Melvin A. Traylor in the Past and Today



(1) Friends and neighbors of Melvin A. Traylor, who remember him as the advancing a quarter of a century ago as a lawyer and then banker in Hillsboro, fired the first shot In the boom of Traylor for President on this Hill county courthouse lawn, August 1, 1931.

(2) This is the Melvin A. Traylor of today, internationally known President of Chicago's First National Bank, and outspoken opponent in 1928 of banking practices he said would cause the present financial condition, who is being boomed as the Democratic nominee for President. (3) In this two-room cabin home in the hills of Adair county, Kentucy, near the birthplace of President Lincoln, Melvin A. Traylor was born to James and Kitty Traylor, in October 1878. It was in this locality that young Travlor solit reils for the family fires and did other farm labors, much the same as had 'Abe' Lincoln many years before.

(4) It was as cashier of this little Bank of Malone, in Malone, Hill county, Texas, that Trayfor marked un his first successful venture in banking. Assuming control as cashier of this bank when it was in the "red" he soon made it safe for depositors' money and converted it into a profitable institution. Directors of the bank are shown scated.

He resigned from the Rallinger bank on April 11, 1911. While connected with the bank here he was a member of the Ballinger volunteer fire department and answered all alarms like the rest of the boys.
