Ben Lyon Gets Spirit of the Newspaperman

With that recklessness and dash common to newspaper reporters, Ben Lyon pursues a hot news story aboard a speeding Pullman train and solves five mysterious murders while getting his story in "By Whose Hand?"

Miss Bankhead is glamorously beautiful in the role of Pauline Sturm, the wife, and gives by far the best performance of her screen career. Gary Cooper, in his first role since an extended trip abroad, is responsible for a fine portrayal of the young lieutenant who loves the wife of his commander.

But the outstanding performance of the film is contributed by Charles Laughton, and English actor, whose unforgettable portrait of the crazed submarine commander is his first screen creation. Laughton's work in this exceedingly difficult role places him in the front rank of screen character actors. He alone seems worthy of the mantle of Lon Chaney.

SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 24.—Mayor C. M. Chambers owns more Roosevelt-Garner medallions than any other Texan. The genial chief executive of the Alamo City bought and paid for one thousand

of the bronze Democratic emblems at one dollar each, thus making him the largest Texas "Shareholder in America."

Some Texans contributed larger sums, but they were made through the special gift committees of the congressional districts instead of from medallion purchases.

Mayor Chambers is a native of Red River county, was a boyhood friend of John Garner, and was one of his most ardent pre-convention advocates.

Chambers purchased the medallions after hearing the Garner radio speech, which, he asserted, was the most powerful political address that he had ever listened to.

A beef will be butchered and Mr. Snyder will be in charge of the cutting, explaining how everything is done and showing the class. After the butchering the beef will be chilled and then sliced into the various cuts showing how to produce roasts, steaks, chili meat, etc.

The game will look like Thanksgiving day and will certainly have the color.

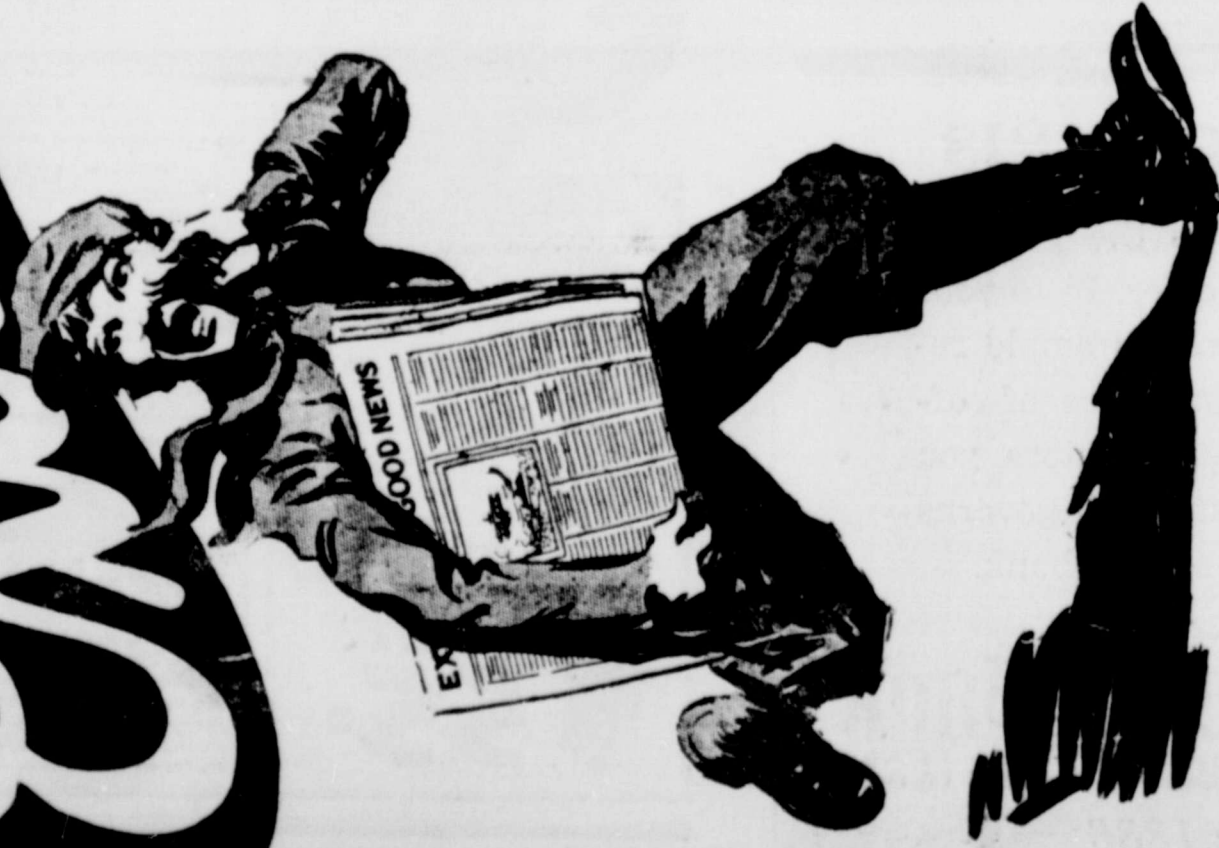

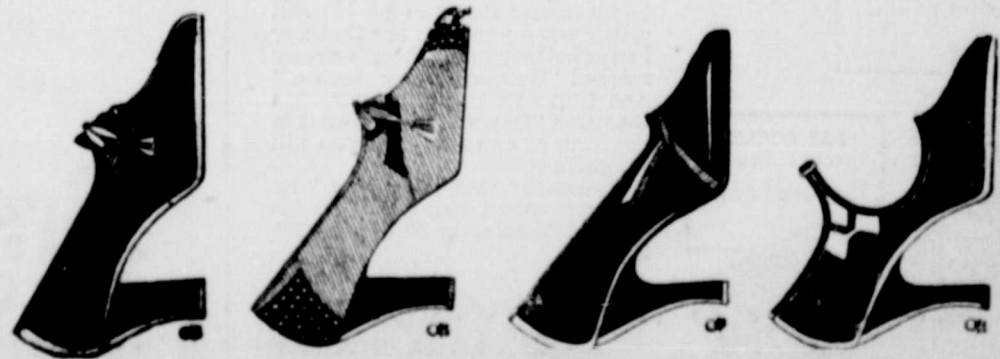

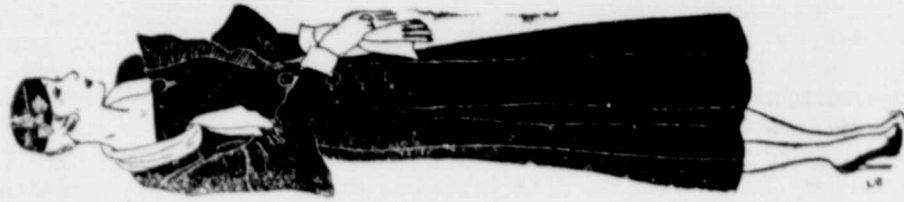
