

#### Automobiles Miss Dull Child in Street Safety Group Finds

LONDON, April 22—An alarming tendency for street aecidents to select and kill the intelligent children of the highest value to society and to miss the duller ones who are not likely to be of much use anyway was reported to the recent national safety congress by representatives of the

Statistics for the past year show that among London children about one child in each 150 is hit by an automobile every year. Most of these accidents happen to children between 3 and 10 years old, and about twice as many boys as to girls. The effect of child intelligence on the chance of being hit is more difficult to compute statistically, but experts believe that it may double the chance of injury to an active and intelligent child as compared with a dull and apathetic one.

Part of this is blamed on more active play, so that the alert and intelligent child spends more time on the streets or in other places where accidents are probable. Another difference is that intelligent children think more highly of their toys or other possessions, so that they are more likely than dull or stupid children to run into

Still another difference is the greater capacity of an intelligent child to get very much interested in something so that an approach-vehicle is not seen.

TABORA, Tanganyika, Africa April 22.—After hiking 14.700 miles through Africa, Mr. and Mrs. M. Parker, of Maritzburg, Union of South Africa, declare that stories of the terrors of the jungle are all

The couple visited nearly every protectorate and colony in Africa, and on their arrival at Tabora recently they reported that Africa had disappointed them and that jungle terrors are a myth. The lions and tigers showed not the slightest interest in them, and walking in the wilds was really

The couple declared it was unnecessary to carry firearms, and instead of the long line of safari porters, beloved of the novelists, three natives sufficed for their needs. Mr. and Mrs. Parker added that there is more excitement in than two and a half years in Maritzburg on a Saturday night central Africa.





A. Forrest. They paid a total of \$7,580, giving Mrs. Forrest, \$4.644. the father \$2,580, and the two sons, both minors, Lynwood and Hogue Forrest, \$160 each. In their original petition the four claimed to be the only heirs and beneficiaries of the late J. F. Forrest, the defendants stated in an answer to the later suit.




