It has had at least five other names, including Tondotiga, meaning "great villoge"; Waweatunog, "crooked way"; Teuchsa Grondie, referring to the bend in the river, Karontean, "coast of the straits," and Fort Postchartrain. The name is the French word for "strait" and refers to the city's location on the strait between the lakes.
