The inventor's original machine was destroyed in the Patent Office fire of 1836. His great-grandson, Austin Burt, made the reconstruction in 1892 from the patent drawings and description.

### Wrought Iron Handicraft

Eighteenth Century Mode In the Eighteenth century wrought iron handicraft flourished in London. Gates, candelabra, lamps and interior decorations covered homes of wealth. Iron workers were as highly respected as silversmiths and sculptors, declares a writer in the

Washington Post. Iron work was known to the ancients, too. Homer mentions a mass of wrought iron as a prize at Greek Most outstanding in the craft were the Italians and the

Florentine and Venetian palaces had finely formed candlesticks, gargoyles and lanterns. In Spain one may see wrought iron window grilles. Originally intended to protect lower floors of homes, these

were kept as pieces of art. Wrought iron is made by burning out nearly all the carbon in iron pigs. The result is a metal so easily bent it can be tied in knots without

Wrought iron is used in garden gates, fire screens, gongs and other household ornaments.

### House Centipedes

The house centipede occurs in public buildings and houses, preferring warm, moist situations in basements, greenhouses, bathrooms, etc. It preys on other in-sects and is regarded by Herrick's Insects Injurious to the Household" as not highly venomous. The centipedes, especially the larger tropical forms, are reputed to be poisonous to man. Their bite varies in effect, depending on the susceptibility of the person. The same authority concludes that the centipedes occurring in the United States are not to be considered seriously dangerous, though the larger spe-cies of the Southwest had probably best be avoided.

The authorities recently sent several expeditions to the island to exterminate the pigs, as it was found that they were destroying valuable plants and lizards.

When Captain Cook made his voyage round the coast he gave the Maori tribesmen pigs and potatoes. Before his visit there were no animals of any sort in New Zealand except a rare dog and a black rat.





#### Primitive Molten Magma Divided Into Two Layers

According to Dr. L. H. Adams, physical chemist of the Carnegie Institution of Washington, many circumstances indicate that the early history of the earth was as follows: The primitive molten magma consisting mainly of magnesium iron silicates, with smaller amounts of other oxides, including water and ron, first separated into two layers -molten iron below and silicate magma above. The silicate layer then began to crystallize at the bottom. As the solid layer increased in thickness the minor constituents, ncluding water, were concentrated to a greater and greater extent in the remaining liquid. Finally, when the liquid layer had been reduced to a thickness of a few tens of kilometers and was much richer in the originally minor constituents, the crust of the earth was formed. One of the most cogent reasons for believing that the earth is crystalline is that in no other way can we easily account for the fact that the crust differs so markedly from the interior. 
