

### Valuable Discovery in Tuning Church Bells

A church bell made from the finest bell metal may give forth a harsh, unpleasant sound, due to the fact that it is out of tune with itself. The stroke of a single bell sounds to us ifke one note, and until very recently even the most expert bell makers have not realized that the sound is really made up of five separate notes. The five notes must be in tune with one another in order that the bell may give forth a harmonious sound. What we then hear is a combination of what is known as the strike note; the nominal, which is an octave above the Ctrike note; the hum, which is an octave below, and the third and fifth.

This recent discovery regarding the harmonics of bells has made possible the new art of bell tuning, a revival of what for two centuries was considered a lost art. The large bells are Severted on a huge turntable and revolved while the metal is pared away from the inside until it is correctly shaped to produce the harmonious tones .- Kansas City Star's Science
