Bridge in France Built by Romans, **Still Being Used**

NIMES, France, Oct. 5 .- Proof that Roman engineers and masons knew their jobs is furnished by the fact that the Pont du Gard, historic bridge which was contructed when Jesus was preaching in Galilee, still withstands the inslaughts of time and intemperate weather

Of late, there have been rumors that this, the greatest bridge built by the Romans, was proving unequal to the strain of modern raffic; but the rumors were exaggerated and only partly true. Architects who inspected the bridge report that it does need certain number of repairs, which are being effected, but they are minor in character. Certain empty spaces, formed in the foundations, will be filled with cement and the bridge will continue its centuries-old career.

Posey, service officer of the local American Legion post stated Monday that there were a number of gold star fathers and mothers in Runnels county who had just received the last of their insurance payments left by veterans killed in action. These pay ments were made from war risk insurance carried by the veterans and were sent out each month for

20 years. Mr. Posey stated that fathers and mothers who do not have too much income are still eligible to compensation from this source and if they would call at his ffice he would file their papers In cases where one parent is living he can receive \$25 per month and in cases where both are liv ing they are entitled to \$15 each. Several applications have been filed recently and there are others who do not know of the additional compensation offered
