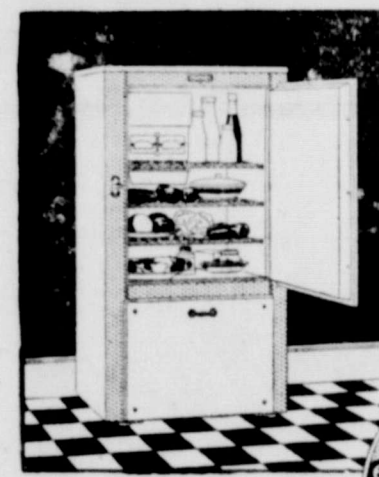

Ballinger had a good day Monday, gaining a full game on Midland in the race during the second half of the West Texas League season. The Bearcats defeated the Coleman Bobcats in the opening game of the present series, 12 to 6, while the Big Spring Cowboys were lambasting the Midland Colts, 2 to 1. Ernie Miller, formerly with the Ballinger team, let the Ponies down with three hits, which is the best game pitched against Midland this year that can be recalled.

Ballinger got off to a bad start yesterday when three Coleman players hit for three two-base whams. These hits and a walk netted three runs and gave the Bobcats a lead that was hard to overcome. Ballinger came back in the second to garner four runs and the lead when an error, three hits and a walk gave the homeguards a margin. Another score was annexed in the third when E. Mueller hit safe and Al Mueller doubled. In the fourth frame Jim Parker, pitcher for the locals, added his part to the score by lifting one over the boards. The sixth proved a big inning with five runs being chalked up by the home-townners and every man getting a chance to bat. Scalings, Dockery, Parma, Lynch and E. Mueller all hit safe and these hits and one bobble on the visitors' infield netted five tallies. One more run was put on the blackboard in the seventh when Scalings drove one out of the lot, completing the scoring for the Hillmen.

**Vienna Cancer School Houses 40 Scientists**

By Alfred Tyrnauer (International News Staff Correspondent)  
**VIENNA, August 20.**—Outstanding representatives of both scientific groups carrying on cancer research along different, rather contrasting lines, were invited to join the new Vienna cancer research institute founded recently by the American millionaire, S. Canning Childs.

The principal difference between the two groups of biologists and physicians is, that while one of them believes that cancer is due to a specific microbe, the other asserts that it is a disease caused by an abnormality of the intestines or of the ductless glands controlling the vegetative life of the organism.

The "Canning Childs Hospital for Research of Internal Diseases and Cancer" to be opened probably by the end of October, will give an equal opportunity to adherents of both schools to enlarge the field of their investigation and bring about the solution of the mysterious and dreadful problem called cancer.

The board of trustees, which was recently formed in Vienna, includes the famous professors of the Vienna University, Prof. Eiselsberg, Prof. Wenckebach, Prof. Artz, Prof. Tandler and the director of the new institute, Dr. A. Edelmann.

Other members are: Mr. Childs, the Austrian minister, Kienboeck, Schmitz and Reich, and the mayor of Vienna, Herr Seitz.

Not only the future but also the history of Mr. Canning Childs' donation is interesting indeed.

After having sought for years healing against a painful internal disease, and having visited a great number of American and western European specialists, he came to Vienna and was cured by a comparatively unknown Vienna physician, Dr. Adolf Edelmann. His joy and thankfulness took the form of a \$200,000 check, which he placed in Dr. Edelmann's disposal for medical purposes.

The initiative of the American philanthropist has opened the doors and the check-books of other plutocrats, and Dr. Edelmann succeeded in realizing his old dream of establishing a modern cancer-research institute in Vienna.

A distinguished staff of about 40 scientists from all over the world will work in the research institute, which will comprise also a hospital with a hundred or more beds.
