SCARLET FEVER

Scarlet fever is now known to be caused by a germ belonging to the hemolytic, that is, blooddestroying streptococcus group, had been a chubby, freckled kid charges from the nose and throat.

fever is most serious. Half of the Valerie was tall. She wore clothes cases occur in children from three to seven years of age, and 74 per cent of all deaths from scarlet fever occur in children under 10.

By the Dick test it is now possible to determine whether a child is susceptible to scarlet fever.

Doctor Dick, to whom we owe much of our recent knowledge of the cause of scarlet fever, recommends active immunization against the disease, but this practice is not as widespread as immunization against diphtheria.

On the other hand, the use of scarlet fever antitoxin is now an accepted treatment. This antitoxin, developed by Dr. Dochez, has proved itself effective.

The child sick with scarlet fever needs careful medical attention. for, though the disease itself may not threaten life, its serious aftereffects and late complications include diseases of the ear and of

the kidneys. The scarlet fever patient should be kept isolated in a room well ventilated and with as much light as possible

Daily sponging with soap and water will keep the patient comfortable and will help reduce

Children recovering from scarlet fever need a proper convalescent period. They should also be guarded against subsequent infections, particularly of the respiratory system.


