





MONEY FOR MEALS COLLEGE STATION, July 6 .-

When it comes to keeping Texas money in Texas, J. C. Hotard, head of the substenance depart ment at Texas A. & M. College, leaves little ground for complaint about outside spending.

During the fiscal year ending August 31, 1937, Mr. Hotard spent a total of \$548,764.69 in the operation of the mess hall at the college and of that amount only Texas. Included in the latter sum were items totaling \$8,350.61 for new kitchen equipment estimated to last ten years. Therefore only \$835.06 is chargeable to any one year, which leaves a figure of \$7,952.26 as spent in other states over the twelve-month period. This is equal to 1.45 per cent of

the total expenditures. While the figures for money spent may seem large, it must be remembered that Mr. Hotard is in charge of the world's largest eating establishment, serving approximately 2,800 Texas A. & M. students three meals daily. His
