BONES OF ICE AGE HORSE ADDED TO TECH MUSEUM

LUBBOCK, Sept. 28 .- Portion of the lower jaw of an ice age horse and other of its bones are in a collection of fossil bones now on display at West Texas Museum. situated on Texas Technological College campus. Gift of F. L. Pederson. Amarillo gravel pit operator, the collection also includes the leg bone of a camel, native to this section of America in the Cenozoic era.

Two other displays are now in process, a pliocene vertebrae group, collected in surveys made by the museum staff last summer and material of the upper Triassic period, consisting mainly of amphibians and reptiles collected in the Dockum beds near Spur.

EUROPE'S TALLEST PEAK TO HAVE NEW HOTEL

NALCHIK, Russia, Sept. 28.-Mount Elbrus, Europe's tallest peak, is to have a streamlined hotel which will be not only the loftiest but the most unique in that part of the world.


The building, resembling a huge three-deck streamline bus, has been specially designed to resist the fierce winds which blow at this exposed point 12,600 feet above sea level.

Behind the new hotel rise the peaks themselves to almost 17,000 feet. To make possible the construction of the building a road for tractors was cut up the side of the mountain, winding from the village of Terskol, the terminal point of the long highway of the Kakshan Valley.
