

A DARING EXPEDITION TO THE FROZEN NORTH

Eighteen Months Spent in the Endless Stretches of the Arctic for the Filming of "Eskimo"—A Story of the Conflict Between the Simple Eskimo and the White Man Who Abuses His Hospitality

TOU sink deeper and deeper into the comfortable chair, and suddenly you are transported, without the slightest inconvenience to yourself, to a sphere, a climate where you'd never venture even if you had the time, money and energy. You are witnessing "Eskimo" and strange conflict that comes into the life of a peaceful, primitive people. You are actually in the North while you remain seated in a theatre in the Southland.

So short a time back as twenty-five years ago we had very little way of knowing with any vividness how life is lived in allen and distant lands. We were able to study dry and dreary geographical reports; or we could consult the more animated travel dairies; or listen to lecturers and look at their colorful but static slides.

Sometimes a stage play attempted an imaginative reconstruction of a far-away territory, such as China or the Sahara, yet no matter how successful the illusion turned out to be, you always knew in the back of your mind that this was not something real but a setting that had been recently built in the work shops of New York.

So it remained for the motion picture maker to become the contemporary traveler and explorer, to go off on elaborate and daring expeditions, not for the sake of bringing back any booty or trophies that could be sold and exhibited, but to make exact and highly detailed records of the daily life and the habits and the atmosphere of a people with a culture entirely unrelated to our

These are the modern vikings, the adventurers of the twentieth century. They go, at great personal risk and danger, in search of sheer authenticity-and they return with entertainment a world whose curiosity about other regions has become an intense and constant interest.

There are no longer any mysteries. The cinema adventurers go anywhere and everywhere, from one extreme of climate to another. If it is necessary to live like the natives and undergo all the difficulties and privations which the natives undergo, then they cheerfully and mechanically do so

And sometimes there have been serious accidents. Even death has claimed some victims.

But W. S. Van Dyke, one of the leading directors and expedition-conductors for Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, makes it his boast that no harm whatever has come to any member of his crew on the numerous, severe and lengthy trips they have made

There were expeditions into the tremendous heat of the Congo for "Trader Horn" and for "Tarzan." There was one to Tahiti for the filming

each of these hunts in sequence, they would have had to remain for several years.



"The Pagan Love Song" and another longer expedition in the same general region of the South Sea Islands for "White Shadows in the South Seas.

And only recently Van Dyke and his "gang" returned from a stay among the Indians in Arizona, where they filmed "Laughing Boy."

But the longest, severest and most elaborate expedition of them all was the trip to Alaska for the making of "Eskimo.

It was in late May of 1932 that a company of twenty-eight man under the supervision of Col. Van Dyke departed f.o.r Hollywood with fifty tons of equipment that included enough food for a medical supplies, mechanism for sound reproduction and a portable laboratory.

They took a train to Seattle and reached there just in time to embark on the steamer Victoria for Nome, Alaska. Then they transferred their beto the whaling schooner Nanuk and set longings out for Teller.

The journey consumed 13,000 miles and re-quired almost a month to fulfill-but arriving at their goal was the least of problems. Staying there was the chief preoccupation; that is, circulation, communication, housing establishment and protection against the weather.

1

In addition to Van Dyke, an old hand at the mastering of new territories, the expedition con tained Peter Freuchen, author of the novel, "Eskimo." from which the film was being made; Mala, an Eskimo who drifted south for a time and was returning with the M-G-M outfit to serve as interpreter and leading actor; and a radio operator -----

With the general information they had col-lected about the country and with these aids to existence, they felt as safe as possible in settling off Point Teller in Alaska. There was a large warehouse which they were able to remodel for the storing of equipment; a series of wooden shacks was constructed; and, since they had arrived during the summer, they found it practi-cable to set up about a dozen tents of caribou skin which could be used as sleeping headquarters.

Thus, for the first two months, no true difficulties were encountered. They cultivated acquaintance with the Eskimos, chose their potential actors from among them, studied the urrounding region, and plotted the sequence of work with thoroughness and care.

It was when the cold set in that their real troubles began.

Once they would be completely frozen in and all locomotoin became impossible for days on end. During this time they would stay on the whaling vessel because of the heating apparatus in it.

