





'UNCLE SAM' WAS REAL CHARACTER

Jackson's Men First Used Name In War of 1812.

DALEVILLE, MISS .- The man believed to have been the original "Uncle Sam" is soon to be menorialized by a national pilgrimage

Now Walton has come to the conclusion that Gen. Andrew Jackson's men, on their way to New Orleans o fight the final battle of the War f 1812, were the first to refer to 'Uncle Sam' as a symbol of the

United States. According to old records found in Georgia, a company of Jackson's men on their way to New Orleans were crossing Dale's ferry on the Alabama river. A second company arrived while the first company was eating and wanted to know where

it could get some rations.
"From Uncle Sam yander," the coonskin-capped Tenhessee mountaineers yelled, pointing to General Dale. Later, at New Orleans, the soldiers referred affectionately to the old Indian fighter and scout as "Uncle Sam."

After the War of 1812, soldiers carried back home stories of "Uncle Sam" and his generosity. From this, the government became known as "Uncle Sam," according to Walton's theory.
