> TEXAS FOREST NOW SHOWS NEW ACREAGE PRODUCING

AUSTIN Oct 28 Instead of the original Texas forest area of some 18,000,000 acres, there now remains less than one-half million acres covered with old growth or virgin timber, Mrs. Clara H. Lewis of the University of Texas bureau of business research points out in a recent article on Texas forest products for the magazine. "East Texas." She calls attention. however, to approximately 3,000,-000 acres of second growth of pine and hardwood of merchantable size, and to another 4,000,acres covered with timber which has not yet obtained usable

growth. This depletion of the state's forest resources makes it doubly important that every advantage be taken of the development of new uses for wood products, both from second growth timber and from logging and saw mill waste. as the result of chemical research, she said.

"It is not only in the manufacture of lumber, but also in the new uses which science and technology have found for forest products and from waste materials of sawmills, logging operations and stills that we see possibilities of new wealth in Texas forests." she said.


