



Company Will Give Farmers Higher Prices

Allow 81/2 Cents for Cotton on Farm Implements

CHICAGO, Mar. 31.-To encourage buying of farm machin-American agriculture, the International Harvester Company announces a plan which guarantees to farmer buyers of implements during 1932 a price of 70c a bushel for wheat, 50c a bushel for corn, both Chicago basis, and 8 1-2c a pound for cotton, New Orleans basis.

George A. The higher prices which these new terms guarantee are 70c a bushel, Chicago, for No. 2 hard wheat; 50c a bushel, Chicago, for No. 2 yellow corn, and 8 1-2c a pound, New Orleans, for middling cotton

"On notes maturing in 1932 given hereafter in payment for the machines listed and representing not more than 40 per cent of the purchase price, there will be indorsed the equivalent number of bushels of wheat or corn or pounds of cotton computed at the prices named. he average market quotation for the five-day period prior to and including the maturity date of the note is less than the price named the purchaser will credited with an amount repre-senting the price difference mul-tiplied by the number of bushels or pounds indorsed on the note.

For example, if the note due in 1932 amounts to \$420 it will require 800 bushels of wheat at 70c. Chicago, to meet the obligation. Should the price of wheat at maturity be less than 70c, say 60c per bushel. Chicago, the purpose of chaser's note will be accordingly reduced \$60.


