



## News Editor, Dies After Long Illness

A. W. Sledge died at his home on Broadway Friday night at 11:55, just five minutes before his 58th birthday. He had been practically an invalid for the past eight years and most of that time had remained at home, doing no active work of any kind.

Albert Wilton Sledge came to Runnels county in 1893 when a lad of 17 and made Ballinger his home. Soon after coming here he secured his first job as an apprentice in the Runnels County Ledger office, of which P. E. Truly was proprietor, and remained in the printing and publishing business until forced to retire on account of his health.

Mr. Sledge's reputation in his chosen profession was known all over the state and his work with Ballinger newspapers afforded him opportunity to become a leader in the growth and development of Runnels county. He made a genuine contribution to the progress of this section and no man has ever called Ballinger home who was more loyal or a better booster for this city.

VARICOSE VEINS

Varicose ulcers are commonly the result of blood stagnation due to the incapacity of the veins to promote adequately the return flow of blood to heart.

This incompetence on the part of the veins may be associated with other disease conditions, as for example, arterial disease and diabetes. The ulcer formation may be precipitated by injuries, such as bruises, burns and cuts.

Varicose veins which, in a sense, are the forerunners of varicose ulcers, should be given adequate medical attention.

While some varicosities are relatively insignificant, there are other conditions in which varicose veins may be painful, disfiguring and to an extent dangerous.







Rather than look for and gather relics such as arrowheads, tomahawks, grain grinders, etc., Judge Sims has a process whereby he can secure photographs and drawings of the pictures or ideographs found on stones and elsewhere. His collection includes photos from all sections of the state and some from other parts of the nation.

After a preliminary talk regarding the collection and translation of the early paintings, Judge Sims displayed a number of photos, taking time to explain the meaning of some of the most important. Several maps discovered on stones in Texas were shown. These are declared to be geographically correct in the position of rivers and other landmarks indicated.

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
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
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
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
