

DALLAS, July 24.—Governor Ross S. Sterling will go into the August run-off with Mrs. Miriam A. ("Ma") Ferguson, his leading opponent, if outstanding returns are correctly indicated by the returns tabulated Saturday night.

Tom Hunter, of Wichita county, is running third in the tabulations on the gubernatorial sweepstakes.

Early returns put Sterling in first place but as Ferguson piled up votes, the incumbent slipped into second. Mrs. Ferguson Sterling, 141; Wolfe, 107 started in second place but closed the night in first place with a comfortable lead over the governor. On the other hand Sterling's lead over Hunter is not impressive and with a large unreported vote there is a po sibility of a change in their positions.

Submission of the prolibition question seems to have carried by more than two to one, but many Sterling, 411; Wolfe, 132 counties have not reported their totals on this issue.
