GALVESTON, Aug. 11.-General depression in the cotton industry over the world severely hit the export of cotton from the Port of Galveston, the port record of the 1929-30 cotton season revealed

Foreign exports for the year were 1,600,467 bales, while those of the preceeding season were 2,570,029. Gross receipts were 2,-021.861 bales, a decrease of more than 1,000,000 from the previous year's mark of 3.012.649

The Port of Texas City also showed a general loss, its gross receipts being about 147,168, as compared with 188,311 the previous season




