Citizens Ask That County be Placed In Drouth Section

"A mass meeting of citizens of Runnels county was held at the court house here Thursday morning, following which a telegram was sent the United States secretary of agriculture, requesting that Runnels county be placed in the drouth stricken area and that federal aid be given this county at once.

Judge Paul Trimmier presided over the meeting and named a committee to look after the claims of this county to be included in the area to receive federal aid. During the past week several adjoining counties have been designated as part of the drouth area and will receive aid immediately.

The telegram sent to Washington from this county was signed by county officials, city officials of the various towns in the county. chamber of commerce officials, the county agent and home demonstration agent, and heads of other organizations. It set out the arid condition here, showing that feed production had been materially reduced and cotton was deteriorating rapidly.

The name was too sacred to be spo ben, and whenever the Scriptures were read aloud the word "adonai" (meaning "lord" in its common sense) was spoken in its stead. There are no vowels in the Hebrew alphabet, and the vocalic "points" which are used In later Hebrew writing were unknown when the sacred books were composed. Modern scholarship inclines to the belief that the correct pronunciation of the tetragram is "Yahweh." Inasmuch as the Hebrew letter "yod" is transliterated either "y" or "J" and the Hebrew letter baby "wau" as either "w" or "v" there are four possible transiiterations of the tetragram, namely, YHWH, YHVH, JHWH, JHVH. By ignorantly applying the vowels of the spoken "adonal" to the consonants of the unspoken JHVH the impossible form "Jehovah"



How to Make Ink Remover

You can easily prepare a chemical ink eraser that will leave the paper perfectly clean. Prepare or purchase 2 per cent solution of potassium permanganate, says Popular Mechanics Magazine. Place this in a small bot tle having a rubber cork with a glass dropping rod attached, and mark it No. 1. Into a similar bottle, marked No. 2, place a similar amount of ordinary photographers' hypo solution. You can obtain a few ounces of this from any photographic shop, or get a box of the dry powders and mix enough for several ink-erasing outfits. To use the chemicals, apply a little of solution No. 1 on the ink, let it remain a few seconds and blot. Then apply solution No. 2. In a few seconds the dark stain, caused by the permanganate, will disappear, taking the ink mark with It. Remove excess liquid with a blotter. If one application does not remove the stain, repeat the process after washing out the hypo with water or applying enough permanganate to neutralize all of the hypo that has **poaked** into the paper.

How Word "Pickaninny" Started It is sometimes good for the soul

to find that something we have regarded as original with us or pecu-Harly our own considerably predates our own existence and in parts and places far removed from our own little circle on this earth !

That happens with the word "pickaninny," which most of us regard as an Americanism for negro children. The fact is that "pickaninny" is a word in good standing, meaning simply a "small child," Its derivation is from the Spanish "pequeno" meaning "little, young," or the Portuguese "pequeno" of which it is a diminutive! The chances are that the term had its introduction into this country by way of Cuba.

Now Sweeping Compound to Made Such compounds are largely composed of sawdust and silicious material, together with some bonding medlum, such as rosin, oll or tar. Bran and sand are also usual ingredients. The following formula may be used: Melt 2 ounces of parafin wax in 2 quarts of paraffin oil over a water bath ; then add 6-ounces of coarse salt, 5 pounds of sea sand, 10 pounds of sawdust, and finally add 1 ounce of oll of eucalyptus.

How Moon and Sun Cause Tides Tides are caused by the gravitational action of the moon and sun on the earth. The moon's effect in pro ducing tides is about two and one-half times that of the sun, as this depends on nearness as well as mass. The attraction of the moon tends to separate the solid part of the earth from the more mobile waters, which therefore plie up in what we call tides,


Golfers Qualify For Club Tourney Here July Fourth





India's Venomous Snakes Less Than Six Feet Long

Should you encounter a snake mor than six feet long in India, outside the thick jungles of Travanacore, Assam and Burma, you need not be badly worried, according to a zoologist connected with the Review of India, of Calcutta and Delhi. For he tells us lasses. that most of the deadly venomous snakes native to that country are six feet or under in length. The deadly jungle species attaining a length of more than six feet is the Hamadryas or king cobra

But even if they are not monsters, the polsonous anakes of India do plenty of damage. "The wild beasts of India kill 2,000 people every year, but the snakes of India kill 3,000 every

month," this authority writes. There are 320 species of snakes registered, of which 67 are toxic (29 water anakes, 18 vipers, 11 kralts and nine species of cobras). Unly two of the vipers can give a futal bite, and there are only four species of land snakes whose bite is usually fatal. These are a species of cobra, a krait, the chain

One-Cent Stamp of 1856 Meet Valuable in World

The British Gulans 1856 one cent stamp is the most valuable bit of postal paper in existence, says the Boston Transcript. Like many another rarity. its worth was not recognized by its eriginal owner. A lad living in British Guiana, who found it smong some old family papers is the year 1872, sold it to a collector for \$1.50! The stamp thereafter changed owners several times, each time at rising prices, until in 1880 it was purchased for \$800 by that greatest stamp collector of all time, the Austrian Count Phillip la Renotlere von Ferrary. When Count Ferrary died, in 1917,


his huge and wonderful collection was sold in a series of fourteen historic auction sales at a price which totaled \$2,275,975. It was at one of these auction sales that the agent of an American millionaire, the late Arthur Hind, of Utica, N. Y. outbid the agent of King George V for the possession of the British Gulana rarity. The price oald, including the French government's tax, was \$38.025-a collossal sum for one postage stamp! Yet


