LOST COLONY CLEW **FOUND CUT IN ROCK**

Virginia Dare's Massacre Is Told in Message.

Atlanta, Ga.-A message in Elizabethan English crudely carved on slab of stone found on the bank of the Chowan river in North Carolina

Dr. Haywood J. Pearce, Jr., professor of history at Emory university in Atlanta, revealed the finding of the stone and the inscriptions telling of the Indian massacre of the

Message Carved on Stone.

The message was chiseled on a rough slab of quartz, found fifty miles inland from the original site of the settlers. If it is authentic t describes the last days of horror of the colony sent out by Sir Walter Raleigh under Ralph Lane and John White. Sir Richard Grenville com manded the fleet that brought the colonists undr Lane. A week after landing the colonists Grenville returned to England.

Threatened with famine and from hostile Indians, all the colonists later left for England on Sir Francis Drake's fleet. A few days after their departure Grenville arrived at Roanoke island with supplies and more colonists, fifteen of whom remained

when he again sailed for England. Although disappointed at the re turn of the first colony, Sir Walter Raleigh dispatched another company, consisting of 121 persons un der White. When White arrived not one of the colonists left by Gren ville was found. But he supposed they had moved inland and he left 121 other colonists on the island among them his daughter, Eleanor White Dare, and sailed for England for supplies. When he returned he found no trace of the colonists.

"Ananias Dare & Virginia went hence to heaven 1591.' On the reverse side are lines which Dr. Pearce translated as fol-

'Father, soon after you went to England we came hither. Only misery and war for two years. Twentyfour surviving. The savages murdered all save seven of us. My child and Ananias too were slain with much misery.

(Signed): "E.W.D." Dr. Pearce said the initials "W W. D.' are supposed to be those of Eleanor White Dare, daughter of John White.

"If Eleanor Dare was the sender of this message the child referred to was Virginia Dare, the first white hild born in America." Dr. Pearc said, "Ananias Dare, husband of Eleanor and father of Virginia, was one of the twelve assistants to Virginia was born August 18, 1587.



By John A .Barton (County Agent, Runnels County) Information from Triple-A headquarters indicates that the Runnels county cotton allotment will be received about April 25 or 26. When this is received it will be necessary to figure each individual farm. The county's farms are listed on large sheets and they will be figured and posted just as soon as possible, starting with group one, which is Miles, Rowena, Maverick and Brookshier.

When the cotton allotment is received the following procedure will be followed, according to the information we now have: Multiply the cotton allotment by 173.5 and the answer is subtracted from the total tilled acres. Low, gray rain clouds made lights almost a necessity in order to carry en business, so when the current went off, the sale of candles increased a thousand per cent. We stayed in the dry goods stores awhile observing the effect of candle lights, and it struck us as rather amusing when people grabbed a boit of material, a pair of sox or some other merchandise and ran to the front doos, holding the article up and squinting, trying to see what color it seally was—just like in the "good old days." (Maybe that will account for some of the termorizing colors people are wearing.)

And the poer kids, how they did miss the Saturday afternoon picture show! It's really a shame that they didn't have some stereoscopic parlor pictures to look at like ma and pa had—back in the "good old days."

We wandered over to two of our beauty

shops and found dozens of women and girls draped on the floor, chairs and stools, literally sticking their heads in the fire to dry that new wave set. That reminded us that back in the "good old days" grandma didn't shampoo her hair in the winter or in rainy weather; she just rolled it up on curiers.

We noticed the barber shops also felt the lack of electricity. You know back in the "good old days" they weren't bothered with all those little electric gadgets 'cause grampa fust turned a bowl down on pa's head and started cettin'. The finishing touches were accomplished with the old blue and white shaving mug and rasov.

We stopped in to see how the drug stores were making out with their Frigidaire motors stopped and their candle light. Somehow or other they didn't seem too hapy about it. Now we could rave on and on about this, but what's the use? Printing preases were stopped, bank machines halted, in fact, there wasn't a business house in Hamlin that did not feel great lack of electricity. And when the current finally did come on after three and a half hours, people gave whoops and hollers that made the Indians back in the "good old days" look like sissies. ORPHAN ADOPTED BY KIND INDIAN TRIBE

Evangelist Thinks "Savagery" Has Been Exaggerated.

Fort Worth, Texas .- The Rev. J. A. Newsom, seventy-one years old, one of the few white children reared in Oklahoma's Indian territory, does not believe Indian customs were as "savage" as many historians suggest. Newsom, now a traveling Baptist evangelist, was made an orphan by Indians, but he and a brother and sister were taken into the tribe and treated well thereafter.

Newsom's father was killed by an Indian's arrow in 1372 as he plowed in a field on the famous old Goodnight ranch of the Texas Panhandle His mother attempted to maintain the family, but two months later she, too, was slain by a party of marauding Cheyennes when she went to the spring for water.

The Indians carried Newsom, then five, his seventeen-year-old sister and three-year-old brother, to Oklahoma to be reared with other children in the village. Newsom was taught to make bows and arrows; to eat parched grasshoppers, baked terrapin-in-the-shell, and roasted

the Cheyennes for ten years, spoke their language and adopted their customs. When he was fifteen, Newsom and his brother and sister were sent to live with the Seminole tribe, where a young missionary school teacher fell in love with him. After fulfilling a promise to her to at-tend school for five years, Newsom married her.



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

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
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