Another time, counting on the cold, they would construct a series of the ice houses which Eskimos make for overnight rest while on a long journey. Suddenly the northern sun, whose rays are even stronger than ours, would come calmly marching forth and completely liquefy all the houses.

When the whaling vessel on which they did a great deal of living was frozen in port, that was bad enough, since it meant an end to all work— but at least they were close to the small village and could live with some degree of comfort. But when the vessel's progress was impeded by lice in the middle of an upstream sailing, then every-one had to go out with pick (and sometimes riveter) to break a path through the solid stretches.

Actual danger rose with the numerous animal nts. These, interestingly enough, all occur nultaneously in the Arctic region. Caribou, ale, Polar bear and walrus are all hunted hunts. iring October and November.

If the expedition had attempted to photograph

crazed dogs, dogs which had been obliged to pull sleds through stretches of foul weather for many days. These dogs were beyond cure and were always a menace for rables, so that they invariably had to be shot

Peril arose with the herds of caribou which had been gathered in a kind of corral so that there could be a mass of them when the time came for photography. The smell of these hundreds of well-meated animals constantly attracted wolves, so that someone handy with a rifle had to be in attendance.

Controlling the Eskimo actors was one of the most considerable problems. In the very beginning, to convey the idea of movies and acting to them, a showing of "Trader Horn" was made for them. Some were so horrified by the strangeness of it all and by the idea that the white men had permitted characters to die without helping them that a slight exodus from the camp resulted immediately.

Those who remained received five dollars a day and behaved reasonably well, outside of a peculiar tendency to overact. In many instances it took a long time to teach them merely to smile; and once it was achieved, they persisted so steadily in holding the smile that a scene of grief or anger had to be postponed to the following

Once they decided to go on strike for more money, a procedure they had recently heard about. They were greatly confused to see that the company was able to hire other natives in their stead, and it was not long before they came back to ask whether they couldn't be reinstated.

The accumulation of anywhere from \$75 to \$100 struck most of them as an excellent reason for making that long-planned trip to Nome, Alaska's capital, where they invariably planted themselves in taxicabs and rode around and rode around, just to be in the miraculous cab. Once the money was spent-and it never took very longthey were back at Teller and ready to be recruited for the mais scenes.

Keeping the white company happily occupied during the stretches of enforced inactivity was as much of a problem as any

They would bet on the results of football games as coming in over the air. A couple of dog teams and sleds were used to play improvised games of polo on a flat ice field. Usually the game broke up because the dogs started fighting. A cribbage board was made out of walrus tusks. A baseball game was played after the Eskimos had been instructed in this American art. A four-page news-paper called the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer was edited, a sheet consisting mostly of satire and kidding.

Probably the most exciting photographic feat of them all was that of the caribou drive, which is one of the high points of the picture "Eskimo." In this scene the animals appear so close to the camera that the unfailing audience reaction is a series of unbelieving gasps.

For this three cameramen adjusted their tri-pods high on a scaffold platform and began grinding the moment the cribon were released from their corral.

The animals drove by with such uncontroll-able speed that one or another of the cameramen kept toppling over backwards, equipment and all. The others continued grinding and grinding, for it was now or never. With three photographing the same scene simultaneously, some kind of rec-ord of the scene was sure to be achieved. And it







Good Idea

agricultural scientists accept recent suggestions of three Italian soil experts, Drs. Antoniani, Nicolini-and Arnaudi, to the Royal Institute of Science and Letters in Lombardy.

Not only do all soils breathe each day by drawing in and letting out air, usually inward at night and outward in the daytime, but there is also a chemical breathing of the soil by absorbing oxygen and giving off carbon dioxoide gas, almost exactly as happens in the lungs of human beings or other animals. The reason for this is that all fertile soils contain vast numbers of bacteria and other microscopic creatures which live on and between grains of soil minerals.

Nearly all of these micro-organisms breathe in oxygen continually and give out carbon dioxide just as higher creatures do.

The Italian experts find that the daily amounts of these gases thus exchanged by a sample of soil correspond closely with the number and activity of the microorganisms in the soil.

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These micro-organisms in turn, have a close relation to the soil fertility. Fertile soils usually have many more of them than infertile soils. Accordingly, it is found that measuring by a chemical device the rate at which any specified soil is breathing in oxygen and breathing out carbon dioxide is a good indication of the soil's fertility.
