



more satisfactory than airplanes for long-distance passenger flights, Dr. Hugo Eckener, veteran airship commander, prophesies in the cur-rent issue of the Journal of Air Law, published by the Northwestern University Press.

Writing on "The Commercial Possibilities of the Airship," Doctor Eckener cites comfort for passengers and economy of operation as among the prime factors favoring

"It is generally admitted," he asserts, "that the airship offers a considerably more agreeable and more comfortable form of transportation for passengers. And I am also of the opinion that, viewed from a purely commercial standpoint, an airship will have greater chances on long distances than an airplane service. The most economical operation of an airship is with a pay load which equals the weight of the fuel to be used on the voyage. 




